The Reverend Paul Betts 1931-2015

The funeral of Paul, who was the vicar of Tewin and Datchworth from 1979 to 1996, took place at Broadclyst, Devon on 21st December 2015 where he had been living for a few years in a house for retired clergy.

Paul did his national service in the Navy after having gained a degree in mechanical engineering at Battersea Technical College. Brought up in a very evangelical background, he told me that in the Navy he was known as Bible Betts. This must have sent many of his fellow servicemen scurrying for cover, of which there is not much in a ship. He remembered this with evident amusement.

After ordination, following training at Oak Hill, he served as curate in parishes in Plymouth and Cheltenham, before being appointed vicar of St Paul's Finchley, very much within the evangelical tradition. Over a period of time, he saw that the certainties of that tradition left inadequate space for doubt and questioning to be explored. He told me of the effect on some of his congregation of their loss of the certainty and the feelings of failure and unworthiness which could result from that. During his time there, he trained as a counsellor and therapist with the Westminster Pastoral Foundation and moved towards a more liberal churchmanship.

In 1976, Paul became the warden of the St Columba Centre in Cambridge, putting into practice full-time his counselling and therapy training and experience. Paul then became the vicar of Tewin and Datchworth in 1979. His desire for people to stand on their own feet as much as they were able extended to include a more involved role for the laity in matters of faith and belief than was perhaps usual at that time.

Occasionally, this created confusion for some of his parishioners. If, as happened during one of the early Lent meetings at our house, Paul was asked to tell us authoritatively what we believed or ought to believe, he would feed the question straight back.

During his time with us, when he was so capably and charmingly supported in his work by his wife Ann, I believe that he encouraged a lasting maturity amongst the congregation. His brother, also an Anglican vicar, said that in the end Paul's strong faith was that "God is Love".

Although we were not aware of it during his time here, Paul wrote a number of beautiful hymns which speak to the heart. The words and music were both his, and his poetry writing was in the same vein.

Sadly neither Paul nor Ann enjoyed good health in retirement but, whenever we went to see him, he remained cheerful, positive and encouraging. Ted Sharp

CMS Church Mission Society - A Letter From Delhi

Just before Christmas we received a letter from David and Rine Ingleby and their children Sem and Joanna in Delhi. It was good to read all this news following their visit to the UK last summer. They write:-

'Frankly speaking, arriving back in Delhi in early September was difficult. We had so many problems with disintegrated household equipment and small electric fires, and it took us a while to get back to rights. I sometimes think that Delhi is the sort of city that would revert to being a jungle very quickly if all the humans suddenly upped and left! Everything seems to be crumbling at a rapid rate and in the extreme climate the rate of fungal/vegetation growth is impressive.

When we were with you we expressed our concerns about the air pollution levels. Things do not seem to be getting any better and they are much worse in the winter when Delhi gets the terrible smogs. In our little flat we feel OK, but outside in the ubiquitous heavy traffic jams it's quite horrible.

Part of the problem in Delhi is the huge number of diesel trucks which are banned during the day but allowed onto the Delhi roads at night. An estimated 80,000 come through every night. It is unlikely that anything will be done about it because the government gets good revenue from these trucks.'

Before David left for the UK he had been a volunteer for the Leprosy Mission, TLMTI, for a few weeks and once back in India he began working for them. He writes:-

'In order to get to work I take a cycle rickshaw, then a metro train, and then it's a short walk round the side of the Indian Parliament building. Since we've been back I've been working hard in the office. Most days there is a calm atmosphere as people just get on with work in a focused manner.

TLMTI runs 14 leprosy hospitals in India, meeting leprosy and general medical needs. As you can imagine, these hospitals are not cheap to run and there is no government funding! If a vital machine or piece of medical equipment breaks down or becomes out of date, it is a very expensive business to get a replacement. I've been working on various applications for new equipment for a number of hospitals, trying to get interest from some of the Foreign Embassies and Consulates in India. Rine's work at Sugandh is continuing well. There have been a few major activities since the summer. The Vacation Bible schools were very well received and, since then, we have had our usual programmes such as the tuition club, school, women's savings and training. In the last couple of weeks we also took advantage of the cooler weather and had our annual day out for the SGH women and the Khadar school children on separate trips. The highlight for the children was the huge park by India gate, where they had all the space and freedom to play on the swings and slides without being told off. There are, of course, no parks near the slum where they can play. Incidentally, one image that really struck me recently on a visit to the slum in Khadar was watching the daughter of one of our SGH ladies. The girl was probably older than Joanna but so much smaller. She was playing on the rubbish sorting heap, going through the filthy plastic in search of treasure. She seemed pretty pleased with her finds, a foul smelling pencil case with a picture of a shining blonde Barbie and two half used tubes of Vaseline lip gloss.'

