PROPOSED NEW FOOTPATH ON HERTFORD ROAD

Thank you to everyone for your comments on this proposal. Due to the cancellation of the Parish Council meeting on 1st February 2021 the discussion/decision will be postponed to the next meeting the date of which is to be confirmed.

FAIRHOLME STABLES, Archers Green Lane 3/20/0810/FUL

Demolition of buildings and redevelopment of site to erect 3 detached dwellings with associated parking, access and landscaping. East Herts Council has granted permission for this application.

LAND OFF HERTFORD ROAD, Tewin 3/21/0104/FUL

Change of use of land, erection of stable block & fencing, creation of an exercise yard and hard standing with 3 car parking spaces and internal access way. Tewin Parish Council has submitted an objection to the application raising concerns over the openness of the green belt, safety concerns re the access, lack of screening and the importance of the ditch on the site in reducing flooding at Lousehole Bottom.

As at 1st April 2021 East Herts Council will be introducing a chargeable garden waste collection fortnightly from your existing brown bin. The annual cost will be £49.

Please be aware that England is still on lockdown in reference to captive birds as Bird Flu is still at a high level. Anyone with birds of all types, including chickens, must keep them in enclosed housing with a roof.

RAPID TESTING AVAILALE IN HERTFORDSHIRE

Free rapid testing (Lateral Flow Tests) for anyone **without** coronavirus symptoms is now available across Hertfordshire.

Key and essential workers who cannot work from home during the current government restrictions are especially encouraged to book a rapid test every few days to help us ensure that essential services are as safe as possible.

Tests are available by appointment only and bookable up to a week in advance. You'll need to take your booking confirmation email/text to your appointment and have your mobile phone with you (please ensure it is charged). Results are sent by text and email in 45 minutes. To book a rapid test, please visit www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/rapidtest . Please check the website regularly for updates as several new test centres have opened across Hertfordshire.

If you have symptoms of coronavirus you cannot have a rapid test and must <u>not</u> go to a rapid test centre – instead please book a standard coronavirus (PCR) test at www.gov.uk/coronavirus.

Can Students Design Our Future?

Hubbub have launched the second phase of Design By Nature, an exciting UK wide design competition encouraging university students and recent graduates to generate innovative ideas for a more sustainable future. And the best part? Entrants have an opportunity to see their ideas turned into reality; the winning ideas will be trialled as part of Hubbub's wider urban greening climate campaign in Manchester this summer.

The competition comprises of three live design briefs based on the theme of 'Good things happen when we connect to nature'- a growing topic that has been fuelled by the COVID pandemic.

The briefs are:

1) Green is the New Black

Inspire 18–25-year-olds to explore and spend time in their local green spaces and engage with nature in their everyday lives.

2) Bring the Outside In

Create an affordable, practical and evidence-based prototype that brings the multiple benefits of nature into the homes of low-income inner-city communities.

3) Use Nature for Good

Help low-income households or young people to make more sustainable choices in their day-to-day lives and become advocates for protecting the environment.

All the ideas submitted in response to the briefs will be reviewed by the Hubbub team and an expert judging panel. The winning ideas will be awarded with a Design By Nature commendation, and celebrated on social media and in top design press. Due to the significant support from the Wates Family Enterprise Trust, successful entrants will be offered both seed funding and expert advice to help bring their ideas to life. The design briefs and supporting research packs containing key insights on each topic can be downloaded on the Design By Nature website (www.hubbub.org.uk/designbynature-living-briefs).**Entries will close on the 31st May 2021.**

The first phase of Design By Nature in 2020 saw a standout entry of a new sewing machine for Gen Z, the stylish and foldable <u>'Sew Conscious'</u> machine, to help tackle the culture of throwaway fashion.

On The Farm

Since the beginning of the year we have had a huge amount of rain and the land is struggling to absorb the enormous volume of water. Over the years of farming we have had wet Winters. An old farmers' saying is 'February fills dykes' and this is certainly true this year. With more and more land being taken for houses, roads, and railways such as HS2, and flood plains being built on, problems are caused for large amounts of land. Old drainage systems are being disrupted and concrete is replacing fields.

Our River Mimram is in full spate as never before. With more of us able to walk in the countryside during the Covid restrictions, the footpaths have become very muddy. Please put on wellies before leaving home. Who would have thought this time last year that we would still be in lockdown! Usually at this time of year arable farmers would be taking a holiday in the sun for a week or two. They have no livestock to care for and the work on the land is done until the Spring when the land warms up. There is a little break followed by 9 months of hard work until after Harvest, with something to do in the fields every single day. As no two years are the same in farming and land conditions almost

alter by the day, I keep quite a lot of different equipment on the farm, including a Panbuster. This is a heavy duty cultivator and must be nearly 60 years old. It's not used very much but, when we want to move frozen land, it's the perfect tool. Some of our equipment is stored in a sheltered corner of a wood as I am unable to store all of the equipment in our barns. I have just brought back an old rotavator from the wood to the workshop to give it some tender loving care and bring it back to working life.

Apart from large land farming, some people like to farm in small areas of sustainable land. At Tewin Bury we have let someone have half an acre of land. He will be growing a range of seasonable vegetables using organic principles. We hope the produce will go to the farm shop and we will be able to offer them to the general public.

