"Everyone should have a bed to sleep on, a table to eat at, a chair to sit on"

This All Saints Church, Datchworth and community project collects locally recycled furniture and other household items and delivers them free of charge to where they are most needed.

Over the past 3 years a team of volunteers has collected and delivered hundreds of items like beds and bed linen, tables and chairs, cots and high chairs etc. to families and individuals facing financial hardship or other extreme difficulties.

Through the project, good quality items, many of which may have otherwise ended up at the dump, have been delivered to homes where they have made a real difference.

Furniture Friends is a special type of recycling scheme as it doesn't need to make money or ask for money for the items it passes on. The project tries to take items from donor to recipient as efficiently as possible, matching up referred needs (from local health visitors, social workers, children's centres etc) with items offered. Those involved in the project are very grateful for all the items donated by friends in Datchworth and other local villages and for all the support they have received.

Furniture Friends are currently in need of additional dry, clean storage as they have recently moved out of a previous storage barn. If you have any local storage which is accessible by a van, or know of anyone else who may be able to help, they would be really grateful if you could contact them.

Storage is vital, and although Furniture Friends have recently needed to take a break from collecting and delivering, they plan to restart in the New Year.

New Boundary Wall at Sevenacres.

The new boundary wall has recently been completed by the side of the show house at Sevenacres. The course of the wall follows the original Sevenacres property line. It stands somewhat in front of the old Sevenacres garden wall, but part of the

grass in front of that wall always belonged to Sevenacres. The boundary in this area has a definite zigzag caused partly by the outline of the original May Pond which used to lie in this vicinity. When the Taylor Wimpey sales hut is removed, the area behind the wall will become part of the garden of the show house. The village green outside the wall will be re-instated.

Gulleys on Lower Green

Following on from the camera inspection of the gulleys along Lower Green on 29th October, District Service Agent, Raj Goutam, confirmed our original report that there is a break in the pipe which will require remedial works. Their works programme is currently full until the end of April 2015 so works will be arranged in the next financial year.

Cobbling on Lower Green

The Parish Council unanimously agreed to accept a quote from Morris Gordon to install four sq meters of granite sets in 200mm concrete on the point of Lower Green closest to Tewin Memorial Hall.

Flooding on Churchfield Road

The Parish Council has agreed to raise the issue of flooding on Churchfield Road near the junction with the B1000 with Herts Highways.

Christmas Tree and Carols

The Parish Council would like to thank Friends of Tewin for beautifully decorating the Christmas tree this year and for helping organising a fantastic carol singing event. They would also like to thank Mr. V. Murray for kindly PAT testing the tree lights for us.

Tewin Pavilion

The Parish Council would like to thank both John Sheridan and Steve Stott for all their time and effort they kindly donated in setting up the Tewin Pavilion CIC and helping run it successfully over the last 4 years.

Repair Works to Upper Green Car Park

The Parish Council unanimously agreed to accept the quote to infill the potholes, distribute and compact 20mm shingle over the affected areas of Upper Green car park.

Precept

The Council reviewed the precept options for the financial year ending 31.3.2016 and, in accordance with the Financial Regulations of the Council, the Council unanimously agreed that the precept be increased by 1.8% from £28,000 to £28,500 in line with inflation.

Monday 12th January 2015 – Tewin Society Award Presentation, *THACS* AGM and Talk About Panshanger Park

There will be a full, varied and interesting evening at Tewin Memorial Hall on Monday 12th January 2015, starting at 7:30pm. No booking is necessary and admission is free, so please resist any temptation to hibernate, grab your coats and come along!

The presentation of the Tewin Society Award will start the evening. The deadline for submitting nominations for the Tewin Society Award has passed but, at the time of writing this, the evaluations have yet to be made. If you want to find out who won the award this year and why, then come along to the announcement and presentation.

The presentation will be followed immediately by the *THACS* AGM and members have received information about that already. This is an important meeting for *THACS* and all members are urged to attend. Non-members are very welcome but not able to vote.

