THE HISTORY OF THE BOWLS CLUB Part 2



The new green opened in 1996 and bowling started in earnest. However, there were no facilities on site. An old portacabin was the changing room, tea was brewed in the Scout Hut and after

match meals were taken in the Rose and Crown, courtesy of the Landlord. So the next big hurdle was building a Club House. It was decided to try for a Sport England Lottery grant. Meanwhile, Tewin villagers were invited to come and try their hand at bowling. One villager who joined in, even before the green opened, was Jack Bird. He was a Kew Garden-trained Horticulturist who had worked with the New Towns Commission, planting trees in Welwyn Garden City.

He set about planting boundary hedges, trees and shrubs in the new green's surroundings. He was thrilled at the chance to bowl again in Tewin as he remembered bowling on the original Tewin Bowling Green in the 1930s/40s. This is now the car park behind the Memorial Hall. Jack was helped by another new member, among others, who helped the President to apply for the Lottery grant.

The Club flourished, and membership grew, so that it became necessary to extend the Club House. Fund raising began again, and the same builder was employed and managed to create a larger bar area, larger kitchen, and bigger changing rooms. To pay for the rest of the bill a mortgage was taken out. With a big sigh of relief the last instalment was paid off in October 2019. The first Bar Manager had a day job servicing coffee machines in various industrial premises, and one day discovered one of these companies, S.K.B., was planning to refurbish its canteen and was about to throw out all the tables and chairs, which is how the Club acquired its fine furniture, thanks to multiple trips from the Frythe in our Bar Manager's small car.

Several current members still travel from Welwyn Garden City to play bowls in Tewin but the percentage of Villager members is growing. 2020 sees Welwyn Garden City celebrating its Centenary, and local Bowls Clubs have been invited to take part in the Grand Parade, as well as some special Bowls matches. Shire Park Bowls Club (Tewin) will be joining in and also hosting a **2020 OPEN DAY on 25th April –** *Come and have a go.* **More details in the next issue.**

Coal Smoke

'Oh Happy Days'! As I write this farming article, halfway through February, I have at last been able to get on to the land. We have not been able to do much on the land since mid November. For the past two days Martyn, my farm manager, has been on his fertiliser spreader spreading Sulphur. I am very keen to put trace elements back on to the cereal crops to help them grow and develop.

We used to get free Sulphur from out of the sky. This was as a result of the burning of wood and coal fires at home, emissions from industrial industries and steam and smoke from the chimneys of the lovely old steam trains. Who can remember riding on those steam trains? You had to close the windows with the leather strap before going into a tunnel or the smoke came in and you got covered in smuts. With the introduction of the Clean Air Act we no longer have those deposits. So a small amount of Sulphur goes on the land with a small amount of Nitrogen. This is called Double Top Nitrogen SO₃. The rate of spread is 200 kg per Hectare(2.471 Acres).

In 2019 the rainfall was about 700ml. We have had more in other years but, because in 2019 the rain came in the Autumn months, the soil is low in Sulphur, Boron, Magnesium and other trace elements.

It's lovely to see the River Mimram back to its normal flow. We have about 2 miles of river flowing through our farm and river meadows. The river has a gravel base which means that it doesn't silt up very much. But, we have to keep it flowing. During storms the old Willow and Alder trees fall across the river and hamper the flow. We then have to clear out the fallen trees to keep the river flowing. All part of the Winter maintenance on the farm,

St David's Day — 1st March

St David (Dewi Sant) was a Celtic monk, abbot and bishop who lived in the 6th century. He spread the word of Christianity across Wales and is the Patron Saint of Wales. Both the daffodil and the leek are credited as national symbols of Wales and are worn on St David's Day. Welsh soldiers, before a battle against the Saxons, were told to wear leeks in their caps to help distinguish friend from foe. In Shakespeare's Henry V, Welsh archers wore leeks at the Battle of Agincourt in 1415.

Screen On The Green

On Monday 16th March we are showing *The Commitments (1991)*. Based on the novel by Roddy Doyle and directed by Alan Parker, it tells the story of Jimmy Rabbitte a music fanatic who assembles a group of young working-class Dubliners to form a band who play American 60s soul music. Tensions run high amongst the band members and they fight and squabble but somehow make music together. The young lead actors were mostly inexperienced and were cast because of their musical backgrounds and resemblance to the characters in the novel. Much of the filming took place at various locations in Dublin's Northside. *The Commitments* won four BAFTAs and numerous other accolades and has since gained cult status as one of the best Irish films ever made. It's a simple, captivating story that makes for a warm, funny, moving and altogether enjoyable film with great music.

