The presentation of the Tewin Society Award took place in Tewin Memorial Hall on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> January, immediately before the THACS AGM.

Mavis Haggar started the presentation by putting the Tewin Society Award into its full context. She described the formation, achievement and ultimate demise of the Tewin Society and explained that a modest amount of money was passed to THACS by the Tewin Society when it closed. This was for the purpose of honouring one local resident a year for continuing to uphold the ideals of the original society.

A new Tewin Society Award (TSA) committee was formed to manage this, consisting of Mavis Haggar, Linda Adams and David Gregg, under the chairmanship of Ray Keppler. This committee established the rules governing the award (essentially referring to the Tewin Society principles) and drew up ten criteria for evaluating a nomination based on the aims of Tewin Society. The criteria include:- unpaid work done to preserve our local heritage, to enhance the environment, to conserve Tewin's natural resources; unpaid work that is an inspiration to others and involves others, with lasting effects.

Once this groundwork was done, nominations could be invited from anyone (except the committee) and marking would follow a set formula. Of course the greater the proof, the more marks gained. Based on these criteria, selection can be made, impersonally and fairly. This process was used for the first award in 2011, leading to Margaret Knight's name being the first on the Tewin Society Award plaque.

The same approach was followed for the 2012 award and, as a result, the winner of the Tewin Society Award for 2012 is Elizabeth Wilson. She was nominated for the award based on her excellent work leading the production of the book A History of Tewin by the People of Tewin.

To commemorate VE day in 1995, Elizabeth and Ben Roberts shared with the village a collection of facts and details about Tewin,

### Seven Acres Development Update

Two properties are now complete and one property has been sold and is due to complete in the first quarter of this year. Works on the shared ownership units will commence during February and demolition of Seven Acres will start once the mains services are disconnected.

## Hertfordshire Highways

Herts County Councillor Bryan Hammond is responsible for the Highways Locality Budget ("HLB") which amounts to £90,000 pa and is split into 2 portions: the capital section and the remedial portion - the split is usually 60/40. Unfortunately Bryan Hammond is standing down in May and as a result any new proposals for the Highways Locality Budget are subject to approval by the new Herts County Councillor. Currently the remainder of the patching works on Orchard Road is scheduled for the next financial year, 2013/2014. Tewin Parish Council agreed to propose reinstatement of the kerbing along the northern edge of Lower Green to Bryan Hammond as small remedial works under the Highways Locality budget for the next financial year.

The Parish Council expressed concern at the lack of action in repairing potholes despite many of them being reported online many times and being extremely hazardous. Bryan agreed to investigate and advised the Parish Council and parishioners to continue to report them online.

## May Pond Green

A review of the trees on May Pond Green has been completed and the Parish Council agreed to accept the quote from Kirkham Contracting to fell the dead horse chestnut tree.

## Transport

The 388 bus has been very unreliable recently and several complaints have been received and passed on to the HCC Passenger Transport Unit and Centrebus. The Parish Council has been advised that they are looking into the situation and will respond in due course.

When you buy flowers always unwrap them and trim about 1 or 2 inches off the stems, give them a good drink of water and some space. Put flower food in the water if you wish, or a few drops of bleach - sounds odd but it works! Remember to remove the leaves that will be below the water level.

The roses that we buy in the shops invariably come from places like Kenya and have had their stems treated before their long journey. Take them out of their wrapping, trim the stems, stand them in a good size vase of water and let them 'breathe' and drink. Some people suggest that for roses and chrysanthemums, after trimming the stems, they should be dipped in very hot water for a moment and then placed straight into cold water. If your roses go limp after a short time, and the heads drop down, re-trim the stems and put them in a tall vase or container with water up to their necks, say overnight, usually they make an amazing recovery!

Daffodils excrete a substance that is poisonous to other flowers (even handling of the stems can give some people a rash) and therefore, preferably, should not be mixed with any other flowers in a vase. However, they can be soaked first for 1-2 hours, rinsed and put in a vase of clean water, hopefully, others flowers will not react adversely to them. When trimming the stems of spray or single carnations, do not cut just below the leaf notch, but just above they enjoy their drink a little more!

