SCHOOL LANE Speed Indication Device ("SID")

Unfortunately Herts Highways have installed the SID in the wrong place. They are happy to move it but there is a 12 week wait for a new ground socket.

FAIRHOLME STABLES PLANNING APPLICATION

Tewin Parish Council noted that this application is an improvement on the previous applications but expressed concern that the rear prospect would spoil views from the open countryside and there are not specific proposals to mitigate the problem.

The Parish Council support proposals to improve the rear landscaping with trees and restrict Class E permitted development rights and Part 2 Class A fencing. They would also support removal of permitted development rights at the rear eg 8m extensions, velux roof windows etc. They would prefer to see the existing entrance being used to serve all three properties to avoid losing any of the hedge and to avoid an extra driveway on to this narrow road.

Shire Park Bowls Club (Tewin)

Festival of Wildlife at Panshanger Park Cancelled.

The Festival of Wildlife was scheduled to take place at Panshanger Park near Hertford on 25th and 26th July. Under the current uncertainty surrounding Coronavirus, the Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust has taken the difficult decision to cancel the event.

The Festival, organised in partnership with Tarmac and in association with Herts Natural History Society, has been running since 2015 and has attracted annual crowds of up to 3,000 people. The family-friendly festival usually offers a wealth of activities such as walks and expert talks as well as children's crafts, local craftspeople and other charities to discover and last year raised over £3,500 to help protect local wildlife. But the Trust is still helping people stay wild with its Wild At Home project, which aims to bring people closer to wildlife from the safety of their homes. Staying Alert on the Farm

We now have to Stay Alert, says Boris, and that is exactly what I am doing. As my young crops are getting established I am watching for the pea and bean weevil.

We are writing this article in mid May, which you will not read until June. This month has been completely dry with hardly any rain. Very similar to last year.

Martyn and myself are still self-isolating with our equipment as the Covid virus is still out there. He does the sowing of the crops with the drill, which has a large seed hopper. He also does the spreading of the Nitram fertiliser and the compound fertilisers with a specialist fertiliser spreader. This is controlled by satellite which does not allow the machine to double spread.

I do the spraying of the crops with my 24m booms. My sprayer is also high tech and controlled by satellite, preventing double spraying. Whilst spraying, I am very alert to the presence of people on the footpaths. As my peas were coming through the soil the pea and bean weevil started to eat them. We had to act very quickly to stop them or there would be no peas to harvest. Martyn drilled them a bit deeper into moisture which let them germinate quickly. They then had a trace element spray and are now growing well.

The 5 acres of chickpeas are a completely new crop and new to us. Chickpeas are used increasingly in the UK diet. They are high in fibre and protein and contain many minerals. There is an increasing interest in them and I have a buyer for them at harvest time. Hopefully the peas and chickpeas will tolerate the frosts of the past few days.

I have just given all the oats and wheat their fungicide spray and trace element spray. The crops are growing away well at the moment.

The last few loads of wheat have been sold and have left the grain barn. I like an empty barn at this time of year. It likes an airing before we clean it out for the new harvest.

Tewin Tennis Club



To more than a little surprise, on Wednesday May 13th the tennis courts burst back into action. Following Boris Johnson's decree, tennis was suddenly not just a possibility, but a genuine opportunity once more.

The courts were prepared by clearing the benches and other removable equipment, even down to the net side winders, to minimise touchable surfaces. And hygiene has driven the early launch of an online court booking system for the website (www.tewintennis.co.uk). The committee was already investigating this innovation and it was fast-tracked to go live on the morning of the 13th, which probably means there will be a few teething issues but it seemed to work well enough for half a dozen court bookings to be made within the first couple of hours.

This is a big step for the club, allowing members to check court availability from the comfort of their own home and then make a reservation with confidence. We hope that this will encourage more play in the more fallow periods of the week, especially now the evenings are reaching their longest this month.