St Patrick's Day --- 17th March

St Patrick, the Patron Saint of Ireland, is credited with bringing Christianity to Ireland. He was born in Wales around 385AD, was captured by pirates, escaped after 6 years and trained as a Missionary. He is reputed to have driven all snakes from Ireland. The national emblem is the shamrock. St Patrick used its 3 leaves as a means to explain how the Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Ghost could exist as separate parts of the same being. He died on 17th March 461 AD.

Team Vicar's Letter

Every year the churches of the Welwyn team throw away the virtues of humility and charity, pull on their racing cassocks, pick up their frying pans and with fervent competitive spirit toss their pancakes to the finishing line. We have annual pancake races in Datchworth and Welwyn, and of course on occasion (when Lent falls in half term) the three village pancake trophy is fought over at Burnham Green. It is great fun, but we are deadly serious about winning!

The tradition of enjoying pancakes on Shrove Tuesday started with the clearing of kitchens of the rich foods that would be put aside during the Lenten period of fasting. Pancakes were a good way of using up the eggs and butter until the great feast day of Easter appeared once more. Fasting in many religions is a spiritual discipline which retrains our focus away from ourselves and reminds us of our primary need for God.

However giving up things for Lent is perhaps more often seen as a chance to trim the waistline than about training the soul. But this year, as we reflect as churches on ecological issues, I wonder if we might consider a different kind of fast? A fast from buying 'stuff'. It's nice to have new things and it's fun often to discover a new gadget but consumerism is a major contributor to environmental damage once we factor in deforestation, pollutants and emissions, packaging, transportation and then the cost of landfill or incineration as goods are discarded. If we are serious about living more sustainably we cannot do so without examining our spending habits and the places in which we shop.

So my Lenten fast this year will be to refrain from buying new stuff, whether that be clothes, books (I have plenty on the shelves I have yet to read) or things that whisper 'buy me' as I walk past (really I swear sometimes that happens). I hope in doing so to improve not just my bank balance but also my appreciation of that which I already have. In the phrase of a Christian Aid slogan, which recognizes a global community where our decisions impact neighbours both near and far, perhaps our aim should be: 'to live simply, so that others may simply live'.

At the beginning of February, we celebrated Candlemas and then packed away the crib and the decorations for another year. During the month Susannah led a successful day at St Mary's church in Welwyn, entitled "*Dante for Dummies*". Over 50 of us learnt about this 12th Century Florentine poet and his major work "*The Divine Comedy*".

The church now has an asbestos certificate and permission from the diocese to begin repairs to the church. This means work on the essential repairs identified in the recent five-year (Quinquennial) inspection can start as soon as the contractors can fit us into their schedule. There will be scaffolding around the tower and some excavation work will need to be carried out to try to prevent flooding in the porch. Please take care when visiting the church at this time, though of course we shall be ensuring the safety of both visitors and contractors while the work is in progress. This summer we also expect to have repairs done to the bells which will require them to be removed from the tower. Although the bells will be silent for a while, services will continue as usual.

Now that spring is on the way, it is lovely to see the snowdrops and crocuses coming up around the churchyard. Many people enjoy walking through the churchyard or sitting there quietly to experience its peace and tranquillity. Lent takes place throughout March when the church will be celebrating Creation and our Care of the Earth with a special exhibition of art and crafts.

Quite a number of people in the community, the congregation and the School have been asked if they could provide items for this project. They will be displayed in St Peter's from 8th March and we hope that as many as possible will call in to view what these talented people have created.

Thank you to all those who have provided items, we really appreciate it and hopefully the display will prompt the viewers to think hard about Creation and how we need to care for it.

Antibiotic Resistance

Overuse of antibiotics in recent years means they're becoming less effective and has led to

the emergence of "superbugs" - strains of bacteria that have developed resistance to many different types of antibiotics. These types of infections can be serious and challenging to treat, and are becoming an increasing cause of disability and death across the world.

The biggest worry is that new strains of bacteria may emerge that cannot be treated by any existing antibiotics.

Both the NHS and health organisations across the world are trying to reduce the use of antibiotics, especially for health problems that are not serious.

What You Can Do

- **Don't take antibiotics unless you're certain you need them**. An estimated 30% of the millions of prescriptions written each year are not needed. Don't ask your doctor for them if you don't need them. Illnesses caused by viruses common colds, bronchitis, and many ear and sinus infections will not respond to antibiotics.
- **Finish your pills**. Take your entire prescription exactly as directed. Do it even if you start feeling better. If you stop before the infection is completely wiped out, those bacteria are more likely to become drug-resistant.
- Get vaccinated. Immunisations can protect you against some diseases that are treated with antibiotics. They include tetanus, whooping cough and pneumococcus.
- Stay safe in hospital. Antibiotic-resistant bacteria are commonly found in hospitals. Make sure your caregivers wash their hands properly. Also, ask how to keep surgical wounds free of infection. Use hand disinfectant dispensers wherever you see them, not just in hospital.
