#### Damage to Lower Green and Verges in Tewin

The Parish Council are aware of erosion of some verges around the village as a result of various building works and road closures. The pavement and verge are the responsibility of Herts Highways and where possible the Parish Council will take steps to ensure that the verge is tidied up and that parking on the verge and the pavement is discouraged.

Rivergate Homes, who are the developers on Hertford Road, has agreed to carry out remedial work to Lower Green once building has finished.

### "The Judge's Eye"

A photography workshop will take place at Tewin Memorial Hall on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> March, starting at 7:30pm. The presenter will be Bob Norris, who judges the photographic entries at the *THACS* autumn shows. Bob had a long and distinguished career as a professional photographer and has remained active in the world of photography in his retirement. For many years he has lectured on photography and judged competitions. He has also entered national and international photography competitions and won numerous medals and awards.

Bob aims to show those wishing to enter competitions, particularly the *THACS* photography section, what judges are looking for and how we may improve our photography. To do this he will use some of his images that have been successful in national and international exhibitions or done well in competitions at his own photographic society. Bob invites us to bring one of our prints if we would like his comments and advice on it. It could be an image we have entered in a previous show and not done as well as we hoped, or one that we would like to enter in a future competition. Bob will also give guidance on mounting prints for competitions. Most of all he wants to encourage us to go out and enjoy photography, to enter competitions and, perhaps, to win.

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### The Tewin Society Award

The presentation of the fourth annual Tewin Society Award for Heritage, Conservation and Environment took place in Tewin Memorial Hall on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> January, immediately before the *THACS* AGM.

The winner of the 2014 Tewin Society Award is Michael Clark.

Elizabeth Wilson (who won the 2012 award) announced the winner and presented Michael with his prizes. The Tewin Society Award plaque had been engraved with his name and the year of the award (2014) and Michael will have it for a year. He also received a presentation crystal vase inscribed with "The Tewin Society Award 2014".

Michael received his award for his wide range of relevant work that he has done over a long period, using his extensive knowledge and skills for the benefit of Tewin and its residents. He has used his links with Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust, the RSPB and the Badger Trust to give the people of Tewin a special facility at Tewin Orchard, used for apple picking and badger watching. His extensive knowledge of apple trees was also put to good use when he led the planting of the millennium orchards.

Michael was a vital participant in the project to produce and publish *The History of Tewin by the People of Tewin* book. He utilised his

extensive writing and publishing skills to good effect and Tewin Orchard arranged for the publishing of the book. He also gave us a wonderful pictorial representation of Tewin by designing the village sign on Lower Green and he helped to plan its production and installation. (*The History of Tewin by the People of Tewin* contains a more detailed account of the orchards on pages 158-164 and information about the village sign on page 247.)

Since the Tewin Society Award is for contributions to the Heritage, Environment and Conservation of Tewin made by volunteers, the nominations fitted very well, making him a clear winner.

Our congratulations go to Michael and our thanks and gratitude to all those who helped and supported him in this work.

At St. Peter's we receive regular 'link letters' from Dave and Rine Ingleby and their children Sem and Joanna. These letters are sent to many churches in the UK who help to support Dave and Rine in their work in New Delhi. A recent link letter contains the following article by Dave. Elizabeth M. Wilson

#### **Thoughts from Delhi**

I (Dave) was in conversation the other day with an Indian friend and we were talking about Delhi and what an impersonal and rough place it is. He mentioned that, as he grows older and more of his friends from childhood and university leave the city, the less attractive it becomes. It is very true that how we feel about a place is linked more to the quality of our relationships than to the specifics of the physical surroundings. I wonder how Sem and Joanna will feel about Delhi in the years to come? We hope that, despite the terrible traffic, the dirt and pollution, they will have good memories and a love for the people.

Anyway, mentioning dirt and pollution brings me on to talk about an India wide campaign that is strongly being supported by the government. It is called Swattch Bharat Abhiyan, which means Clean India Campaign. The aim, following the ideals of Ghandi, is to make India a clean country by 2019. There are many positive ongoing initiatives and there is no doubt that cleaning India is a laudable aim. But it is very disheartening to see how many politicians and celebrities have jumped firmly onto the bandwagon in a most cynical manner. There have been many reports in the media of high profile people turning up with a crowd in relatively clean areas of Delhi. They then wait while someone empties a wheelbarrow of dry leaves (i.e. relatively clean dirt) and proceed to vigorously sweep it all up again. All this in full view of the TV cameras!

It's so sad that these kind of populist, tokenistic stunts actually work. Politicians and celebrities know this full well which is why they participate in them. So, what is really needed to clean India? For one thing, those who really do the cleaning work, day in and day out - the low caste road sweepers, rag pickers, *koura wallas* (those who collect household rubbish) etc- need to be given more respect and status within society. They need to be paid better and have access to better tools, equipment and working conditions. Society needs to start caring about the fact that, after working to clean India's towns and cities, these people go home to meagre food, slum housing and the waste land at the edge of the railway line for a toilet. Let the politicians with their crisp, white kurtas (outfits), their token brooms and their small piles of 'clean dirt' proclaim this message.

