On The Farm Harvest Update

Our oats became ready for harvest, and luckily a short gap of much drier and warmer days became available on the 2nd and 3rd of August, which let us harvest them. The straw was wanted by a friend. Unfortunately the straw was damp and we had to leave it for a couple of days to dry out. Then, on the Thursday, it rained and it is still on the field. The crop yielded well. The oats were sold for harvest movement. They were put on the drying floor, to get the moisture to 15%, and I expect some lorries to take them away. I will fill you in at a later date as to where they will end up .

I hope by the time you read these notes that our wheat will be harvested and in store as we have had some Summer Weather (Sunshine)!

The world grain trade is driven by America and how its crops are in the Mid West, (the central plains of America).

I sell my crops to 3 main grain traders - Frederic Smart, North Herts Farmers Grain, and Glencore Grain. I receive texts from them once or twice a week letting me know how the crops are worldwide and the latest prices.

All trade is driven by the weather. Currently prices are high due to drought, and the very hot weather in America, Canada and other areas of importance like Russia, Ukraine and the Black Sea area. There has been some very wet weather in Europe, and to a lesser extent Australia, and no one knows how crops will yield till harvest time, so we don't know the value of our crops until after harvest.

This September marks ten years of my being vicar at Tewin and Datchworth and a decade seems an occasion to look back on living within these special communities. In that time I have been privileged to conduct around 100 weddings, 150 baptisms and 300 funerals.

There have been fabulous village fetes, celebrations, concerts and parties. I have been asked to bless babies, marriages, pubs and slugs. I have laughed so much – and also cried - and for both been given some wonderful hugs (remember those?). There have been quieter moments too - around hospital beds, in empty churches or praying with people in their living rooms, where God has felt very close. There have been some extraordinary acts of kindness, generosity and charity that I have witnessed. And there has been a lot of tea, cake and, when needed, gin.

Being a vicar is such a privilege. It often proves to be a generous invitation into people's lives. For some occasions that means just a dip into an important moment for them, such as a bereavement or marriage, and with others it means a more consistent living alongside. I delight in the special relationship I have with our schools, the contact with young people through our youth groups but also the stories of fascinating lives I gain through older generations.

Ordination is summed up for me in the words of a past Archbishop, Michael Ramsey. Being a priest he says is 'being with God for the people, and being with the people for God'.

Thank you to all of you who have shared these last years with me. I gain far more from you than I will ever be able to give.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

I have been rereading the chapter on the church in *The History of Tewin by the People of Tewin* during August. Some of you may be aware that we are planning to reprint the book and to produce a second volume of life in the village in the past twelve years during which so much has happened. Did you know that electricity was only fitted in the church in 1953? Until that time all services would have been candlelit. The church must have been so dark for much of the year. It makes it a very unwelcoming place when it is dark and gloomy. During August we have been consulting the congregation and anyone who visits to discover their views on where we should have new LED lights to bring us into the 21st century.

August has also been the month when we have visited our sister churches in the Team Ministry for our programme of Summer Evensongs, which is always a delight. Ours coincided with Susannah's Garden Party at the Rectory in Datchworth, making the 15th a busy day for St Peter's with Family Service in the morning as well. Our Family Service in July was on such a nice sunny day that we held it in the churchyard, gathering outside the West Door to be able to hear the organ and to all sing together. Since the change in the Covid guidance for services we have begun singing again in church. People are encouraged to wear masks if they wish and to ensure their neighbours are happy to be seated nearby. We are still only taking bread for communion and coffee has been served outside the West Door to avoid too much close contact. But by and large we are getting back to normal. Our joint service with Datchworth took place at All Saints, Datchworth instead of on Burnham Green this year as there was no Burnham Green Festival. We are starting our rotas for Coffee, Sidesmen, and Readers which have largely been covered by Nick, Pete, and me over the pandemic. So if you are approached about coming back to such duties at church, please do think about participating in services again. You have been missed.

We are looking forward to a different **Harvest Festival on the 19th September**. This will be an **Open-Air Service on Lower Green at 11.15am** with cake and Pimm's afterwards. The BBQ in aid of Tewin Stores will be at 1pm and at 3pm we are invited to attend a **concert in St Peter's given by the SAVoce choir** that sang so beautifully for us at our Carol Service last Christmas. This will be followed by tea and cake. There will be no tickets, but people will be asked for donations from which the profit will go to the church building fund.

We will not be going to take food or duvets to St Saviour's Priory for the time being as they are still "well-supplied" with everything they need. They value our prayers and encouragement and thank us for our kindness and support.

