The Urgent Care Centre at the New QEII Hospital in Welwyn Garden City is open 24 hours a day and if you are not sure what to do, then NHS 111 can help direct you to the right service.

No appointment is necessary and it is open 24 hours every day, including weekends & bank holidays.

For the time being, the urgent care centre will not be able to see children between midnight and 8am.

The Urgent Care Centre will treat:

- Muscle and joint injuries, such as strains, sprains, sudden back or neck pain, tendonitis and soft tissue injuries.
- Suspected fractures and broken bones.
- Bites, stings, cuts, bruises and grazes.
- · Burns and scalds.
- · Foreign bodies that are stuck in ears or noses.
- · Minor eye injuries.
- Minor head injuries.
- Minor illnesses which would normally be treated by a GP, but which can't wait until your GP practice is next open.

Winter on the Farm

With the start of the New Year, we like to walk our fields to check if we can see any green growth coming through where we've sown. The start of a new year and the start of a new harvest. This year the crops are very slow in coming through. You should be able to bend down and see rows of little plants. Some of our first sown fields are visible but the rest are still very slow in showing.

We have been unable to roll the fields. This usually happens after sowing to push the stones down in the dirt and break up the clods so that when combining they do not jam the combine header. We hope to roll the fields in the Spring. This will not damage the growing crops if done with care.

We have 50 acres of rented land at a nearby farm which we were unable to seed. I walked those fields and it was not possible to put a tractor on them as it was far too wet. We will have to rethink what crop to sow next year. This will be a Spring crop which will not yield as much as a Winter crop.

We were very pleased to have the Tewin Nativity in our grain barn with live sheep, a donkey, a 7 week old baby Jesus and approximately 150 adults and children. Without the Good Lord's help we would not be able to produce the food to feed the people.

Hundreds of years ago when farming was very labour intensive and planting was done by hand, there was a saying quoted in the fields that you should sow four seeds in a hole, one for the rook, one for the crow, one to rot and one to grow. We now sow at a high seed rate to counteract what this saying tells us.

We are looking forward to better weather in 2020.

On this date a huge Christmas pie was baked for holiday consumption in London . According to the Newcastle Chronicle it was made of two bushels of flour, twenty pounds of butter, four geese, two turkeys, two rabbits, four wild ducks, two woodcocks, six snipes, four partridges, two neat's tongues, two curlews, seven blackbirds and six pigeons..... It was nearly nine feet in circumference at bottom and weighed about twelve stone.

Directed by David Butler it was a Warner Bros film devised in response to the success of 'Annie Get Your Gun'. Doris Day made so many great films it was hard to make a choice but *Calamity Jane* is just the movie to cheer you up on a cold January night – real escapist entertainment..

Team Vicar's Letter

This month we celebrate Epiphany, the arrival of the magi, those early astronomers and mathematicians, so it seems an appropriate time to report back on some of that trip of contemporary universe-gazers to CERN in October. A trip in which I was shown the astonishing workings of the Hadron Collider, and got to share in some fascinating conversations with particle-physicists, college deans, a bishop and a bunch of science fiction writers (who had tagged along for the ride.)

My trip had the purpose of making connections. On reflecting on the unseen world which particle physicists seek to understand, and remembering how the psalms teach us that each part of creation has the ability to unveil to us something of God. It made me ponder that if the very fabric of existence is about small things coming together (the basic premise of particle physics), then it should be natural in our everyday experience that where we see the coming together of people and resources, life often flourishes. In fact CERN is a testament to this. Its achievements have only been made possible by the collaboration and resourcing of many nations.

I also enjoyed listening to the views of those who currently work at the centre. A professor there, not a Christian, was very keen to make the point that uncertainty and faith are key element in a physicist's experience. Theories are theories, he said, not facts. For example the Big Bang is the best 'story' (his words) that we have of the origin of the Universe. It is a theory which helps us make sense of the beginnings of life, but, he said, it is not perfect. It does not fit with every other theory. It can take us back approximately 13 billion years, but it cannot lead us to several million years just after the big bang, or the moment of it, or indeed delve in to the concept of 'before'. Indeed, in time, he hopes a better theory will be developed. I say this, not because I am not happy to accept the theory of the Big Bang as the most credible explanation of the creation of the universe. As long as those eminent professors are happy with it, I am sure to be too. But it struck me that religious faith is similar. Faith is never certainty. Faith is never perfect. But, for me, Christianity seems to be the best theory/story which helps me understand life as I see it.

I also learned this: Scientists need hugs. There is a hugging circle drawn on the floor at CERN where they can stand if they are having a bad day, and wait for a passing physicist to oblige.

Recently members of the Bridge Cottage Patient Participation Group visited the Dementia Friendly Community Café at Digswell Village Hall provided by Home Instead Senior Care Welwyn and Hatfield.

The Café has been created to embrace everyone in the community, their carers, family and friends. The café offers a safe, welcoming atmosphere for those who require stimulation, or socialization plus those who may feel lonely and isolated.

The café's objective is to give people the chance to socialise, have a cup of tea, and enjoy some stimulating activities, crafts and music together with the support of guest speakers, including Trading Standards, Hertfordshire Fire Service, Hertswise and many more.

The day we visited the activities included painting mugs, board games, colouring and knitting. For those who were interested in knitting the group have been knitting small squares to form part of a giant blanket to donate to a local homeless charity. The atmosphere was warm and welcoming and there was absolutely no pressure to take part in the activities - several people were just enjoying a bit of people watching whilst having a cup of tea! On this particular day a singer joined the session and sang songs from the 40s and 50s which had a few people (including the amazing volunteers) getting up to have a little dance!

With an ageing population, cases of dementia are increasing. This means that more and more people in the local area will be affected by the condition at some point in their lives. It is Home Instead's hope that by educating the local community, they can create superior dementia awareness and through positive social interaction they can drive their mission to create a dementia friendly community.

With the festive season behind us, we can look back over the past year and take stock of all the ways in which the Trust has been able to support the Danesbury and QVM Hospitals. It is with the help of all the people who have so kindly donated their time, or given a financial donation, that we have been able to make this happen. We would like to thank you for this, as well as for supporting our local charity shop in Welwyn village, especially in this era of 'click and buy'.

Our previous articles have mentioned that the Charity is looking for new Trustees and we are delighted to announce that **David Jubb** has agreed to join the Board with immediate effect. David previously worked as the Relief Manager at the Friends shop in Welwyn village and so he is already well acquainted with the workings of the Charity. We are sure that his skillset and experience will complement those of the other Trustees.

The objectives of the Charity were amended earlier this year such that, whilst our purpose is still very much concerned with Danesbury Neurological

Centre and Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital, we are now able, subject to available funds, to support NHS hospitals, Homes, Clinics and other Facilities in the county of Hertfordshire currently existing and such other units as may be opened to serve the same population.

This development has obviously become known within the NHS as we have been approached for support for initiatives at the Holywell Neurological Rehabilitation Unit in North Watford, where we have given £4,000 for improvements to the garden area.

When patients return to their home environment, one of the most daunting areas for them to face is the kitchen and so having a kitchen in the hospital, where they can relearn skills, is a vital part of their rehabilitation. With this in mind, the Charity has recently committed to give $\pounds 16,710$ for the

refurbishment of the kitchen at Danesbury. All of this helps the well-being and rehabilitation of the patients and would not be possible without your loyal support.
