SPEED INDICATOR DEVICE

Earlier in the year Herts Highways installed a speed indication device in School Lane as you enter the village. This was installed in the wrong position and Herts Highways will be re-locating it and are waiting for

a new socket. It was due to be moved the week ending 6th November but it has been delayed.

DOG FOULING

The Parish Council reviewed the current dog fouling policy and agreed that no change was necessary. Parishioners may still use the existing litterbins for dog mess bags. There have been many incidents of fox and badger mess in the village, which may be confusing the issue.

VARIOUS WORKS IN THE VILLAGE

- lift the lower branches in the Parish which impede mowing
- clear the cut ins in Margery Wood which help prevent flooding on Churchfield Road

- replace the Upper Green notice board which will continue to have one half for parishioners to use.

Christmas Card Competition The *THACS* Christmas card competition, the first one we have organised, was very well supported by Tewin Cowper School, Tewin Under Fives and some of our village residents. The standard of entries was excellent, in both adult and children's categories, causing great difficulty for the team of judges who studied around two hundred very well produced cards.

The judging panel were so impressed with the quality of the children's entries. After a lengthy deliberation, it was decided to award a first, second and third to each school year. The designs and colours were excellent and it was clear to see how much time and effort had been put into each picture. Well done to all the children who took part!

The selection of overall children's winner was finally made and awarded to the card drawn by Jessica, aged 11, from Tewin Cowper School. Her winning picture will be used in a printed Christmas card and she will be presented with a batch of the cards to use as she wishes. (In response to the current lock-down we feel this to be more appropriate than our original intention to sell the cards locally in aid of local charities).

We would have liked entries from some of our older children in the village but unfortunately no entries were received from any groups above year six. I think they are waiting for the next *THACS* show to demonstrate their skills.

The adult entries - whilst fewer in number - were excellent and the winning entry, produced by Shirley Ashby, received £20 with second prize of £10 awarded to Sylvia Brown. Pictures of all the prize-winning entries can be viewed on the *THACS* web page.

Lockdown Times and Tales *THACS* and Tewin Writers Online have produced and published a fine little booklet entitled "Lockdown Times and Tales", consisting of 25 stories and poems that have appeared on the Tewin village website this year (including the three winners of the recent writing competition). The writings give an entertaining and interesting insight into how Tewin residents have been dealing with the challenges and impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic.

The booklets are being sold for £2 each, in aid of local charities. The main charity to benefit will be the Digswell Community and Gardening Project. It provides learning activities for vulnerable youngsters in a secure environment and needs your support even more in these difficult times (www.digswell.org.uk/).

The THACS Writers Online are starting a new Chapter of short stories and poems at their usual place on the Village website, <u>Horticulture, Arts &</u> <u>Crafts Society - Tewin Village</u>. On The Farm

October seems to have been a carbon copy of last year....very wet. We did however, get a few dry days to finish off the drilling. This year we are not growing peas as we try and farm on a 5 year rotation. A field of peas has now gone round the arable area so need a break this year.

This year we have ploughed in 80 acres of Winter beans. The seed beans have been spread on the surface of the field then ploughed in about 6-8ins deep. The conditions were not ideal, being very wet, and the germination of the seeds has been severely tested. We now hope that they will yield a good harvest.

The wheat crops have had a herbicide treatment to control weeds. There seems to be a huge bank of weed seeds in the soil. It is better to control them before the weed seeds grow and compete with the wheat than to have a large weed problem to control in the Spring.

We grow 1st and 2nd wheats and have a field on very light land which has grown wheat continually for 20 years. This is not normally done. 1st wheats are grown after a break crop such as peas/beans/oats/ oil seeds or left fallow. 2nd wheats have a special seed dressing which will hopefully prevent the crop from getting 'take-all', a disease of 2nd wheats.

We have sold about half of our harvest - peas, oats and some of our wheat. This will now give us some room in our grain barn. At this time of year we like to wash down our machines, grease up and check them over before putting them into Winter storage in the dry. I cannot stand to see expensive equipment standing outside in the cold and wet of Winter.

In these difficult times we wish you all a happy and healthy Christmas.

