

Screen On The Green

This month's film, on the 21st February, is *"Parasite"*, a South Korean black comedy thriller directed by Bong Joon-ho and released in 2019. Set in Seoul, it follows a poor family who scheme to become employed by a wealthy family and infiltrate their household by posing as unrelated, highly qualified individuals. The director has referred to the film as an 'upstairs/downstairs' or 'stairway' movie in which staircases are used to illustrate the social class chasm between the two families.

Parasite premiered at the Cannes Film Festival becoming the first South Korean film to win the Palme d'Or. It then went on to win many other accolades including four Academy Awards and is the first non-English language film to win Best Picture. *Parasite* is an R-rated film with adult material and some violence/gore. Dialogue is in Korean with English subtitles.

The evening will be run in a similar way as before (government restrictions permitting) but, for the safety of everyone, we would prefer that you are fully vaccinated. Please do not come if you are feeling unwell.

Winter on the Farm

There is plenty going on behind the scene every day on a farm. We are having very unseasonable weather, 15 degrees during most of December, too warm. We like it cold and frosty as it keeps the slugs at bay and stops disease building up on our growing crops of oats and wheat. We were about 2 weeks late in sowing our crops this Autumn due to seed problems at the Seed Merchant, but with these mild conditions, they have continued to grow, and growth stage is almost perfect.


I have been asked to explain what mini till is. Up to a few years ago all land was ploughed, but now just a small area is ploughed. If the land is ploughed it can incorporate the compost and straw, which then breaks down.

But ploughing a field is a very expensive operation, and needs several passes to make a seedbed. The benefits of mini till are improving soil health, reducing our carbon footprint, fewer passes over the land, requiring lower horsepower tractors, fuel savings (Diesel usage) and also Co2 emissions. My mini till implement is called a Sumo. It does three jobs in a pass. It has 7 subsoiler legs which break up the compacted soil, two sets of discs, which chop up the stubble and straw, then a large press wheel at the back which packs the soil down. The outcome is 10 ins of lovely loose soil, almost ready to sow into.

Due to the huge demand from dog walkers wanting an area of grassland on my farm to let their dogs run free, we have set aside a hectare (2.5 acres) of grassland for the dogs. It has a dedicated area to park their cars leading into a secure area in which the dogs can run free. We have lots of Happy Dogs !

Heart Disease in Women

Women are nearly 3 times as likely to die from coronary heart disease than breast cancer. Yet it's still often thought of as a man's disease.

Heart disease refers to any condition that affects the heart including:

- · heart attacks
- · heart failure
- · abnormal heart rhythms (arrhythmia)
- · heart valve disease
- · inherited or congenital heart disease

It's important that you know the signs of heart attack and other heart conditions, and when to seek medical attention.

- · know the symptoms of a heart attack
- get medical help immediately if you have symptoms of a heart attack
- know the symptoms of heart failure or arrythmia (abnormal heart rhythm)
- seek medical attention if you are pregnant and have chest pain or breathlessness that occurs with minimal exertion or when you are at rest
- seek medical attention if you are pregnant and have chest pain or breathlessness that comes on suddenly or is not normal for you
- talk to your healthcare professional if you have a heart condition and are planning pregnancy
- · reduce your risk of heart disease by making lifestyle changes
- · do not ignore symptoms of a heart attack
- · do not delay getting help if you have symptoms of a heart attack

A heart attack is a medical emergency. It's crucial to get treatment as soon as possible.

Team Vicar's Letter

A Victor Meldrew-esque yell from the living room made my daughter come running. "I don't belieeeeeeve it!" I shouted, "they're at it already." Daughter looked at the television and raised her eyebrows. "Oh that" she said.

My family are well used to my pet hates when it comes to advertisements; online bingo, payday loans, and this - adverts for Easter eggs in January (or Christmas puddings in September). We still have mince pies in the cupboard, goodness I still have Christmas cards I haven't yet delivered (do I save them now for next year?), I don't really want to be forced into thinking about stocking up on Easter chocolate.

Truth be told I do have to think about Easter after Christmas has finished because, unsurprisingly, in the church there is much to plan. In life it is impossible not to look ahead, at least a bit, but I just wonder if we are permanently encouraged to look forward, to look for the next event, the next big thing - that we might just miss the moment that is.

There is a practice in Christian tradition that encourages mindful awareness of God and of the present moment. It is a tradition that stems from desert fathers noticing God in the wilds of their habitation. It encourages a slowing down, a way of stopping and seeing the present as a holy place; full of God and full of his grace.

There is one exercise (the type that doesn't ask for lycra) given to us by St. Ignatius, which asks us to review the day. To sit quietly at the end of it and look back on what has been. To notice God in the good, in the moments of joy and love. To notice the difficult times and then to notice God's presence within that as well. To ask the Holy Spirit to show us what we have failed to notice. And when I do it, it surprises me how much beauty is revealed in a day I have often rushed through keen to get onto the next. Try it.