Finally, a quote from a book called 'Old Wives' Lore for Gardeners' by Maureen and Bridget Boland:

"All flowers will last longer in water if foxgloves are incorporated in the arrangements. If their presence is not considered suitable for a particular artistic effect, add foxglove tea to the water:- pour boiling water on a handful of foxglove leaves or flowers and leave them to steep overnight. For delphiniums and larkspur add sugar: for daffodils and narcissi add charcoal or camphor. Wrap the stalks of tulips, as soon as they are cut, in newspaper and stand them for several hours up to their necks in water".

# **BOX CLEVER – AND GIFT AID IT – A WINNING COMBINATION**

Most members of the St Peter's congregation give their financial support by one of two methods – bank standing orders or the weekly Free Will offering envelopes. Both these arrangements provide an opportunity for you to make your regular gift to St Peter's, whether or not you attend a service each week or month. After all, the church's costs continue week by week even if you're not there yourself!

Standing orders have the advantage of regular *automatic* payments throughout the year whereas the envelopes allow users to adjust their giving more easily to changing circumstances.

New boxes of envelopes have been ordered to start in April and some extra boxes for anyone who attends St Peter's and would like to start supporting it financially in this way. We have welcomed a number of new people to St Peter's and it would be wonderful if they were to join this weekly envelope scheme.

*Gift Aid* tax recoveries continue to be a valuable source of income, boosting our regular giving income by about £8,000 in each of the last two years, that's almost 25% extra thanks to the Government, at no cost to the individual. So if you pay tax on any of your income, please make sure your giving to St Peter's is tax efficient with a *Gift Aid* declaration or by using the special yellow *Gift Aid* envelopes. These envelopes are specifically for Gift Aid donations by tax-payers; so please only use them if you are a tax-payer and fill in your name and address.

If you would like a box of weekly envelopes, bank standing order form, *Gift Aid* declaration form, or just some help on any of these subjects, please speak to me in church or give me a call. I shall be happy to hear from you. All details of giving are kept strictly confidential.

Finally, a very sincere thank you to all who have given to St Peter's over the past year, whatever the method used and whatever the amount involved. We couldn't flourish without you.

# Vicar's letter

Perhaps the worst thing in my wardrobe is an unworn item, an 'I  $\clubsuit$  Butlins' T-shirt. A present from my husband brought back from a weekend he shared with friends which, thankfully, church duties rescued me from. For a man who loves fields, quiet and real-ale pubs he went sulkily, but surprised himself by having a good time – returning armed with T-shirts and mugs bearing the same logo [the handles fell off a week later]. Sometimes when we have a good experience, we want to share something of it with those we love.

I have a rather nicer present brought back from New Zealand by my mother-in-law. It's a Paua shell – a large, ugly, rough exterior but bearing the secret of an exquisite interior – a blend of iridescent colours, all the rainbow shades which glimmer and shine in the most beautiful of manners. I love this shell, because it speaks to me of my experience of resurrection, of hidden joys, unseen potential and beauty found in an unexpected place.

Despite excited tales from my husband of multi-ride water parks and mother-in-laws endless photographs – their experience is not mine. The joy they gained from their trip will never be fully possessed by me in the gift of a shell and tacky T-shirt.

It is similar with my experience of resurrection. We can tell the story, examine it cerebrally, but to truly grasp its beauty and power it needs to be touched, tasted, and gazed upon. It needs to be something we travel into ourselves and understand deep within our core. Thomas, a disciple, demonstrated this in his need to touch Jesus' wounds. Personal experience is the key.

So this Easter I would encourage you to search out the story for yourselves. Find its clues in the hidden treasures of springtime, notice joy in the most unexpected places, know hope and potential in your own life and of those you love. To hear, feel, touch and taste Christ's beauty and life in worship.

You may not be able to bring back a T-shirt for your friends, but perhaps through your own experiences they can glimpse Easter themselves.
