Welwyn Parish Council Neighbourhood Plan

Welwyn Parish Council forwarded their draft Neighbourhood Plan to the Parish Council as part of their informal consultation. The Parish Council havewritten supporting the Lower Minram Valley Initiative Minram Green Valley Corridor and the aim of achieving Local Landscape Designation for the whole of the Minram Valley and so enable even greater protection for the precious chalk streamenvironment of the River Minram. They also acknowledged the involvement of David Rixson and his teamwho have done an excellent job and continue to have the Parish Council's full support.

Gas Pipeline Markers at St Peters Church, Tewin

Tewin Parish Council have written to Cadent asking to have the recently installed, very prominent gas pipeline markers removed from the driveway of St Peter's Church as

they are not in keeping with the character and surroundings of a 1,000 yr old, Grade 1 listed church.

Notes from an Apiary

As I write this at the end of 2023 the bees are well and truly tucked up for the winter. They served us well through spring and summer and we hope anyone that has tried their honey has enjoyed it.

The beekeepers' preparations for winter start in late summer with a prophylactic treatment to reduce parasitic mites known as Varroa. Following this they are fed syrup to ensure they have sufficient supplies of energy to get them through winter. Hives are subject to invasion from small field mammals, so the entrance is reduced using "mice guards" to prevent access to these small creatures. The hives are covered in fine mesh net to discourage woodpeckers on the lookout for forage. A woodpecker can make quite a mess of a beehive! We use a fine garden net sold to protect plants, it's easy to use and effective as the birds don't like the feel of it under their claws.

Bees don't hibernate or go into a dormant form over winter. Below about 10°C for more than a couple of days they will probably die. To survive they form a ball, circulating in and out to keep a stable temperature in the centre at about 32°C, protecting the queen. If the queen dies over winter the colony will certainly perish so it is most important, she is kept warm. Honeybees cannot survive winter on their own so again they rely upon the collective strength of the colony.

The winter months November through to March are quiet time in the apiary but not for the beekeeper. There is plenty to do. Preparations for next season are well underway. Cleaning and weather proofing hive parts and equipment is a long and messy business but essential to keeping a healthy apiary that the bees can enjoy and thrive in.

So now it is just fingers crossed that the colonies will survive winter and emerge strong in the spring.

On The Farm

As I write this in February bureaucracy has gone mad adding to the amount of paper I have to attend to.

I must mention the news about the farmers in the EU demonstrating or protesting against the new EU farming policies. If they were a bit nearer I would be there with my tractor.

I understand from several of my farming friends that they have had unannounced visits from the Health & Safety Executive. They just turn up and want an inspection of your farm, your records, to see your machinery and to ask you how you run your business. This worries me! So I asked my National Farmers Union for an update of my 5 year old policy. The cost was almost £2,000 and a morning of my time checking all my machines, like the PTO Guards, and my electrical records. He wanted to look into every tractor, to see how clean it was, no bits in the footwell, clean glass, did I have no smoking signs inside the cab. Luckily neither Martyn nor I smoke but I have been advised to put a sign in or I could be fined £1,000, for not having signs in the cab. Martyn has been putting up signs everywhere around the farmyard, just to keep up with current laws.

This week I travelled to Dunmow, Essex to attend a Sprayer Course, for which I get 10 points, which will let me use my own sprayer, to spray my own crops. This happens every year. What worries me is that a number of fungicides and herbicides we use on our crops are being banned. The pests and diseases, like Septoria, Yellow Rust and all Broadleaf weeds, are getting stronger every year. If we don't control these diseases we will have a poor crop of small grains, no good to anyone.

Luckily we had a dry week starting the 29th of January which let Martyn plough the 50 acres of Top Prairie Field, a field in which we plan to sow peas. Later in the week he had a full day spreading fertilizer. We hope for some drier weather in the future.

Chinese Concert Pianist To Perform In Welwyn On Saturday 9th March

The 'Second Saturday Recital' on 9th March in St Mary's Church, Welwyn will feature the outstanding pianist Ke Ma. The concert starts at 12 noon, lasts for an hour, and is free to attend, with a retiring collection for the artist's fee and church funds at the end. All are welcome.

Ke Ma had the distinction of being the first Chinese pianist to give a recital in York Minster.

Ke was born in 1994 in China. She studied at the Royal Academy of Music in London, earning a Masters with distinction in 2017. She is currently pursuing Doctoral study at Guildhall School of Music and Drama. She has won top prizes at international competitions including 1st Prize at the 2016 Concours International de la vie de Maisons-Laffitte and 1st Prize at the 2014 Shenzhen Competition (China).

In 2017 Ke made her debut at Wigmore Hall. She has given concerts across the UK, in France, Germany, Poland, the US and Canada. Recent engagements include recitals at the Purcell Room, Kings Place, and the Chopin Festival at the Fisher Center in Bard College, New York.

A committed chamber musician, Ke Ma has given a recital at Wigmore Hall and recorded music by Vieuxtemps for Champs Hill Records with star violist Timothy Ridout.

Team Vicar's Letter

When I was 17 our Rector in Wedwyn, Terence Wenham, was dying from a brain tumour. Hewas the loveliest of men. As a youth group we spent a weekend away where we had been thinking about death and resurrection and read the book *Hope for the Flowers*. It is a story about caterpillars searching for the meaning of life. It ends with their mystical transformation into butterflies.