For now, it is already allowing plenty of people the opportunity to escape lockdown for some extra exercise. Please be careful and go gently to start with if you haven't used those muscles for a couple of months. And the committee want everyone to get their opportunity on court, so a reminder that there is a longstanding Club rule that *"Each member is allowed not more than 2 one-hour bookings per week. (These must be on separate days)"*. This has been relaxed temporarily for members to 4 one-hour (on separate days) bookings per week. This technically means that a pair can between them book a game every day. The court use will be monitored and the original limit re-applied if needed.

There are some pretty strict rules that have to be observed during this period, however. Full details of both the tennis club procedures and the very comprehensive guidance from the LTA are on the website, and we ask you to read these before venturing onto court for the first time. Another key point is that play is singles only, the only exception being players from the same household.

Social distancing must still be adhered to, with each player supplying and only using their own tennis balls. That means serving with your own balls, and flicking the opponent's balls back without touching them. Also, you must wash your hands immediately before visiting the courts. Please use gloves &/or sanitise the padlock and gate handle before and after entry & exit. And please take your rubbish home.

It's a change to tennis procedures as we know them, but we'll quickly get used to the difference, as we've had to do with so many aspects of our life these past few months.

By the way, non-members from Tewin are allowed occasional use of the courts, with a £5 fee payable to the club for each booking. As our annual memberships are ridiculously reasonable, I would urge you to think about joining the club instead. Details and a membership form can be downloaded from the website.

Finally, Gerry and Rupert are working on a cunning plan to get the ever-popular ABC League matches running as soon as feasible. Watch this space, and meanwhile, keep safe.

Team Vicar's Letter

I come across a number of people who describe themselves to me as spiritual, although not necessarily religious. I imagine this means that they have a sense of something beyond what we can see and touch, perhaps they would describe having a belief in God and maybe engaging in prayer.

Of course I would say the same about myself. The mystery of that which we cannot see is a strong part of my prayer life and faith. But Christianity has always been about more than being just spiritual. It is a faith that is very much grounded in that which we can see, and touch and taste.

Jesus, the bible tells us, reveals to us God in flesh. God, in Jesus, is physical, touchable, audible, smellable (!). Since the church began, the people who gather together as followers of Christ are known as his body – an extraordinary claim – that in someway this unlikely, imperfect, motley bunch of 'church-goers' are given the name of Christ as 'Christians' and become a physical embodiment of his presence in the world. Do note I say 'imperfect', but through God's perpetual forgiveness and grace something of God is made known through them. At the centre of Christian worship is the blessing of the bread and wine, 'body and blood'; God so close you can taste him.

This time of pandemic has seen the church doors close and Christians no longer able to meet for worship in a physical sense. Many of us instead have found ourselves 'doing church' in a virtual world. Whether that be through the radio, television or sharing in the online services. Of course when we meet like this there is a real sense that we are gathering. I have found much comfort in praying each evening with people on Facebook for our night prayer and many people have expressed that Sunday worship has given them a great sense of connection with God and with others. But this kind of worship will never replace the physical value of Christians meeting, sharing, touching, laughing and crying together. And despite the appeal of being able to do church with coffee in hand whilst still in pyjamas, in the long term that won't make up for the comfort and value of physically gathering as a church family again.

As I write we are still not certain when the church will be allowed to meet for worship in a physical sense. But when we do I imagine there will be a number of our congregation who may, for the sake of health issues or age, need to refrain from attendance until an even later date. The challenge will continue of how we support one another during this time we are apart. But I'd like to offer a welcome, to those of you who have been joining us online at this time, to join us in person when we are finally able. The church needs a tangible not just an online presence and we are called to share in a physical community. In the words of Theresa of Avila 'Christ has no body now on earth but yours. Yours are the feet he walks to do good. Yours are the hands with which he blesses the world'.

20th June - Feast of St Alban

Alban lived in the early third century in the Roman city of Verulamium, just down the hill from where the Cathedral stands today. One day he gave shelter to a stranger fleeing from persecution. This stranger was a Christian priest, now known as Amphibalus. While sheltering the priest, Alban was inspired by how important faith was to the priest and asked to be taught more about Christianity. Before the arrival of soldiers, Alban exchanged clothes with Amphibalus and was later arrested, allowing the priest to escape. Alban refused to renounce his new beliefs and the magistrate ordered that he should receive the punishment intended for the escaped priest. He was executed and today is honoured as Britain's first saint.

