Highways Works

Carriageway resurfacing works on the access road to the Plume of Feathers pub will take place on 6th March 2020.

Warrengate - Plotlands, Tewin

A plot of land has come up for sale at Lousehole Bottom on the Hertford Road. This land has had two Article 4 orders placed on it covering all plots. These orders remove all permitted development rights. The Parish Council has advised the agent and East Herts Council. If you see any work in progress to put up fences, lay tracks, remove hedges etc, please inform the Parish Council or East Herts Council.

Hertford Road Blocked Gulleys

In response to the continued pooling of water on Hertford Road, Herts Highways have advised that they will arrange for a CCTV drainage investigation of the highway drainage system. This will identify any defects in the underground pipework and detail what can be done to limit the amount of water being held on the carriageway.

Whilst they are on site the crew will also investigate the pipework under the carriageway at Lousehole Bottom on Hertford Road near Tewin Bridleway 004.

Utilities

UK Power are investigating a series of short term power cuts in parts of Tewin. Sewage blockages are becoming a regular event in Tewin. The main causes are wet wipes flushed down the loo and cooking oil poured down the sink.

THE HISTORY OF THE BOWLS CLUB



<u>Part 1</u>

Have you ever wondered how Tewin became home to a Bowls Club called 'Shire Park'? It all goes back to the time, shortly after the First World War, when the New Town's Commission

bought land from Lord Desborough of Panshanger for a new town to be called Welwyn Garden City.

Businesses were invited to come and settle in Welwyn Garden City to provide employment for the new house owners. Several of these new factories encouraged recreation for their workers, and there was a strong League of bowling teams, one of which was at the I.C.I. Plastics Factory but, after some years, I.C.I. Plastics relocated to the North East and the factory site was taken over by a company called 'Shire Park'. The I.C.I. bowlers renamed themselves as the Shire Park team, and were allowed to keep playing on the old I.C.I. green.

But then, in the early 1990s, the Shire Park Company wanted to build on the green! So the 36 bowlers had no facilities for home games. 17 of them joined other local teams, but 19 decided to buy a corner of a field in Tewin and build their own green so they raised the cost between them. Shire Park Company allowed the fledgling new club to take all the machinery and ditches etc. which were stored in a farm shed until 1994 when the digging out began in the field behind Tewin Village Hall. Most of the hard labour was done by 12 stalwart Club members, who spent all their spare time on the task for the next two years. It was hard physical labour to change the sloping field into a flat bowling green of a good enough standard to host national competitions. On 14th June 1994 the J.C.B. arrived, and on 21st July a small trench was dug for the water pipe and electricity cable - but it was not all plain sailing. There were several setbacks the Dumper Truck required to move 360 tons of sand was stolen. Another setback came when the footpath authorities pointed out that the Northern footpath could not be moved from its position, even to accommodate the planned corner of the Bowling Green, and would have to be reinstated as shown on the Ordnance Survey map. This meant reconfiguring that corner of the green and shoring up the bank with concrete.

At last the work was done and Tewin had a new bowls green, albeit one called 'Shire Park', and the first match was played in the Summer of 1996.

Winter on the Farm

These days a lot of farmers have the luxury of an agronomist to help them with farming their crops. You may ask 'what is an agronomist'? They are people who walk the farmer's fields and analyse the soil and growing plants. They are able to look at the plant and inspect the leaf to see if any damage has occurred through drought, rain, pests or disease. With their knowledge we are able to rectify some of the problems that happen. Our agronomist is a highly professional person, with huge knowledge of growing crops. You may have seen him walking our fields with his dog.

Years ago farmers' knowledge of their land came down through the generations and many old sayings still prove correct to this day. I often say that you have to 'plant barley in the dust and wheat in the mud'! This is certainly the case this year.

I'm running a little late on spraying some of my fields because of the weather but this gives me a chance to have my sprayer MOT'd. The sprayer has to have an MOT just like a car, truck or van. This has to be done once a year by a trained tester. The machine will then have a sticker which states the reference number, date of the test and the name of the tester. This may be checked at any time during the year. Our farm team have to attend training courses. Each course is awarded a certain number of points and any person who wishes to use the sprayer must have gained 20 points per year. Those who don't attain the required number of points are not allowed to use the sprayer.

With the sowing conditions last year being less than perfect, our crops are progressing slowly and we look forward to the longer hours of daylight.

At this time of year we try and put our machines (tractors, combine, JCBs and all tillage equipment) through the workshop and give them a full service.

We may not be working on the fields but we are working to maintain maximum efficiency of our equipment.

Screen On The Green

On Monday 17th February we are showing *Green Book (2018)*, a biographical comedy-drama directed by Peter Farrelly. Set in 1962, the film is based on the true story of a tour of the American Deep South by African American classical and jazz pianist Don Shirley and his driver cum bodyguard, an Italian American, Frank "Tony Lip" Vallelonga. The title of the film comes from the so-called "Green Book" that they used to guide them to the few establishments that were safe for African Americans at that time.