When we returned Terence invited us to his house to see him We arrived to find someone had given him a caterpillar house where they had cocooned. On the day we came to visit these caterpillars had broken out of their chrysalises and, with Terence, we went into the garden to set these brand new butterflies free.

I will never forget the shock as Terence, a man who had once been large and strong, stumbled clumsily with his nowweakened frame and collapsed into the stinging nettles. He, being him, laughed andwe pulled him up, but I was dreadfully upset to see him like this. We opened the box: the butterflies took flight.

I also remember sitting with a friend, a practising Catholic who had a very down-to -earth no-nonsense spirituality. Shortly after she was diagnosed with cancer, I found her sitting in her front garden with a cup of tea. Joining her on her seat, she reflected how peaceful she felt knowing that her life was drawing to a close. "It's quite exciting" she said "to think I'm finally going to knowwhat it's all about".

Onewinter afternoon she organised a group of neighbours into planting crocus bulbs along the verge of the roadwhere we lived, and although rather frail at this point, she was with us insisting she did the same.

When she was in the hospice I wrote to her to let her know the crocuses were poking their heads through. They are, I wrote, such a wonderful sign of hope and new life. I promised to send her a photograph when they blossomed. The day they finally opened in a blaze of yellow, bursting through the darkness of endless winter months, was the day she died. I'm sure it's significant.

The frailty of human life. The strength of spirit. The hope of resurrection. Butterflies and crocuses.

I wish you all a most holy and blessed Easter. Susannah

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

Wehave had a busymonth in the church during January and early February. As usual we left the Nativity scene on the South Altar until the end of the month and Candlemas. This is the celebration of the moment when the baby Jesus, the Light of the World, was brought to the temple for the first time and was seen by Simeon and Anna. There was an evening candlelit service at StMary's, Welwynwhich was well attended

Messy church began again with a celebration and understanding of Candlemas. The children coloured a new picture of a candle symbolising Christ, which can be seen on the wall behind the altar.

During January youwill have heard the bellringers one Saturday afternoon when they held a District Meeting at St Peter's. They have also been keeping an eye on the clock which has been misbehaving a bit, stopping a few times. The LHD lights in the nave have also been flashing at us. I think it's the cold that upsets everything! It all makes work for the working man to do. The flashing bulbs will be replaced shortly and are still underwarranty.

Susannah held a discussion evening with couples who are planning their weddings this year at St Peter's. Wewish all those who are embarking on this new phase of their lives the very best of luck for their future happiness. Couples who have experienced themarriage talks have been surprised to find them aworthwhile use of their time.

The standpipe in the newMamrial Garden was repaired this month. Thank you to plumber, John Griffiths. We have had the spirelet (our wee spire on top of the church tower) inspected this month as our diocesan architect thought he could see daylight when he went up in the tower in November. Indeed, there is a small place where the covering has risen but it will not

incur huge costs to repair. The damp in the north wall gives more cause for concern but we have taken advice on that and will be dealing with it. Thank you to Friends of Tewin for their generous donation towards the essential repairs to the north chancel roof.

Themodel of our church with a proposal for new facilities was on display in the church throughout December and January. It is not the agreed design. It is one idea, from several we have had, encompassing all the needs of the church at pre-

sent. We have had an opportunity to review the views of manywithin the congregation and from the wider commity, including representatives of the diocese, heritage organisations and the East Herts planning authority. Everyone agrees that we have a need for improved facilities. The project team is working closely with the diocese to find a solution which will be acceptable. This will take time. Manwhile we have been working with a fundraising consultant on a feasibility study to see whether we can raise the funding required. This is for a fixed fee. She will not be doing the fund raising and will not attract a percentage of the funds raised.

You will have an opportunity to ask how we are progressing on this project at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on Sunday 28th April at 10.30am at the church. Do come. All are welcome.

Our Lent course will be continuing until 22^{nd} March. This is at my house 30 Godfries Close for 12.00-2.00pm on Fridays when we shall share a soup lunch followed by a discussion about paintings on display this month, in the Focolare Centre in WGC, of the Methodist church collection of twentieth century religious art.

Finally – a date for your diaries – the Annual Spring cleaning of the church will take place on Friday 10th and Saturday 11th May. The Tewin Grand Prix

You do not have to pay to watch or wait for weekends to see the Tewin Grand Prix. Each morning that I walk our dog

above the orchard I witness the racing cars performing, even in icy conditions, to rush into blind corners like the ones where frustrated Upper Green householders have put up their own 30mph signs, to no avail.

When I walk on Upper Green we have to cross next to Piggotts where the ancient right of way route by track, path and bridleway meet the road that cars speed round before they turn the blind corner where they might meet a line of ramblers or individuals with dogs crossing. Some cyclists even increase their speed to make the 30mph illuminated sign show red (shouting to egg each other on). Where would they go? Into people or pets, or into one of the trees by hitting the bank here? I once photographed the number plate of a car that was racing down the road here and had easily already turned the sign to 'Too Fast'.

I sent a copy of the image to the police only to be told to mind my own business. I never contact them now anyway, since they also ignored over 2000 thefts over the years from our little gate shop and we finally gave up and packed it in. They said we should not sell things at the gate.

If I see a speed trap, the police dress up in fluorescent tops to show themselves and the drivers can flash each next car in turn to warn them. All these drivers fully know the road is restricted. The police (or anyone) only need to hide out of sight in the large bush in the open field by the bend in Upper Green and record with a camera the deadly drivers to pick out the daily threats to the village, its people and animal life in their rat runs.


