Can You Help Protect Older People From Fire?

This winter Hertfordshire County Council's Fire and Rescue Service is asking people to keep an eye out for older people by helping to spot fire risks in their home.

There are simple things to look out for

- Not having smoke alarms, or smoke alarms that don't beep when tested
- · Overflowing ashtrays, or burn marks on clothing, furniture or carpets
- Smoking in bed
- · Hoarding and clutter
- · Unsafe use of fire sources open/portable fires
- · Frequently leaving cooking unattended
- Unsafe use of candles and other flames
- · Overloaded plug sockets

If you see these signs, please let us know. We carry out free Home Fire Safety Visits where we check for potential fire risks, help residents develop an escape plan and can provide expert advice and discuss specialist equipment to help keep vulnerable older people safe. Team Vicar's Letter

My favourite quote from last year comes not from a poet, politician or priest but rather from a passer-by who witnessed the stabbings at Leytonstone station in December. The event, filmed on a mobile phone, records the voice of a young man who sees beneath the religious veneer of the attacker and says simply "You ain't no muslim, bruv".

2015 was a year of increasing violence and terror, often using the name of Islam to claim some justification. I suspect a lot of us enter into 2016 with an amount of trepidation about what may lie ahead.

But while we have little personal control over the extremism of a minority, we do have a contribution to make in how we allow that minority to affect our outlook on others. Of course there is the temptation to join the rhetoric which says religion is the root of all wars; an argument that is fuelled equally by the far-right 'ban the burka' campaign, to the seemingly liberal (but actually deeply judgmental) words of John Lennon's Imagine. Both of these appear with some regularity on my Facebook feed after any terrorist incident and both, it seems to me, argue for the same thing – if we could just strip people from religious belief and behaviour then we'd all live in peace. The argument of course doesn't stand up; the great despots of the last century Hitler, Stalin, Mussolini, Pol Pot, Mao were not religious men. The terrorism of today may use religion as a powerful weapon, but is largely built on a hatred for Western policy in the Middle East, the struggle for control in collapsing nations, and, I suspect a very human blood-lust that gives a thrill, sense of power and purpose.

But more so I am disturbed by such an argument because it seeks to create further division amongst peoples: proclaiming to neighbours near and far, whatever their faith, that something at the core of their identity, something deeply meaningful and personal, would best be annihilated.

I'm not denying that God's name has been used to justify hideous atrocities. This has certainly been the case. Religious leaders have great responsibility in these times to acknowledge where their traditions can hurt or heal, and to walk in ways that promote reconciliation and peace. But this too is a responsibility for all of us, of faith and of none, to sift intelligently through the headlines, to abstain from scapegoats, to refuse to blame unfairly those who are different. Imagine if that were a resolution for the New Year?

The River Mimram

Memeran, the earliest recorded name of our beloved chalk-stream, dates from the beginning of the 10th century. Thereafter its name appears as Meren (c. 1000), Maeran (c. 1100), Mimeran (c. 1130), Memeran and Memaran in the 12th and 13th centuries, Marran and Memmarran in the 16th century, Maran from 1728 and Mimram from 1790. The last two were both in popular use as recently as the 1930s. The origin or derivation of the name remains unclear.

The Mimram is one of the eastern group of Hertfordshire's wildlife-rich chalk-streams which drain south eastwards from the dip slope of the Chiltern Hills to flow into the deeper slower flowing lowland River Lea at Hertford. Prior to its depletion by water extraction, the originating source of the river was a series of springs emerging from the Lower Chalk above King's Walden. Now, the river bed above Whitwell remains dry with much of it having been converted to arable farming. The potential for the river's full recovery was, however, evident during the unusually wet spring of 2000 when water again flowed from the springs above King's Walden, scouring the original river bed, and flooding its original course across Lilley Bottom Road near its junction with Church Road, King's Walden.

The present source of the river is now to be found near Stagenhoe Bottom a mile NW of Whitwell. From there to Welwyn it receives water from a series of small springs and side streams, and from the artesian bores that feed the watercress beds at Whitwell and Kimpton Mill. The accumulation of silt due to the reduction in flows, mainly as a result of the ever increasing demand for water to supply the continuing post-war expansion of the county's towns, has caused much shallowing. Many living residents remember swimming in depths of four or more feet of water at various points between Digswell and Poplars Green as recently as the 1970s.

Entering the parish at the west end of Tewin Water, the river currently flows along the north side of its floodplain through Tewin Water, Tewin Bury Farm (and its former domestic mill, Tewin Mill House), and Archer's Green. Along its course it loses height, passing over a number of weirs, eventually leaving our parish at Poplars Green where it enters the Panshanger Estate. Hertfordshire was once the national centre for cultivating watercress. Within our parish watercress beds existed at Tewin Bury, on the site of Tewin Fish Farm and at Archer's Green. Production lasted from before 1836 until 1972 when Mr Ginger, who farmed the last two sites, sold up and retired. *Extracted from The History of Tewin by the People of Tewin*

Keep Your Little Ones Safe From Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease

Hand, foot and mouth disease (HFMD) is a mild viral infection, which means it cannot be treated with antibiotics or antiviral medication. The disease isn't usually serious, and goes away without treatment after a few days, but it can be unpleasant, particularly in younger children.

Typical symptoms of HFMD include:

cold-like symptoms, such as loss of appetite, cough and a moderately high temperature of around 38-39°C (100.4-102.2°F)

a non-itchy red rash made up of spots or small blisters, which usually develop on the hands and feet (also sometimes on the knees, elbows, groin and buttocks). The blisters can become painful

painful mouth ulcers

If a parent is concerned that their child may have HFMD, they should monitor them carefully and encourage them to rest. Swallowing may be uncomfortable, so provide soft food, such as mashed potatoes and soup, and make sure they drink plenty of water or milk, avoiding acidic drinks like cola or orange juice. Medication, such as child safe ibuprofen or paracetamol (not aspirin), can help ease symptoms too.

There are simple steps that parents, nurseries and schools can take to reduce the risk of HFMD, including:

washing hands before meals, after going to the toilet or handling nappies etc. Avoid getting discharge on hands while coughing or sneezing

covering the nose and mouth when sneezing or coughing and throwing away the tissue

cleaning children's toys frequently with diluted household bleach then wiping or rinsing them with clean water

keeping children who are ill away from school and other overcrowded places until their fever and rash have subsided and scabs have dried. Stay in touch with the school.

www.babycentre.co.uk/a1614/hand-foot-and-mouth-disease or speak to their pharmacist. HFMD very rarely causes problems during pregnancy, but pregnant women should seek advice if they develop any type of rash during pregnancy or think they might have HFMD.

If you are still concerned, call 111. If your child isn't drinking any fluid or their symptoms last longer than seven days you should speak to your GP.