### St Peter's News

Looking back to the St Peter's Christmas Market a big thank you was given to Nick Whiting and his team for a very successful and thoroughly enjoyable, if tiring, day for those who prepared goods, sold goods and those who enjoyed them.

The Christmas services were very well attended again this year and the collections taken at the Crib and Midnight services were sent to the Children's Society and Ebola Appeal respectively.

Last year St Peter's had its Quinquennial Inspection followed by a report of the findings. This is a structural report that has to be undertaken every 5 years with recommendations on the state of the building and what works need to be carried out in order of priority. This month the first piece of work, which will take between 2 and 3

months, was started. Anyone visiting the Church will see the pews on the right hand side as you go in the main door neatly covered in thick polythene to protect them from the effects of the work. The architect visited on the 19<sup>th</sup> January to check on progress.

The yew trees at the front of St Peter's have been pruned to a more manageable size and shape as have the group of yews near the Beit gravestone. Though they now look somewhat shorn they will soon fill out and grow upwards again.

Still on a gardening note, very many thanks to Stuart Kirkham for cutting back the hedges on the inside of the Churchyard and making them look wonderful again.

Thanks too are extended to Tewin Parish Council for tidying up the grass verge area between the main gate of St Peter's and Churchfield Road which had become rather untidy of late. It's now ship-shape again, thank you.

As part of the Mission Action Planning an informal event, with wine and nibbles, took place on Thursday, 22nd January for the 16 couples getting married this year in St Peter's Church. The couples were able to listen to the experiences of a couple who were married last year. There was also lots of talk about flowers, parking and all the usual paraphernalia wound up in getting married.

Unfortunately, there is no further progress to report on the extension to St Peter's graveyard.

### Oliver and Olivia are Hertfordshire's Top Tots

Oliver and Olivia are the most popular names for babies registered by Hertfordshire County Council's Registration Service in 2014.

Other popular names chosen by parents included Sophia, Isabella and Emily for girls and Samuel, Henry and Jack for boys.

Richard Thake, Cabinet Member for the Registration Service, said: "It's always fascinating to see what names are chosen. In the last year we have seen the revival of some older names such as Ava and Elsie for girls and Noah for boys. I was also interested to see the name Logan used for both boys and girls."

#### New Change4Life Campaign Encourages Families To Make Sugar Swaps

A new Change4Life campaign launched by Public Health England and backed by Hertfordshire County Council encourages parents to cut down the amount of sugar their children consume by making one or more simple swaps.

The campaign launches following a new survey amongst Netmums users who were polled on their views on sugar. The results highlight that nearly half (47%) of mums surveyed think their family has too much sugar in their diets and two thirds of mums (67%) are worried about the amount of sugar their children consume.

While guidelines state that no more that 10% of a person's daily energy or calorie intake should be made up of sugar, at present, children aged 4-10 years are consuming up to 50% more than this. Children aged 4-10 get 17% of their daily sugar from soft drinks; 17% from biscuits, buns, cakes, pastries and fruit pies; 14% from confectionery; 13% from fruit juice and 8% from breakfast cereals.

Change4Life recommends four simple Sugar Swaps for mums to choose from, tackling different 'sugar occasions' in the day:

- The Breakfast Swap: sugary cereal for plain cereal e.g. wholewheat biscuit cereal
- The Drink Swap: e.g. from sugary drinks to sugar-free or no-addedsugar drinks
- The After School Swap: for example from muffin to fruited teacake
- The Pudding Swap: for example from ice cream to low-fat lower-sugar yoghurt

Falls can be very serious at any age but an elderly person may take far longer to recover from its effects. Whilst accidents do happen, many can be prevented.

This month we share with you a few tips on how to make your home a safe haven and minimise the risk of having an unnecessary accident.

**Who?** Believe it or not more women than men have accidents in the home. **What?** Falling downstairs, tripping over loose tiles, flooring and left items. Suffering loss of balance after rising from a seated position too quickly or maybe having a dizzy spell. Slipping on wet floors, losing stability due to ill -fitting footwear.

**Why?** There are all sorts of reasons why an accident occurs. Many are down to external factors in our environment that could be avoided with a little forward planning. Installing grip rails and sturdy bannisters, making sure areas of risk such as staircases are well lit, checking that flooring and equipment are up to standard and carrying out repairs before it's too late. Be safe with fire, get a smoke alarm, test it regularly and always have an escape route planned. Avoid burns and scalds by not carrying very hot liquids, ensure your hot water bottle is of good quality and using rear hotplates on your cooker to prevent knocking a pan off the cooker.

**How?** If you have a fall, how do you cope? Firstly don't panic. If you are able to get up, do so very slowly, holding onto a firm object and putting a soft object under your knee if possible whilst you take the strain to stand up. Then sit down and rest a while. If you are hurt try to get comfortable until help arrives. Keep warm starting with feet and legs and try to move position regularly as this will improve your comfort.

**When?** Accidents can occur all year round but in winter the elderly are particularly vulnerable. Hypothermia may not sound like an accident but it should be avoidable. Wear several layers of thin clothing, eat light regular meals and take drinks throughout the day. Make sure you move about regularly and don't be afraid to contact your local gas and electric supplier to discuss any difficulties you may be experiencing with your bills. *Frankii of Home Instead Senior Care*