Today is the gift. *Now* is holy. *This* moment is where God is. Susannah

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

Christmas and January have come and gone, and it behoves me to thank many people who helped make Christmas in the church a joyful event. We kicked off with a splendid turnout for the Tewin Nativity. Thank you to all from the school who participated , the teenagers, children and adults who took roles and especially to Emma Owens who orchestrated the whole thing. Thank you also to Esther and Bruce Carley who allowed us to use their wonderful barn for the final tableau.

I am pleased to say that the popup Nativity was also well attended with two Marys, three kings and an angel coming dressed up for the Family Service. In the evening we held our candle-lit Carol Service and were delighted to be joined by the SAVoce choir again accompanied by some of our own choir. Thank you to everyone who supported this service. Thanks are also due to Ivor Williams who once again provided us with the Christmas Tree and to Clare Rawlins for decorating it. The flowers in church are still looking magnificent, a month later – thank you to all our flower arrangers for the wonderful work they do at Christmas and throughout the year.

Many young people came to the Crib Service on Christmas Eve, made bleating noises like sheep to accompany Susannah's account of the Christmas Story and carefully carried the nativity figures to the crib. Our Midnight Services are usually so busy that we have to lay out extra chairs in the Clock Tower but this year everyone was being careful, and we had a small sedate group that night and on Christmas Day. Nevertheless, we are pleased to report that we raised over £500 split between our nominated Christmas charities this year – the YMCA in Welwyn Garden City, which supports homeless young people, and CBM – the Christian Blind Mission, which is a charity for poor disabled people elsewhere in the world. The sums included £150 from the Rose and Crown's Walk a Mile initiative – so many thanks to Sean and Martine and their supporters for their efforts. Money was also raised for the Children's Society.

I expect, like me, you have been pleased to hear the bellringers quite often recently. Our own ringers rang a Quarter peal on 3 December and 6 January and were visited by the Middlesex Ringers who rang Tewin bells on 23 December. On 1 January two Tewin Ringers, Andrew B Mills and Emily Crowder, were joined by four other ringers from elsewhere (Simon J Davies, Daniel R B Gregory, Laurence P J Bourton, and Richard Sales) to ring a 5040 Minor (7 different methods) which takes 2hours 48 minutes in all, to welcome in the New Year. The doors were open and over 100 visitors came to look in during the peal. This was a wonderful effort. I hope they will also have rung a quarter peal on Sunday 23 January at 5pm for the 100th Anniversary of the Tewin Memorial Hall.

We are mindful that many people in the village have had Covid this month. We continue to hold in our prayers all those affected by the pandemic, all those who have died or have been bereaved around the turn of the year. We are still being very careful in church, wearing masks throughout the services, socially distanced seating, not taking wine at communion. Our clergy are still in contact with those selfisolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER 2021

We sold teas and cakes on Lower Green which provided a welcome break for people to sit and chat. We raised about £400 which will be used to support village groups.


On 22nd August, we staged the Tewin Classic Car & Craft Show.

Waste Aware

Despite the major challenges of the pandemic, we wanted to thank you all our residents - for helping the Hertfordshire Waste Partnership deliver a recycling rate of 52.4% in 2020/21, which is the highest achieved to date. The <u>HWP Annual Report 2020/21</u> contains more about this, the impact Lockdown had on the waste created across the county, how we addressed the limitations to deliver engaging events and answer your questions such as 'what happens to our waste' - including maps of <u>end destinations</u>. A recent study found that almost a quarter (24%) of Hertfordshire bins contains food and drink that would have been edible before it was thrown away. We're not talking peelings or bones, but things like bread, apples and meat. Milk is reported by WRAP to be the third most wasted food type, after potatoes and bread. Hertfordshire Energy Advice Tool

Hertfordshire has become one of the first regions in the UK to partner with Energy Saving Trust to provide an energy efficiency app to residents and help them make energy savings.

Unique and easy-to-use the Hertfordshire Energy Advice Tool (HEAT) app gives a virtual tour around a typical home, asking questions and giving advice along the way. Based on the answers provided, quick, easy, low or no -cost actions are suggested to help householders save money on their energy bills and reduce their carbon footprint too.

Once the virtual tour around the home has finished, a tailored advice report can be emailed, providing users with a summary of the potential energy and money savings. The average saving from using the HEAT app is estimated to be $\pounds 70$ a year.

The app was developed by Energy Saving Trust, the UK's leading trusted expert organisation regarding home energy, and is being rolled out by the Hertfordshire Climate Change and Sustainability Partnership (HCCSP) – making it available to all Hertfordshire residents.
