PRECEPT

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On The Farm

It seems as if it has not stopped raining this past month. Goodness knows how many ml of rain there has been. No land work has taken place these past 6 weeks or more. Luckily all land work took place before the heavy rain arrived. I've just been told we've had 135ml of rain over the last 3 months.

The Government has just appointed a new DEFRA Secretary of State to look after farmers and the environment. We have had 5 Ministers over the past 6 years. Do any of them really know much about agriculture?

This week we had a meeting with my Agriculture & Environmental consultant to plan our farm's future! With the new government's Sustainable Farming Incentive (SFI) Policy, which changes almost monthly, this mainly means taking land out of production. I will receive a modest payment for alleged environmental benefits, but then I have reduced my farm's output. Could my farm remain profitable going down this route? My job is to have a barn full of crops to feed the nation, not to import goods from the other side of the world. Goods which are produced to a lower standard than ours.

During these past 3 months, a steady flow of wheat sales has taken place, with about half of our crop being sold to local mills through my main Grain Merchant.

Last March I bought 5 little Hereford steers. It has given us so much pleasure having them on the farm and being able to rotate them around rather small grass fields.

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Be Ready For Cold Weather

It's important to protect yourself and others as much as possible from cold weather conditions.

Cold weather health advice

- Keep an eye on the weather so you can prepare for a cold spell stock up on home medicines for minor illnesses from your pharmacy or supermarket.
- Take care if it is slippery. If you do need to go out, wear shoes with a good grip, and consider keeping salt and sand mixture handy to grit paths.
- Have torches handy around the home (with some spare batteries too) in case of power cuts and try to keep your mobile phone fully charged.
- If you're not very mobile, are 65 or over, or have a health condition, such as heart or lung disease, heat your home to at least 18C.
- Keep your bedroom at 18C all night if you can and keep bedroom windows closed.
- If you're under 65, healthy and active, you can safely have your home cooler than 18C, as long as you're comfortable.
- Use a hot water bottle or electric blanket to keep warm in bed but do not use both at the same time. Turn off blankets when you get into bed, unless there is a thermostatic control for safe all-night use.
- Have at least one hot meal a day eating regularly helps keep you warm.
- Have hot drinks regularly.
- To reduce the risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), babies should sleep in rooms heated to between 16C and 20C.
- Draw curtains at dusk and keep doors closed to block out draughts.
- Get your heating system checked regularly by a qualified professional.

Please check in on anyone who may struggle in cold weather.

St Peter's Stewardship Campaign

This is to tell you the results of our Stewardship Campaign – so far. It was launched in September and all those who have been supporting St Peter's in one way or another, or whose names are included on the Electoral Roll, should have received a letter from Susannah asking that giving levels be reviewed - with the hope that financial support would be increased to meet increased costs and a likely deficit.

The appeal was quite late in the year so the impact in 2023 could only be quite modest and, indeed, it has been with receipts in 2023 only about £1,500 higher. But for 2024 regular standing order giving should be over £5,000 higher which is very welcome.

However, it is hoped that those whose giving levels have remained unchanged for several years and who have not yet responded so far will do so soon.

We appreciate that everyone's personal costs have increased recently – but that applies to the church just as much as private households, especially in the case of heating bills.

So if you are yet to respond, we would ask you to do so please as soon as possible. Thank you.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

I hope that you have had a peaceful Christmas and I wish you a very Happy New Year. December is always a very busy time for the church of course, as it is one of the principal festivals. I trust that you have been able to attend a service or a Christmas Event here at the church or elsewhere in the village. Christmas would not be Christmas without carols and the story of the birth of Jesus.

Thank you to Vicky de Naeyer and her team who managed to run another successful Christmas Bazaar, raising nearly £3,000 for the church at the end of November - a wonderful result. I was too full of an awful cold to attend but I understand the tables were reeling from the amount of goods donated for this. Thank you to those who gave goods to sell and to those who came to support it.

During November we had our Quinquennial inspection by our new Diocesan architect, James Ford. This is a five yearly, in-depth look at the building and how we have cared for it. James was very complimentary about St Peter's which he thought was in better shape than many other churches of a similar age. We have yet to receive his report, but it is unlikely to contain a long list of necessary repairs. Meanwhile we have had the chancel/vestry roof cleaned of moss and a few tiles replaced.

Susannah was present at the Bazaar to show off the model of our proposed new meeting room annex with updated accessible toilets, kitchen, and much needed storage space. She was delighted to say that village people continue to be very supportive of this venture. Indeed, we have had a pile of letters of support which we had ready to show the Diocesan Advisory Committee who attended a meeting with us in November. Ours is a Grade 1 listed building so the great and the good from many organisations, such as Historic England, came to give their comments on our need for the new building, its position and design. It is clear that they certainly understand the need for the new facilities. We shall continue to work with them on the design and siting of the building.

Visitors to the church have been able to see the model and design of the building during December. This has included the Visiting Churches U3A group from Ware who came one Tuesday morning to hear a talk about the history of the church, its various memorials inside and outside in the churchyard, and the life of our church now. They enjoyed looking round the church and admiring our tapestry kneelers, a different one of which has been on the front page of the village website each day from 1 December as our on-line advent calendar.

Our Bellringers have been busy this autumn training new ringers and carrying out special peals. It is always lovely to hear the bells. People who live as far away as Panshanger often say how much they enjoy hearing them ringing out over the fields. As usual they will ring out the Old and ring in the New Year on New Year's Eve.

We have had a letter of thanks from the Stevenage Food shed to which donations from the shop and church go each month and particularly for the goods received after Harvest Festival. Support to the hungry and needy is ever with us, so thank you to all who give to this cause.