Poppy Day Collections Report

We are delighted to report that once again the Royal British Legion Poppy Day collections in Tewin were well supported and we are grateful to the following local businesses and institutions who displayed and sold the poppies: - Tewin Stores, The Rose & Crown, The Plume of Feathers, The Country Bumpkin, The White Horse and Tewinbury Farm Hotel, as well as Tewin School and St Peter's Church.

As a result, we were able to deliver the sum of £1,353 to the Royal British Legion. This figure is down on last year's total of £1,717, but when you take into account that we were unable to make house-to-house collections, and all of the pubs and restaurants were closed for a week prior to Remembrance Sunday, this was a magnificent effort. Therefore, we wish to thank everyone who contributed in any way, and also all those who made special efforts to collect such wonderful donations. People such as Sean at the Rose & Crown, who set up a Union Jack covered table on the forecourt of the Pub and for several hours, sold poppies to passers-by – both walkers, cyclists and motorists. This was a sterling effort. In addition, the Staff at The Plume of Feathers made their own special contribution: on the night before Lockdown when the pub was hosting a number of diners - the Serving Staff donated all their Tips to the Poppy collection, even though their paydays were in danger of being curtailed due to the imminent closures caused by the Lockdown. Typical Tewin generosity!

All these special people and the various institutions who housed the collection boxes are to be sincerely thanked for their efforts, as well as all the people of Tewin, and their visitors, who bought poppies and supported this very worthwhile cause. Also of course we are grateful to the local organisations who contributed and laid wreaths at the church. Let us hope that by this time next year all the current problems and restrictions will be just a memory and we'll all be back to resuming a normal life and able to again call on our willing house-to-house collectors.

Meanwhile, on behalf of the Royal British Legion – a heartfelt "Thank you".

Team Vicar's Letter

In these uncertain times one thing is looking certain - it will be a different kind of Christmas this year.

I hope very much that our church will be open for Christmas services, but with regulations around social distancing and singing we will still need to do things a little differently than usual.

But here's a guide to how to do Christmas in Tewin this year:

- From Sunday 29th November (Advent Sunday) 6th January (Epiphany) put a candle in your window where neighbours can see it. Either a real candle if you can do so safely, or a picture of a candle. Let's remind each other in this particularly difficult year that the message of Christmas is that light always conquers darkness.
- 2) Children should tune in to the online Christingle service on Sunday 13th December. Packs to make their own Christingles will be given out at school. There will be other packs in church for anyone who would like one, with instructions on how to come to our service on YouTube.
- 3) Check out updates for our Christmas services on the village website, Facebook and the church notice boards. There is likely to be a booking system this year – and possibly some very last minute changes.
- 4) Check in with neighbours who live on their own. Give them a call, pop round a card. Some of us will be finding the isolation of this time of year particularly difficult.
- 5) Give online to a charity. Many are struggling due to the cancellation of major fundraising events this year. Add them to your Christmas list. Be generous if you can.
- 6) Remember, in your own disappointments and worries, that the Christ -child took on fragile flesh and lived amongst us. He did so to reveal that God is with us and we are never alone. He did so to enter even the places of death, so that we may forever live in his life. He did so to reveal to us – that God's light shines in the darkness and that the darkness has not, will not, can not ever overcome it.

I do hope you know the peace of Christ this Christmas. If there is anything that is troubling you that you would like to talk about, or that you would like me to pray for, then please feel free to get in contact. Susannah

St Peter's News

The autumn colours this year have been spectacular, but now, in the churchyard, our Verger, Pete, has begun to sweep up the leaves. She prefers them to be wet as they rot down more easily, and she doesn't have to burn them. Fortunately, the rather wet October was helpful for her, even if it held up the building works on the Tower. The good news is that the builders have had a drier time in November, they have taken delivery of the necessary materials, and have been able to get on with the repairs. Hopefully, by the time you read this, they will have completed their work, and we can then look forward to having the scaffolding removed.

Following the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, Susannah streamed the next service from St Peter's, at which Nick and I took the oaths before the congregation to become Church wardens again for this year. Imagine my surprise when I got home to find two emails from former members of the congregation - Keith, who was Church warden some years ago, and now lives in France, and Margaret, who lives in Cornwall, both of whom had watched the service on YouTube, and were delighted to see that life was almost as they remembered it! The strange thing about this whole year is that, whilst in many ways the Covid Experience has been dreadful - very lonely for some, personally distressing for those who have lost loved ones or their livelihoods, very disruptive for schools and work, exhausting for those in the caring professions, in other ways, it has brought folk together. We have started to use better ways of working without long commutes, and we have used the new technology in work and leisure pursuits, and not least in enabling people, both near and far, who could not attend services, to still be part of our church community.