The soundtrack includes rarities from 1950s/60s American music as well as original music from Kris Bowers and one of Shirley's own recordings. *Green Book* received numerous awards and accolades, including Oscars for Best Picture, Best Original Screenplay and Best Supporting Actor.

Team Vicar's Letter

The geese on Mardleybury farm are for me a symbol of God. A couple of summers ago I was walking my dog in Datchworth whilst the light was fading in that way which gives everything a golden glow. The evening was warm and perfectly still, each leaf, branch and blade of corn held unmovingly in place.

Usually dog walking is a sociable activity, with owners stopping to remark on the weather and dogs sniffing out a new friend, but that evening there was no-one around. I was completely alone when I heard, in this stillness, the strange throated language that geese speak to each other get increasingly nearer, and then, the noise of the beating of wings. Suddenly, as I walked on one side of a tall hedge a skein of geese skimmed so close I swear I could feel the air pushing down on me beneath each sweep of their wings. It was over in seconds but it was thrilling. I'm not sure exactly why I felt I had seen something of God in that moment; perhaps their freedom, their wildness, the unpredictability, the unexpected gift, or was it this life that was somehow shared with mine and yet so strangely different? Truthfully I don't

know, but that strange encounter has stayed with me so much that each time I drive past their pond, or hear their call, or see them on the field nibbling the grass, they still give me a sense of God.

I tell you this peculiar tale because so many people find something divine in nature - in the glory of a mountaintop, the peace of a garden, the hope of spring shoots, the glow of a sunset.

The psalms tell us that God reveals his presence through his creation. I think therefore if we lose our love for our environment then we damage something of our ability to recognize who God is. We also lose sight of who we are. The name of the first human in the bible, 'Adam', means 'earth' and reminds us from where we are drawn, and our deep connection with the world in which we live.

This Lent the churches of our team will be focusing on biblical teachings on our responsibility to care for creation and what this means in the light of the modern challenges of climate change and increasing pollution. You'd be very welcome to come to one of our Lent groups who will be discussing this theme, or come to any of our services. Or simply find a bench in the churchyard and feel the rain/sun/wind on your face, be astonished at the life around you, know you are part of it, and pledge to protect it.

The website group has met 5 times this year to monitor and review the content of the site. There were 56,845 hits on the website during 2019. The average number of visitors to the site each month is 4,737, however in April the number peaked at 6,646. This may have been generated by the launch of entries to the Tewin Classic Car & Craft Show.

Malcolm Allen continues to convene our meetings, Anne Hall takes the notes and is the Tewin Webmaster and Felicia Green is our Technical Advisor. Friends of Tewin own the domain name and funds the registration costs every two years.

During 2019 we continued our review of the pages under "The Directory" Tab and the information in this section is now more relevant and up-to-date.

Help Tewin Become a Dementia-Friendly Village

Dementia presents a huge health challenge to the UK. According to the Alzheimer's Society, 'one person develops dementia in the UK every three minutes'. 1 in every 8 deaths registered in the UK in 2018 was attributed to dementia or Alzheimer's. Many of us will know people affected. So what more can we all do to help, right here in Tewin?

Quite a lot, actually. In 2018 the Alzheimer's Society and the Prime Minister's Rural Dementia Task and Finish Group published a practical guide for rural communities to support people affected by dementia (and 'those affected' includes families and carers as well as those living with dementia). Dementia-Friendly Communities are committed to working together to ensure people with dementia feel understood, valued and able to contribute to their community. The Parish Council and the Vicar have already given their enthusiastic support to the idea of Tewin becoming a Dementia-Friendly Village and we have trained dementia champions, including Dr. Anne Horsman and Aimi Percival, who are happy to train those of us who are interested to become 'dementia friends'.

I propose to hold an initial meeting at Tewin Memorial Hall on 17 February at 4pm for all who are interested – particularly those willing to help/be trained, and those who are or have been affected by dementia in any way, including carers, so we can:- **set up an enthusiastic, positive group** to guide us to become a Dementia-Friendly Village; **get as many initial ideas as possible** as to what might most benefit people affected by dementia in Tewin; **see whether we can come up with any ideas** that might help towards achieving some of those benefits; **see how many people would be interested** in training to be a dementia friend (it takes less than an hour and sessions are friendly and interactive) and when would best suit trainees and trainers; **begin to develop an action plan** that can be reported back and continually improved.

Initial thoughts that have been given to me include: some people might not want to go to a separate 'dementia group', but could need help to get to Tewin's excellent Over 55s group; others might want a separate group, but could object to 'dementia' in the title – 'Memory Mornings' might be better, with the opportunity of getting together over tea and coffee, and the chance to sing old songs. If you can, please come along to our initial meeting. If you are interested but can't make it, or if you are reading this after the meeting has taken place, please email me at **davidkempson@hotmail.com**. I am also hoping to arrange an evening meeting, for those interested but unable to attend on the afternoon of the 17th. David Kempson
