

#### **On The Farm**

I woke up early, on Mondav the 26th of February, to texts saying someone had tipped a lorry load of shredded waste. into my Walkies Gateway off Churchfield Road. This was tipped by a large lorry sometime between late on Sunday evening and early Monday morning.



Just by chance did any of my village friends drive up the road and see that lorry?

Most of Monday was spent dealing with the problem. My first call was to our Parish Council Clerk, Caroline who was very helpful saying she will contact E H D C and report the fly tipping. My calls were to the Environment Agency Hotline and the N F U Flytipping Hot line. The police called several times and they gave me a Crime Ref Number. I also called David Lloyd, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Hertfordshire, as I understand there is a fly tipping fund to help people who have waste tipped on their land. It was reported that 4 other loads were dumped in several areas of E H D C that weekend. My first quote for clearance was for several thousand pounds. This seems to be an ongoing problem in the countryside, I hope to clear this up soon.

Due to the very wet February, we have hardly done any work on the Land, so nothing to report on that front.



#### Team Vicar's Letter

Potholes – they are everywhere – and try as we might to avoid them, it's inevitable that at some point in our travels we'll find ourselves bumping into them. Literally.

#### **St Peter's News**

#### A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

It is good to see the back of February and a little less rain! As I write this, we are well into Lent, and I am coming up with different soup recipes for the Lent lunches. Susannah has been leading us through a course designed by the Ministry team to coincide with the exhibition of the Methodist church's collection of contemporary religious art. So far, we have seen paintings by Norman Adams and Ghislane Howard depicting Jesus' Entry into Jerusalem and the Washing of the Feet. These paintings have provoked much discussion. For example, about those who witnessed Jesus' riding through the crowds in Jerusalem and how quickly people can turn from being very in favour of someone to being against them only a short time later, and of the betrayal by Judas, his motives, and his guilt. As a group we plan to visit the whole exhibition which continues until 7<sup>th</sup> April at the Focolare Centre in Welwyn Garden City.

The 8<sup>th</sup> March is International Women's Day for which this year's theme is **"Invest in women: Accelerate Progress**". On 9<sup>th</sup> March a group of us attended a service of thanksgiving at St Albans Abbey for the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Ordination of women priests. We have been very fortunate here in Tewin to have had the offices of two women priests since 2005 – The Rev'd Coralie McCluskey and, from 2011 - The Rev'd Susannah Underwood. Women priests bring a different perspective and a different style to worship, and they have given us much to feel joyful about.

The following day, 10<sup>th</sup> March, was Mothering Sunday when traditionally domestic servants were permitted to go home to see their mothers or those who had their care and upbringing to visit their mother church where they were baptised. We celebrated the event in church with joyful singing and the presentation of posies to the women attendees for them or those close to them unable to attend church.

Our churchyard always looks lovely in the spring from the snowdrops in January, through the daffodils in February and March to the tulips in April. I hope you have had a chance to walk through the churchyard during this time when the blossom on the trees starts to come out too. Thank you to the THACS committee who have kindly donated £1000 from their residual funds for continued upkeep of the churchyard. Tree maintenance in the churchyard can cost us up to £900 in one year so this money is very wel-

come.

The PCC has accepted a quote for work to be done on the north wall of the church where we are experiencing damp. This has probably been caused by the high level of rainfall this winter. I am sorry the tap outside the vestry was not working for a few days. The stop cock failed and had to be replaced. All should be well now!

In early March Susannah and I, with Yasmin Shariff, our architect, welcomed Dr Jana Schuster, from Historic England, to discuss how they might help us with taking forward our plans for improvements to the church. This was a very useful meeting. Our architect is now working on the ideas discussed with Dr Schuster, and we are glad to say we shall have her advice to help us take the project forward. We have also received the feasibility study from Craigmyle on raising funds for this project and have a clearer picture of what we might have available to spend. **Do come to the Annual Parochial church Meeting on 28<sup>th</sup> April at 10.45am to hear the latest news.** 

A reminder that the Annual Spring cleaning of the church will take place on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> May. Please sign the sheet at the back of the church where you will find further details. The church is organising Open Gardens this year on 29/30 June. Please let me know if you would like to volunteer your garden. This has been a very successful event in the past which we want to continue.