During November we welcomed a regular stream of visitors to our All Souls afternoon of prayers, when they were able to light candles for their loved ones who had died. On the same day, the Reverend Richard Syms conducted the Eucharist service in the morning. We had hoped he would be here again at the end of the month but of course since then the church has been closed for public worship, though still open for private prayer. If things go to plan, he will conduct **Midnight Mass at St Peter's on Christmas Eve.** As expected, **Remembrance Day** was different this year. Susannah streamed a live service from inside the church at 9.30am, when she formally inducted the Reverend Liz Lavelle into the Welwyn Team ministry, and then at 10.55am, she streamed an outside ceremony by the War Memorial. We were joined by those laying wreaths for the village organisations, and others scattered around the churchyard, drive, and well apart around the Memorial. Herbert Laming read the list of those from the village who died in the two World Wars. Many thanks to Gerry Ruddock who sounded the Last Post and the Reveille on his trumpet before and after the two-minute silence. It was a moving occasion at which Ben Roberts, probably the only veteran from the Second World War still living in the village, laid the wreath for Friends of Tewin. It was good to see children with their parents participating in this event as well.

Thank you to all those who have kindly contributed to the **church funds** for repair of the Tower and other essential parts of the church. If you are still thinking of putting something in the pot, and we should be very grateful for anything you are able to give, there are several ways you can do this: by using the button on the church pages of the village website, at

www.tewinvillage.co.uk, or by leaving an envelope at the church in the box by the South Door. Cheques payable to "St Peter's Church Tewin PCC". If you are able to Gift Aid your donation, please leave your name and address with your donation.

On-line banking payments may also be made to HSBC, for St Peter's Church Tewin, PCC, Sort Code 40-24-13 Account 90799718, with the reference" Repairs (your surname)".

We hope to hold a Christmas Concert instead of the Nine Lessons and Carols on Sunday 20 December at 6.30pm. As well as Midnight Mass at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve, there should be a Christmas morning Family Communion at 10am. See Page 3 for details. In any case at least one of these services will be streamed. Please be aware that Christmas services may change at any point. For up to date plans please check the Tewin village website and the church notice board - or contact the vicar or churchwardens.

We shall also have some Christmas cards available to buy in the shop in aid of the church, so please look out for them.

We hold in our prayers all those affected by Covid-19, those who have been ill, those who have died or are bereaved, those whose livelihoods have been devastated during the epidemic, and those who have family members at school or university or have returned to work.

Our clergy continue to be in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families.

Plotlands Between Marden Hill and Archers Green

Residents may be interested to know that Baron Deschauer, the mastermind behind the sale of plotlands in Tewin and other rural areas, has recently lost an appeal in the High Court. According to The Times of 10 October 2020, this latest verdict upholds an earlier one requiring his company to cease taking "covenant charges" of some £300 per year from the investors to maintain fictitious roads.

The verdict opens the way for people who bought land from Deschauer to claim back the charges they have already paid, which in many cases date back to 2012.

While this is some comfort to the affected owners, it leaves their Land Banking Victims Association still far away from recovering their sunk investments.

Ware Recycling Centre Has Now Reopened

The <u>Ware recycling centre</u> has now reopened. The centre is open **10am to 6pm every day** (closed Thursday and Friday) except Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day. The new site is larger, easier to use and includes a new reuse centre (where you can pick up a new pre-loved bargain). It is 4 times larger than the original site and includes:

- a split level design allowing the majority of waste to be deposited without the need for lifting or carrying up steps
- an internal access road to keep site users off the main road
- 38 reverse car parking / unloading spaces
- fenced off areas so that full containers can be swapped without closing the centre
- A large reuse centre with dedicated parking where residents can deposit, browse and purchase reusable items that would previously have been thrown away.

<u>Recycling Centres</u> in Hertfordshire, except Cole Green, remain open for essential visits during lockdown.
