#### **BOWLS CLUB NEWS**



Once again, we come to the end of the outdoor season at the Bowls Club - a season like no other. We have played no games at all due to the Pandemic and the social side has

been limited to the opening of the bar on Friday nights and Sunday lunch times for our members, naturally with Covid precautions in place. This has allowed members to keep in touch and is providing much needed funds. It is hoped that in 2021 we will be able to start holding our Quiz Nights and Sunday Lunches again. Keep an eye on the notice boards and the Tewin Magazine.

Unfortunately, because of all the restrictions, this year we were unable to hold an Open Day to encourage new members. This will be rectified next year so please look out for the notices on the boards outside the Club and in this magazine. *If you are interested in joining the Bowls club in Tewin we will be offering free membership for the first year as an encouragement.* 

Meanwhile, on the 22<sup>nd</sup> September the Bowls Green will be put to bed for the Winter by the contractor, Turfcare Leisure Services, where it will be Thatched to take out the dead grass and other rubbish. It looks a bit like a ploughed field when this is done and is followed by aeration. This is where small holes are punched into the surface by a machine to the depth of 100mm. This allows air to penetrate which encourages the microbes and fungi to break down the soil, thereby providing nitrogen for plant growth. Finally, the surface is reseeded and then covered with a fine layer of sterilised sand and soil, topped off with a Winter granular feed. The Green is then left to recover for three to four weeks before we start the Winter care programme.

#### On The Farm

With the cereal harvest being completed early, we had to get the bales off the land so that we could start to cultivate. We had a buyer for our straw, so almost all of the wheat straw was baled. Oat straw is chopped on the combine and ploughed back into the soil to give it vital nutrients. I love to see worms in the soil, a sign of a healthy soil.

Unfortunately we lost a lot of the big bales in the field fire in August. What we have left will probably end up at the Elean Power Station near Cambridge, which is a straw-fired biomass power station. It was the largest straw-fired power station in the world at the time of completion in December 2000.

I had a call from GB Seeds, a company with whom we had a contract to grow blue peas. They had a buyer and I was asked to load the peas into 3 bulk lorries, which carry 29 tons in each. To my surprise, the lorries took the peas to Belgium.

A sample of our wheat was taken to a laboratory in Cambridge. There, several tests will be run including a Dom test, a Zon test, a test for protein and another for Hagberg. The moisture level will also be checked. This has to be below 15% to be accepted by the millers, who have very strict criteria for wheat which will enter the foodchain as bread flour. At my farm audit I get a yellow sticker which goes on my combinable crops passport. If I don't complete and pass the tests, the millers will reject my load of wheat.

I grow all crops to the highest standards possible. As we leave the EU and deal with Brexit, we hope the Government, who are currently in trade talks with other countries worldwide, will not allow the import of food which is inferior to our high standards. Our country only produces 50% of the food we need so it is very important that the imported food is kept to our high standards.

If you have been to Tewin Bury Shop, you may have seen a vintage blue tractor on display in the drive. This is our tribute to Ivor's and Vaughan's dad who started farming in Tewin in 1931. He started with horses and then moved on to tractors.

## The Bells of St Peter's, Tewin

The article in last month's Tewin Magazine gave an outline of the recent refurbishment of the bells that was undertaken with the generous support provided by the Friends of Tewin and All Churches Trust. The following article provides a brief history of the bells.

In 1673 five bells were cast by Anthony Chandler of Drayton Parslow, from the metal of the five bells mentioned in the 1552 Edwardian inventory, viz:- "Three bells hanging in the steeple, a sanctus bell and two handbells".

A new treble was recast in 1799 by John Bryant of Hertford; his foundry was acquired by Mears & Stainbank of Whitechapel in 1825. In 1913 the bells were quarter-turned and rehung with completely new fittings and an oak frame. The frame was made so that a sixth bell could be added in the future.

In February 1939 Tewin's bells were assessed by Mears & Stainbank as to their condition and in September 1939, an estimate was received for the addition of a new treble bell. The new treble was to be 2 feet  $1\frac{3}{4}$  inches in diameter and weigh  $3\frac{3}{4}$  cwts. This made the ring of bells up to the six that are there now.

Although the treble was fitted in 1939, because of the Second World War, this bell was not rung until 1945. The inscription on this bell (shown below) reads Arthur Coleman Vidler, Rector 1912 - 1930.

# Team Vicar's Letter

I write this on the day where we have waved farewell to our curate Dominic Holroyd-Thomas, his partner Daniel and their saintly Old English sheep dog Hilda as Dominic takes up his new post as Priest-in - Charge at Ampthill in Bedfordshire. It was a strange farewell. No enormous party, no massive group photo, no last hugs goodbye – but rather a whole day of socially distanced worship and an open air presentation filmed on Zoom.

For many people other endings such as school, retirement or redundancy have also been strange, and some rather sudden or sadly with little chance for recognition. However this year it is those of us who have been grieving the loss of loved ones that have faced restrictions I'm not sure any of us could have foreseen as possible. With churches closed and funerals strictly limited many of us were given little opportunity for the ritual saying goodbye that feels instinctively important when we are bereaved.