The church is very cold during the winter months, and we are always looking for ways to reduce our costs for heating, so we have been pleased to receive a report from ESOS on our use of energy in the church and ways to improve that. This investigation was carried out with the help of a grant from the diocese. The ideas will be incorporated in our plans for the new building.

We always have to be on our toes for anything unexpected so when I received a phone call late one grim, cold afternoon in November, I hotfooted it down to the churchyard to find that the standpipe for use in the new part of the Memorial Garden was gushing water everywhere. Fortunately, Nick came with a long twizzle twirl to turn off the stop cock. The cold appears to have led to the pipes breaking. We actually turn off the water in the winter both there and at the vestry outside pipe to avoid such things happening. Please bear this in mind if you bring flowers for graves or want a drink for your dog during such periods as you will probably find the water turned off. The winter can be a sad time for us all, with poor light keeping spirits low, people being ill or losing loved ones. If you are ill or in poor spirits or if you are recently bereaved, do get in touch with Susannah or any in the Welwyn team who are always there to give support.

When do the Christmas Decorations Come Down?

Tradition has it that Christmas decorations stay up until **Twelfth Night.** When is Twelfth Night?

The short answer is **Friday 5th January**.

According to the Church of England, Twelfth Night "refers to the night before Epiphany, the day when the nativity story tells us that the three wise men visited the infant Jesus" - and Epiphany is on January 6th.

Some people will be marking Saturday 6th January as Twelfth Night, as the 6th is technically the 12th day *after* Christmas. But they'll be a day late.

Popular superstition states that it's bad luck to leave your decorations up after the 5th. Christmas decorations not taken down by Twelfth

Night should be left up until Candlemas Day (2nd February) and then taken down.





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Luton Airport Expansion – How Much Growth Is Too Much?

As COP28 continues, Cllr Richard Roberts, leader of Hertfordshire County Council, criticises Luton Airport's plans to increase passenger numbers to 32 million a year.

Airport expansion is a polarising issue, with those set to benefit from the employment and economic boost in favour, while those adversely impacted by the negative effects of increased noise, traffic and pollution firmly opposed. Hertfordshire County Council falls categorically into the latter camp.

The county council was opposed to the proposals in 2013 to increase capacity to 18 million passengers per year and more recently to 19 million, predominantly on noise grounds, but also on the uncertainty in relation to the pressures this would place on local infrastructure. Both of those proposals were permitted and of course communities know only too well the adverse consequences of the airport's substantial growth and the resultant inability to comply with the noise control set out in the planning permissions. The county council has welcomed and is very supportive of proposals to change flightpaths to try to protect communities, but persistent delays and distant timeframes are incredibly frustrating. For many, the existing airport is already causing too many problems.

But there is something very different about the latest proposal to increase passenger numbers to 32 million per year – the sheer scale of growth, the extent of the area over which the impacts could be felt, and the timeframes involved. We believe this expansion will have a profoundly negative impact on the lives of many people and communities across Hertfordshire, with increased levels of noise, pressures upon infrastructure, and detrimental impacts upon our landscape, including on the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The county council has committed substantial resources to engage with the process, the purpose of which it twofold. Firstly, so that Government can be in no doubt as to the scale of and reasons for opposition from Hertfordshire. Secondly, to ensure that, should Government decide it should be allowed, we get the best deal we can to protect communities and secure funding for any infrastructure improvements to mitigate future impacts.

So how much is too much? Well, many communities in Hertfordshire would say what we already have is too much, but 32 million passengers per year?

That's too much for sure.

Rizz Named 2023 Word Of The Year By Oxford University Press

"**Rizz**" has officially been named the 2023 word of the year by Oxford University Press.

The internet slang term, short for "charisma", is defined as style, charm, or attractiveness, and the ability to attract a romantic or sexual partner.

It was first recorded in 2022 but went viral in June when actor Tom Holland told Buzzfeed: "I have no rizz whatsoever. I have limited rizz."

Usage surged and ended up pushing the word ahead of other 2023 contenders which included:

"Swiftie" (an enthusiastic fan of the singer Taylor Swift),

"**de-influencing**"(the practice of discouraging people from buying particular products, or of encouraging people to reduce their consumption of material goods, especially via social media),

"beige flag" (a character trait that indicates that a partner or potential partner is boring or lacks originality; also a trait or habit, especially of a partner or potential partner, viewed as extremely characteristic, but not distinctly good or bad)

"**prompt**" (an instruction given to an artificial intelligence program, algorithm, etc., which determines or influences the content it generates) and "**situationship**" (a romantic or sexual relationship that is not considered to be formal or established).

"The spike in usage data for 'rizz' goes to prove that words and phrases that evolve from internet culture are increasingly becoming part of day-to-day vernacular and will continue to shape language trends in the future," the President of Oxford Languages Casper Grathwohl said.

"Rizz" can also be used as a verb, in phrases such as "to rizz up", which means to attract, seduce or chat up a person.

The fact that the word has expanded into other parts of speech like this signals it is becoming more prominent in language, Oxford University Press researchers said.

The word of the year for 2022 was "**goblin mode**" – "the behaviour of someone who wants to feel comfortable and do and eat whatever they want, not caring about trying to be clean, healthy, or attractive, or about pleasing or impressing other people".

Mr Grathwohl said: "Given that last year 'goblin mode' resonated with so many of us after the pandemic, it's interesting to see a contrasting word like rizz come to the forefront, perhaps speaking to a prevailing mood of 2023, where more of us are opening ourselves up after a challenging few years and finding confidence in who we are."

Also the money was so sore clipped that there was no remedy but to have it renewed." - Stowe's Chronicle.