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

One of the benefits of the lock down has been our opportunity to see and appreciate the beauties of nature around us. Friends who are now working from home have noticed the season changes in ways they are not normally privileged to do if they leave home in the dark and return at nightfall. Our pussy cat died last year and for the first time ever we have had robins nesting in the garden. As I write they have fledged, and like all anxious parents, we, as well as the real ones, are constantly on the lookout for predators who might want a tasty meal, ready prepared.

When we first went into the lock down, there was a certain novelty to being able to clear out that cupboard that we had been meaning to do for ages, or tidy the garage, or dig the garden, learn a new language or brush up on our piano playing. But here we are, weeks later, wondering if we can keep this up for much longer. This is when we must all be on our guard, supporting each other, watching for the signs that people are getting depressed. If watching the news day in and day out is not good for you, then please, why not avoid it; there are plenty of other things to watch. For me and for many others, the most difficult thing is not being able to have hugs and kisses with our loved ones. When this is all over, hopefully there will be a greater appreciation of what it means to be without normal social interaction between friends and family.

It is heartening to see our neighbours each week as we clap for those on the front line. It is wonderful to see how people have got together to deliver food parcels to those who cannot get out, or to make meals for the key workers who have no cafes to go to for lunch. And to applaud everyone who is still going to work to keep the rest of us in a semblance of normal life – the refuse collectors, postmen, milkmen, policemen, as well as all health and social care workers. At the same time, we mourn for the many who have lost an old friend, a close relative, a trusted GP, or a faithful carer. It is going to be much harder to come out of lock down and return to normal life, than it was to go into it. Getting to work or school, boarding a train, going to a film or a concert, or a sports event, our children's school open evenings, eating out, and even going to church, are all going to require us to continue to keep our distance from others; while welcoming friends and family back into our homes, visiting them or going on holiday are all to be approached with caution. But surely, we must look forward to the return of all that; being with people is one of the things that keeps us all sane.

Each week during the lock down, I, and many others have been so pleased to be able to see members of the Welwyn team, be it Susannah, our vicar, our Rector David, or Dominic our curate, conducting a normal Sunday service. Sometimes it has been from Susannah's office at the Rectory in Datchworth, or with David playing and singing at his own piano in Welwyn, or once, with Dominic in his back garden at Woolmer Green, where his dog Hilda gently strolled into view and made us all smile.

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BBQ Safety

As we may all be spending a little more time at home this summer we just wanted to share some tips on having a safe BBQ.

Charcoal Barbecues

- Use only enough charcoal to cover the base to a depth of about 50mm (2 inches)
- Only use recognised fire lighters or starter fuel and only on cold coals use the minimum necessary and never use petrol
- Never put hot ashes straight into a dustbin or wheelie bin they could melt the plastic and cause a fire.

Gas Barbecues

- Make sure the tap is turned off before changing the gas cylinder
- Change cylinders outdoors if possible or in a well ventilated area
- If you suspect a leak to the cylinder or pipe work, brush soapy water around the joints and watch for bubbles tighten to fix but do not overtighten
- After cooking, turn off the gas cylinder before turning off at the controls to ensure any residual gas in the pipe work is used up.

Cooking

The two main risk factors for BBQ cooking are undercooking meat and spreading germs from raw or undercooked meat on to food that's ready to eat.

When you're cooking most types of meat on a barbecue make sure:

- the coals are glowing red with a powdery grey surface before you start cooking, as this means they're hot enough
- frozen meat is fully defrosted before you cook it
- you turn the meat regularly and move it around the barbecue to cook it evenly
- Most types of meat are safe to eat only when:
- the meat's steaming hot throughout
- there's no pink meat visible when you cut into the thickest part
- any juices run clear

The work done by the wonderful staff in both the Danesbury Neurological Rehabilitation Centre and the Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital has never been more important than it is at present. They have had to make room for additional patients, some suffering from Covid-19, and the continued pressure on them is intense. At their request, the charity has been providing fresh fruit, cakes and chocolates to the staff each week and we will, of course, respond to other requests, as and when they arise.