We hope that if you have managed to get away this summer or been able to welcome family and friends not seen for many months that you and they have remained safe and well. We have members of the congregation still suffering from long Covid and we pray for all those who have been affected by the virus as the numbers continue to rise around the country and across the world. We continue to hold in our prayers all those who have lost loved ones during this year from whatever cause.

Our clergy are in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families. On This September Day

2nd September 1954

The National Trust for Scotland acquired Fair Isle, an island known for its birdlife and knitted sweaters Julia and Dagmar's Wing Walk.

(The sequel to last month's article, Two Wonderful Tewin Women On Their Flying Machine)

A few weeks ago, Julia Kempson (nee Tizard) telephoned me. 'You're going to be annoyed with me as I've agreed to do something daft'. Those of you who have the pleasure of knowing Julia know that's nothing new. 'I'm going on a wing walk on a real plane! And I'm doing it with Dagmar Brook who is raising funds for the Isabel Hospice in her late husband Phillip's name'.

Having chastised her for doing such a daft thing I was delighted it was in support of our local hospice as I had recently had wonderful and compassionate help from them when they looked after Jean, my late wife, and enabled her to be at home with me in her last days.

I was even more delighted when Julia asked me if she could do the Wing Walk in memory of Jean.

On the appointed day a few cars left Tewin for a small airfield near Upminster and there the ladies and their support team saw the aircraft for the first time. A bi-plane, big and solid-looking but old, very old.

A smiling Dagmar was first to fly and was followed by Julia a short time later. Whilst being strapped into the seat – if you can call it that, it was more like a small square through which you placed your backside with the lower frame of the seat resting under the upper thighs – Julia yelled to me and pulled from her pants the Order of Service at Jean's funeral. 'I'm taking Jean up with me' she shouted just before her voice was drowned out by the noise of the engine starting.

Our intrepid aviators raced down the grass runway and, at a speed of over 130 miles an hour, flew off into the distance. A few minutes later the aircraft returned and, quite literally, dive-bombed the awe-struck crowd, climbed, banked steeply, and proceeded to do a small circuit climbing, diving and banking all the time. I felt queasy just looking. How the girls fared I dread to think. They both had smiles on their faces, however and seemed to enjoy the ride.

To date our lovely ladies, Julia and Dagmar, have raised over £7,000 for the Isabel Hospice and this amount is increasing every day. If you wish to donate to such a worthwhile cause, simply contact me. I'll be pleased to pop round to collect your contribution at a mutually convenient time.

Do You Have An Idea That Will Benefit The Community?

East Herts Council welcomes applications for a grant of up to £300 at any time. Individuals or informal groups with an idea that could really make a difference to their community – especially to people who are vulnerable - are encouraged to apply alongside charities. We are looking for some creative projects that bring people together after Covid. Check eligibility and apply online at www.eastherts.gov.uk. Past projects include a community garden, photography exhibits, a dance project, PPE and sports equipment and improvements to a hall.

The next funding round for large grants opens mid October. Contact Claire on claire.pullen@eastherts.gov.uk if you want to discuss your idea. We are especially interested in receiving applications to support individuals and communities who may have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic. For example, we know the impact of Covid-19 on health outcomes shows disparities according to protected characteristics such as disability and ethnicity. We also know that 29% of local super output areas in East Herts are rural and while these areas are lovely green places to live, residents can often feel isolated and struggle to access services, transport and broadband.

Local good causes are also encouraged to register on the East Herts Community Benefit Lottery, https://www.easthertslottery.co.uk/. More than 120 charities and community and voluntary groups are already raising a steady monthly income by selling tickets from this platform. 50p of each ticket sold goes to good causes. Supporters have an opportunity to win up to £25,000!

Patient Participation Group for Welwyn Garden City's Urgent Care Centre (UCC) is to *close overnight*, due to very low numbers of patients using its services at night for a number of years. This decline has been consistent, despite an increasing local population, suggesting that people are using the new alternative sources of help and support now available.

The new closing time will be 10pm. Patients already in the UCC being treated, or waiting to be treated, at 10pm would continue to be cared for appropriately. The UCC will re-open at 8am every morning.

In making their unanimous decision, the Governing Body of the East and North Hertfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group, noted that:

- on average, less than one person per hour visits the UCC between 10pm and 8am
- the UCC has to be staffed by at least two highly skilled nurses at all times, for safety reasons
- these staff could be better used to care for more of the area's seriously unwell patients at the area's Emergency Department, at the Lister Hospital in Stevenage
- a wide range of alternative sources of health help and support are available overnight locally to people with an urgent need, including overnight GP appointments and mental health help. These services have been invested in and expanded in recent years.

The date from which the UCC will close overnight will be agreed with the Trust and publicised widely throughout the local area.