After the AGM there will be a break for refreshments followed, at about 9pm, by a talk about Panshanger Park. Our guest speaker is Kate Harwood and her subject will be *The Evolving Landscape of Panshanger Park - Past and Future?*

Kate Harwood is one of the founding members and officers of the Friends of Panshanger Park (FPP) and the Conservation & Planning Officer for Hertfordshire Gardens Trust. In both roles she has been closely involved with Panshanger Park for many years. As a garden historian she has researched and helped formulate the FPP ideas for the future of the park.

Panshanger has a fascinating history going back to prehistoric times but the park as we know it evolved during the 18th century. Both the leading designers of the day, Capability Brown and Humphry Repton, worked on Panshanger Park and made it into a glorious English landscape park. The renowned art and architecture historian, Sir Nikolaus Pevsner, called it "one of Repton's most perfect schemes", the queen in his string of pearls which are the estates along the Mimram valley. The Victorian era gave us interesting water management technology and grand formal gardens around the house, but the 20th century saw decline and exploitation. The FPP hope the 21st century will see it somewhat restored to its former splendour and opened to all.The evening should end at about 10pm. In summary, it's a free evening full of items of interest to Tewin residents, in a comfortable local venue:- well worth coming along to.

Keep Warm and Well This Winter

Top tips for staying healthy this winter:

• Have the flu vaccine – it's free for over 65s, pregnant women, two and three year-olds, those with existing health conditions and carers – contact your GP or practice nurse. If you don't fall into one of these groups you can get one for around £10 at lots of supermarkets and pharmacies locally.

• Heat your home to at least 18C to minimise the risk to health, if heating your whole house is a problem heat your living room during the day and your bedroom just before you go up to sleep.

• If you can, get up and move around. If your mobility is more limited, do some chair exercises to help you stay warm and active.

• Layer up – wear a few layers of thin clothing rather than one thick layer.

• Good grips – if you need to go outside wear shoes with slip resistant, good grip soles.

• Eat hot food and drink warm drinks.

• Stock up on store cupboard basics such as soup, tinned fish and long life milk and medicines like paracetamol and ibuprofen in case you can't get out of your home for a couple of days.

• Undertake energy efficiency improvements to your home, or encourage your landlord to do so.

- Insulate water pipes and protect them from the cold.
- Get your boiler serviced by a registered engineer.
- Keep a list of useful and emergency contacts by your phone and add local organisations and charities who support older people.

• Look out for older friends and neighbours, those with existing health conditions and young children.

Herts Healthy Homes, a free information and support service that helps you stay healthy and safe in your own home, can help you stay healthy throughout the year by providing support with:

• A home visit to give advice and practical assistance to help you stay well and active.

Advice on paying your bills and budgeting.

• Draught proofing, emergency heaters, fire safety and home security checks.

Team Vicar's Letter

From would-be-popstars in TV talent competitions, to ex-politicians eating bugs in the jungle, everybody, it seems, is going on a journey these days. But while it is perhaps an over used and seemingly clichéd phrase the image of a journey has been a meaningful picture in the Judaeo-Christian life since the earliest of times.

The Hebrew Scriptures map the travels of Abraham, Moses and the Israelites looking in search of a physical, but also deeply spiritual homeland. In Advent the words of the prophets from their time have cried out into ours, for paths to be made straight for the coming of God. In Datchworth people have literally been invited to journey with Mary and Joseph as they have travelled from household to household, looking for people to invite them in.

And now this month we look to the journey of the Magi, that exotic bunch of travellers (who incidentally the bible never specifies were kings, or three, or indeed all men) moving in search of the new king they had seen in the stars. The spiritual tradition of pilgrimage mirrors this pursuit; of moving closer, in small steps, towards the place where God is found.

A New Year is a time many of us might reflect on how well we are travelling in our own lives. Whether we resolve to eat less or read more it is good, from time to time, to take stock of the way in which we are heading and perhaps tweak our direction. Yet the Magi teach us there is a destination even more desirable than trim bodies and ordered lives.