Every year at church we hold a memorial service on All Souls where people gather to remember those they are separated from by death. We speak the names of those who have died and light candles in their memory. In this year when many have been prevented from attending funerals this service is perhaps needed more than ever, however, because of the restrictions on numbers that we can allow into church at present we're not able to gather en masse.

So instead we're offering St. Peter's as a place for personal prayer and remembrance that afternoon. The church will be open for you to come in, light a candle and quietly sit and remember. Every half an hour a prayer will be said in church and the names of loved ones spoken into that space.

## **St Peter's News**

The bells have welcomed back folk to St Peter's during September to our regular Sunday morning services. Sadly, we do not sing any hymns at present, but Andrei plays for us during services. Our service has been streamed from there once a month. In addition, every Sunday a service is streamed from one of the churches within the Team Ministry for members of the congregation who are unable to attend in person. You can find links to St Peter's Church online through Facebook or YouTube or through the Welwyn team www.welwyn.org.uk.

This year our Harvest Festival services have been a bit different from other times, as we collected tinned and dried goods for the Food Bank in Stevenage, instead of distributing fresh vegetables and flowers around the village. A small choir sang some of the traditional Harvest hymns at Family Service which was greeted with pleasure. Within the Welwyn Team we have said Goodbye to Dominic Holroyd-Thomas, our Curate, who has been appointed to the church in Ampthill, Bedfordshire. We wish him the best of luck for the future.

Over the past six months, our churchyard has been open throughout the epidemic, not just for those people who wish to tend their loved ones' graves, but also for people to walk their dogs, sit and drink coffee from their flasks, read their newspapers and books, or just sit and contemplate the world. In many ways it has been another park for the village, along with Upper and Lower Green and a sanctuary for many. The church has spent over ten thousand pounds on its upkeep in the past year, what with the renewal of the railings around the Grimston Grave, essential tree work and regular upkeep of hedges and grass including extension of the Memorial Garden. We thank Peter George, David Chalkley and Ivor Williams for their invaluable help.

St Peter's is the oldest building in Tewin: its oldest parts being Norman and over 1000 years old. In September scaffolding was erected around the Tower which was added sometime between the late 14<sup>th</sup> and mid-16<sup>th</sup> centuries, and repairs have begun on the walls. These are built of flint and clunch: clunch is an ancient building material of hardened chalk, used across several of the Home Counties. Unfortunately, it is in short supply due to delays in its production during the Covid epidemic, so, although we had hoped the repairs would be done by the end of October, this is looking increasingly unlikely as the work can only proceed slowly. Work on such ancient buildings cannot be done in a slapdash manner or without the expert knowledge and the expertise of crafts people. And it comes at a cost. That is why we are

appealing to the village to help with the funding for this work and for the upkeep of the churchyard which is there for us all to enjoy. If you can make a donation to support the church costs at this time, it will be enormously appreciated. You can do so in a number of ways :

by using the button on the church pages of the village website, at www.tewinvillage.co.uk, or by leaving an envelope at the church in the box by the South Door. Cheques payable to "St Peter's Church Tewin PCC". If you are able to Gift Aid your donation, please leave your name and address with your donation.

We hold in our prayers all those affected by Covid-19, those who have been ill, those who have died or are bereaved, those whose livelihoods have been devastated during the epidemic, and those who have returned to school or work this month.

Our clergy continue to be in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families.

#### **Notice of Electoral Roll Revision**

The annual update of St Peter's Church Electoral Roll will take place between the  $23^{rd}$  September and 7<sup>th</sup> October 2020. Anyone wishing to be added to the Roll will find enrolment forms and the box for the return of completed forms at the back of the church during this period. Applications for enrolment must be received by 7<sup>th</sup> October.

All members of the Church of England (or of a Church in communion with the Church of England) who are baptised (christened) and over the age of 16 and who are either resident in the parish or have habitually attended public worship here for the last 6 months are eligible to join the Church Electoral Roll.







## **Tewin Tennis Club**

Can you imagine what it must be like for a child who has been bounced out of bed by a loud BANG, injured, losing both or one parent and some of their siblings for example in the Lebanon, Syria or Iraq? Maybe they were fortunate enough to be operated on by a surgeon, then transported across the seas and put into a camp where makeshift tents are cold and draughty. There they will stay without any hope of going home in the foreseeable future.

I paint a miserable picture, but these camps are miserable especially in and around Calais for instance. Nobody wants these refugees and that's the sad part.

You could cheer a child up though and wrap a medium sized ladies shoe box in Christmas paper (lid separately wrapped) and fill it with pens, pencils, crayons, paper, toys (no reminders of war) and toiletries (no liquids or toothpaste). A soft toy would be a good idea, something to cuddle at night and a ball.

On Tuesday 18th August the shop re-opened exactly <u>22 weeks</u> after we were forced to shut it in March. It has been encouraging, however, to be able to welcome some of our long-standing customers back into the shop and to catch up on village gossip.

What is unfortunate is that many of the topmost levels of governments and society don't seem to get the point yet or are so frightened of each other that they cannot co-operate in what is a worldwide problem. Even the development of a vaccine can become a matter for international competition.

Our response must be to continue supporting and rallying round even when Covid-19 is a thing of the past. Being supportive like this might become a virus in itself, even a threat to the high and mighty.