Team Vicar's Letter

Like many homes, baking has been a key part to the Underwoods' survival of the monotony of lockdown. There was a point, last year, where one daughter was producing a cake a day - the consumption of which was a challenge the rest of us admiringly rose to.

Whether it is banana bread, banoffee pie or attempting a GBBO battenburg, the nation's kitchens – and thus social media – have provided a wonder of mouth-watering, calorie prolific, flour-based products. Perhaps one of my biggest temptations last year was when flour could scarcely be found on a supermarket delivery site, but a large bag appeared in the church food bank donations. I resisted stuffing it up my cassock and sneaking it home – but it took great will power to do so.

Many religions place a great emphasis on food – be that through fasting or feasting. Lent and Easter have a whole host of delights that perhaps you might think of making at home as a way to mark this important time in the church calendar, seeing as many of us will still not be back at church for a little while yet.

We begin with pancakes on Shrove Tuesday – some of which we enjoyed together on our Zoom pancake party. Then come pretzels during Lent – the crossed over arms of which remind us of the need to always pray. The sweet Simnel cake appears on Mothering Sunday - with eleven marzipan balls for the disciples (or 12 if you're feeling charitable to Judas). We have hot cross buns on Good Friday and, of course, traditional lamb on Easter Sunday - remembering Jesus our Paschal Lamb – and the essential chocolate eggs – a sign of the empty tomb.

So why not bake yourself through Lent and Easter this year? I know traditionally we fast though Lent – but perhaps this is not a year to be too harsh on ourselves, we have given up so much already. Yet it is good to mark the season, to have an activity that helps remind us of the story that we are heading towards to celebrate – that Jesus walks with us through the wilderness times and leads us from death to life. Jesus blessed bread and shared it with his friends. I pray that he blesses you too.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

Another month gone and here we are in Lent. During January and February, we have seen Epiphany and Candlemas, had church coffee on Zoom and even enjoyed pancake tossing on-line together. All while churches remain closed except for private prayer. Thank you to our flower arrangers who continue to decorate the church when people only visit in ones and twos. The Lent course with its accompanying booklet (priced £2 from the church) is being led by our clergy on-line every weekday until Easter. The Welwyn team have streamed weekly services from one of the churches in the area with over 100 devices linking in each week. We know that sometimes we have friends from elsewhere in the country and across Europe joining our worship on Sunday mornings.

During February, the churchyard has been coming alive with aconites, snowdrops, and a few brave daffodils, despite the cold, wet, snowy weather. We have had more tree work done. Our Verger, Pete, has mulched the beds and held bonfires when the wind is strong enough to carry away the smoke. We are looking ahead to works inside the church this year with a view to becoming more environmentally friendly.

With the repairs to the church tower and other stonework completed we have paid the builders everything except for the small retainer. We have submitted our claim under the Listed Places of Worship Scheme for refund of the VAT that was charged and are hopeful that we shall get that back without undue delay. We would like to repeat our thanks to all those who have made donations towards the cost of those essential works.

We continue to hold in our prayers all those affected by Covid-19, those who have been ill, those who have died or are bereaved, those

whose livelihoods have been devastated during the epidemic, and those who have family members at school or university or have returned to work. Thank goodness the number of cases and deaths from Covid is reducing and it is welcome news that many of our residents have been vaccinated. The impact of Covid-19 will be felt for many months and years to come. Please light a candle at home each evening to remember those who have died and those who grieve their loss. One day we will be back inside the church to worship together, see our neighbours and friends and think tenderly of those we have lost over this year.

Our clergy are in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families.

Citizens Advice - Who And How Are We Helping?

We continue to operate a remote advice service which has enabled us to help over 7,269 people (as of end January) since the first lockdown in March, up 31% on 2019. We are seeing an increase in demand for our support with issues becoming more complex. Benefits and Housing are the biggest areas of need and we are fundraising to be able to offer more specialist casework support in these areas.

As an advice service our focus is on making sure people are able to access all the support they need, including financial. As part of this we are able to issue food and fuel vouchers where needed and to help clients access some grants, including the new (time limited) Winter Grant.

Prostate Cancer

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer in men in the UK. One in eight men in the UK will get prostate cancer. It usually develops slowly, so there may be no signs for many years.

Symptoms of prostate cancer

Symptoms of prostate cancer do not usually appear until the prostate is large enough to affect the tube that carries urine from the bladder out of the penis (urethra).

If you do notice changes in the way you urinate, this is more likely to be a sign of a very common non-cancerous problem called an enlarged prostate, or another health problem. But it's still a good idea to get it checked out. Possible changes include:

- difficulty starting to urinate or emptying your bladder
- a weak flow when you urinate

- a feeling that your bladder hasn't emptied properly
- dribbling urine after you finish urinating
- needing to urinate more often than usual, especially at night
- a sudden need to urinate you may sometimes leak urine before you get to the toilet.

It is also worth being aware of prostate cancer risk factors. These are:

- Being aged 50 or over. If you fit into this category please do the IPSS questionnaire and if you score highly then contact your GP.
- Having a father or brother that has had prostate cancer.
- Ethnic origin prostate cancer is more common among men of African- Caribbean and African descent.