Hertfordshire Health Walks' Award Success

Hertfordshire Health Walks have won the 2015 Excellence in Public Health Award!

The competition was open to any organisation that improves health and wellbeing in Hertfordshire.

Hertfordshire County Council, in partnership with most district and borough councils, Hertfordshire's Public Health Service and East and North Hertfordshire NHS Clinical Commissioning Group coordinates a countywide programme of walks called Hertfordshire Health Walks. The walks are free, short and regular, providing the opportunity for people to get outdoors, increase their activity levels and reap the many benefits associated with walking. Different from other guided walks, they are led by trained and insured volunteers, and are focused on improving the health and wellbeing of all who take part.

Walking can help to reduce the risk of a range of health conditions including diabetes, osteoporosis, heart disease and cancer. It's also a good way to maintain general wellbeing and helps with self management of, and rehabilitation from, various illnesses. Walking in a group is a sociable activity which helps to increase independence and confidence while combating loneliness, depression and anxiety.

There are currently over 65 walks weekly throughout eight districts in Hertfordshire, with more planned for the near future. Each walk is graded based on duration and intensity, making them inclusive and accessible to all, regardless of age or ability. Grading ranges from the 1st Steps walks (20 to 30 minutes on even ground, with plenty of stopping places) to the Grade 4 walks (up to 90 minutes across mixed terrain).

Team Vicar's Letter

I have been following the British astronaut Tim Peake on Twitter and have been struck by the incredible photographs he posts as he gazes down on Earth. Earth looks both magnificent and small. Photographs show lightning over Egypt, the snow of the Alps and the sun peeping over the curve of the world as people wake for Christmas morning. There is a very beautiful picture of the white and yellow glow of city lights, and the myriad of stars above, including the constellation of Orion. It makes a wonderful photograph. Except those of us here down below, know that the greater the lights that crowd the streets, the less of the stars you can see in the sky; that greater perspective of universal light gets hidden by the smaller, manmade creations.

In a poem called *Lent*, Jean. M Watt describes Lent as a stripping away of those things that stop us gazing into eternity. "Lent is a tree without blossom, without leaf, barer than blackthorn in its winters sleep, all unadorned" she begins. Watt contrasts the glitz of Christmas, with its light decorated trees, to the Lenten bare winter branches which, stripped of foliage, allow us to gaze into the darkness beyond and see, for ourselves, the stars.

During Lent churches are left bare, without flowers or unnecessary decoration. They are a visual reminder to see beyond the fuss and frivolities that fill our lives and minds, to push them aside for a time so we can gain a greater perspective. Lent encourages us to look ahead, not just to immediate desire and need, but to eternal desires and needs – those things which often get outshone by the temporal glitz in this life, yet shine still, if we would look, with a much greater beauty.

So perhaps there are things you could put to one side this Lent, to give you space to look to the eternal perspective instead. Or perhaps you might make time simply to wrap up warm and spend some time out under the stars. The stars have made people ponder the mysteries of God for millennia. In the words of King David:

"When I look at the sky that you have made, the moon and the stars which you set in their places – what are human beings that you think of them, mere mortals that you care for them?" (Psalm 8)

I wish you all a holy and star-filled Lent. Susannah

<u>Tewin Tennis Club</u>



The tennis courts will be undergoing some maintenance work this month. We've been advised that the courts are basically in a very sound condition, which is good news as the cost of repairs can be kept in check. There's a tree root in one corner that will be ground out and then the courts will be washed and moss killed, using a herbicide that takes a couple of weeks to penetrate right through. The courts will then be painted in March when the weather (in theory) improves and is drier. Naturally there will be some

disruption in play over this period but the net (ha!) result will be wonderful. At the same time new, stronger fence posts are to be installed where they have bent and we will be extending the new netting right around the courts, together with two new gates. Please remember that annual membership fees will be due in April, and you won't get the updated code for the court padlocks until you have paid.