On Wednesday the 21st January there is an invitation to attend a special evening Pilgrimage at St Albans Abbey. We journey in cars to the Cathedral to begin with refreshments, then a member of the Abbey community will lead us on a pilgrimage tour of the Cathedral. The tour will be reflective and prayerful, looking at how physical elements within the building mirror the steps in the journey of faith. We then close the evening with Compline in the Quire. Places are limited and so please contact me soon or add your name to the list in church if you would like to come with us.

The New Year now lies ahead. I pray that whatever path it takes for you, you will know the peace of Christ who travels by your side.

As many of you will know, we are extending the churchyard so that it can meet the needs of the local Tewin community for both burials and the interment of ashes for several decades to come. To delineate the new area adjacent to the present graveyard we shall be planting a hedge with suitable rabbit-proof fencing along its length. This work has had to be put off until 2015 because of planning delays and, now, the winter crop in the field; but it will go ahead as soon as it is possible and we are extremely grateful to Friends of Tewin for a donation of £860 towards the associated costs.

<u>Tewin Wood - From Forest to Prestigious Housing Development</u> (Cont'd)

Last month we read about the early days of the area known as Tewin Wood. How it became part of the estates of 7th Earl Cowper in 1870 providing timber and fuel for Panshanger House and good game hunting. It then passed through marriage to Lord and Lady Desborough in 1913, to be sold by them in 1925 to a 4-man consortium. Three of the four, all named Brown, were timber merchants and felled and extracted much of the timber. On the 1st January 1932, the Browns sold their shares in the Estate to the 4th member of the consortium, Edward Elsmore, who set up the Homeland Garden Estates Limited with the intention of selling plots for residential use. The agent for the estate was Albert Bishop. On the 7th January 1932 the title to Homeland Garden Estates Limited passed, on one part to his sister-in-law, Sarah Susan Innes Bishop, and the other part to Mary Edith Bishop, her daughter. At that time, both ladies lived in Maida Vale, London. Sarah Susan Innes Bishop died intestate on the 20th March 1944 and her share passed to her daughter Mary who now became the sole owner.

Due to the economic depression of the 1930's and the threat of a new European War, sales of plots came to a standstill until after1946 when a few were sold. In 1952, being unable to service the loan originally obtained to purchase the Wood, the Title of the remaining plots of a total of about 40 acres, was transferred to Barclays Bank Limited.

Miss Mary Edith Bishop, who had moved to No.7. Firs Walk in about 1950 sold, on behalf of Homeland Garden Estates Limited, a few more plots until 1963 when all those remaining were sold to the property developers, Prowtings, who rapidly built large houses on them. New roads were built and the original tracks metalled. These remain private with occupants holding one share, (of Tewin Wood Roads Limited), per household, paying twice a year a sum for maintenance based on the rateable value of the properties. During the Second World War, a Canadian Forestry Corps cut out the fir trees to replace lost timber imports, the stumps of which can still be clearly seen. In more recent times, due to the removal of so many splendid trees, a Tree Preservation Order was placed and strictly applied. During that War, Tewin had one of the two village First Aid Posts with volunteers and an ambulance driver. An air raid siren on a tall pole was at the "T" junction of Desborough Drive and Cowpers Way. A red public telephone box also occupied this position for many years until its removal in about 1964. The only wartime "incident" was during the night of the 15th November 1940, when a single 250 kg high explosive bomb fell in the back garden of 12, Desborough Drive without causing serious damage.

"Tewin Wood Estate" included all the wooded land fronting the south side of Burnham Green Road, almost reaching to Bulls Green, and both sides of Orchard Road.

A sale document of a three quarters of an acre site, listed as Plot 21, in the South Western corner of Tewin Wood, was sold to Mr John Alfred Haggis on the 5th November 1925 for the total price of £135. The Vendor is recorded as Edward Charles Elsmore on behalf of the Homestead Garden Estate. Considered to be an exceptionally pleasant area to live, and with the rapid increase in house prices nationally, the value of the houses in Tewin Wood have "rocketed" with some prices passing the £1m mark. Large plots were sub-divided and some smaller or older houses, purchased just to obtain the building site, were demolished and larger houses built.