#### Friends of Danesbury and QVM

Many of you may know that the name of one of the hospitals which The Friends support, Danesbury, is taken from the large white house on the hill in Welwyn above Carlton Rise. Before 1993 the hospital was housed in that building but it was becoming increasingly unsuitable, difficult and expensive to maintain so the NHS decided to sell the building. In an effort to prevent the patients, many of whom were long stay, from being sent to different institutions, the Friends of Danesbury organised an appeal which raised nearly £1 million towards the funding of a new purpose- built hospital in the grounds of the Queen Victoria Hospital in School Lane. Danesbury House itself was sold to a developer and redeveloped as flats. The history of Danesbury House is interesting. The building was finished in 1778 by the daughter-inlaw of the 10th Baron St John and inherited by Frances St John, a spinster, in 1786. The St John family were owners of the very grand Grade I listed Thorpe Hall near Peterborough which had been built during the Commonwealth period by Oliver St John on land taken from a monastery sacked during the Civil War. He was an important and influential man who had been Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas under Oliver Cromwell. Danesbury House was then called St John Lodge. In her will dated 6 April 1793 Frances appointed Thomas Forsyth of Upper Wimpole Street, London, to be her executor. When she died, she was buried in the village of Longthorpe near Thorpe Hall. In an interesting twist, Mr Forsyth, although living in London, is buried with a grand tomb in the old churchyard at Ayot St Peter. This is a beautiful and peaceful spot carpeted with snowdrops and daffodils in the spring. The house had many interesting owners through the years. In 1824, a William Blake purchased the house and renamed it Danesbury. Members of the Blake family continued to live in the house until the beginning of the 20th Century and during this time the fernery was built. The house was then rented out and finally, after a fire, it was sold to the Dewar family in 1919. They continued to live in it until shortly before the Second World War. Danesbury House then started its association with the medical world when it was requisitioned and used as a TB hospital and convalescent home. The house continued to be used as a TB hospital until 1955, after which it became a home for long-stay patients under the name of 'The Danesbury Home for the Young Chronic Sick" - the precursor of the modern Danesbury Neurological Centre. Many older Welwyn residents will remember summer fetes being held in the grounds of Danesbury House. — Jennifer Fowler, Friends of Danesbury and QVM, info@danesburyqvm.co.uk

#### Notes from an Apiary

A Sunday at the end of January and it feels like spring has sprung, but is it too early to celebrate? I suspect we have quite a bit of cold and wet weather ahead of us before we can be confident our bees have made it through the winter. As we look around, two important bee friendly plants are starting to show, bringing the promise of Spring. Snow drops in sheltered sunny spots in the garden and the Witch-hazel, now truly in flower. Both species are a joy to see and important as an early source of nutrition for bees.

One of the main threats to bees is the varroa mite, *varroa destructor*, considered to be one of the greatest threats to bees around the world. This small creature is a parasitic mite, now pretty much endemic in all colonies of bees. As a parasite, they don't directly kill bees but do significantly weaken the colony. Control of *varroa destructor* is essential to good husbandry. We employ an "Integrated Pest Control programme" (IPC). As part of the IPC we treat the colony with a solution of oxalic acid. Hives are opened between Christmas and New Year. Each "seam" of bees has a small amount of the solution dribbled into it. The bees are resilient, but it kills *varroa destructor*. It's all about keeping the parasite numbers down.

We applied oxalic acid treatment right at the end of 2023. Most hives were well, but one was completely without bees. Plenty of winter stores but no bees. We suspect the queen has become injured or failed and the workers simply absconded, hopefully finding their way into a neighbouring colony to pass the winter.

It's such a nice day, I think I'll take a walk down to the bee hives and see if any are poking their heads out, as I see a lot of Tewin folk are today. Phil


