Congratulations to all the exhibitors at the Autumn Show! It's great to have this traditional village show back after a gap of two long years and the displays of exhibits were colourful, attractive and enjoyed by all.

This 19<sup>th</sup> annual Autumn Show proved to be a great success thanks to the 107 exhibitors who entered 276 exhibits. These numbers are very similar to those of the last Autumn Show in 2019 and it was reassuring to see that the level of support was not diminished by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Various Covid safety measures were in place. We also seemed to have luck on our side! The weather was good, so the extra ventilation worked well and the outdoor seating area in the gazebo was comfortable, restful and popular.

When it came to the presentation of the prizes, the adult trophy winners were Mavis Haggar for Flower Arranging, Ray Keppler for Flowers, Michael Clark for Vegetables & Fruit, Terry Brand for Arts & Crafts, Terry Brand for Photography and Hilary Tipping for Culinary. The Tewin Cowper School Parents' Association Award is usually presented to the exhibitor with the highest number of points in the children's classes for horticulture, arts & crafts and culinary. This time, the competition resulted in a tie for first place and the joint winners were Erin Murray and Annabel Goodison. They were both presented with the well-earned winners' certificate and will each hold the trophy for six months.

Unfortunately, there were no entries in the children's photography class, so the George Humble Crawford Award for Children's Photography was not awarded.

#### On The Farm

A normal oat has a husk, Naked Oat does not have a husk. We grow Naked Oats as a break crop on our farm. I have a contract to grow them, and they are much in demand as there are various end uses, such as in animal feeds, Wild Bird Food, Poultry feed, and Horse feed, with the versatility reaching as far as cosmetics. They needed a little drying on the floor. The company, G B Seeds, sent in 4 lorries to clear them when dry, which gave me space for the incoming wheat crop.

The wheat harvest started on the 11th of August, almost 2 weeks later than normal! A strange Summer with NO SUNSHINE and very damp mornings with heavy dew meant that we could not start harvesting 'til about 2pm in the afternoon. By then it was about 17% moisture. We don't want to harvest anything over 18% as it takes time to dry. By 10 or 11pm the crop was down to 15% which we wanted, so a lot of night work was done - a very stop and go wheat Harvest. We finished on the 16th of August. Considering the weather the crop has yielded well. We then headed over to help a friend who farms near Ware, and combined approx 100 acres of wheat and beans for him.

I have had comments about the white heaps in the fields. I have had about 200 tons of Screened Chalk delivered. My spreader man travels over the fields with his GPS system to check the fields. This will tell him whether the soil is getting acid or alkaline. I try and keep my levels between 6.5 and 8. The GPS system will tell him what parts need chalk or not. If I want to grow good crops it's most important we keep the levels about right. When the spreader man comes back with his spreader load of chalk, the GPS system will only spread were it's needed. We generally spread at a rate of about 1.5 tons per acre.

# Team Vicar's Letter

When we look back on this pandemic one of the tragedies I will certainly remember is the impact the restrictions had on those who found themselves in a time of grief. Performing funerals in the open air, or in a crematorium with only six people there was a time when not even siblings or grandchildren were deemed close enough as family to make it through the government restrictions on attendance. We have lost members of our own church family and members of this village community where the only thing we could do was to line the streets as the hearse drove by. I suspect few of us have been completely untouched in this way. For that reason it feels as if this year's All Souls Memorial service has a special poignancy.

Every year in church we hold a memorial service for people to come and hold before God in prayer, those they have loved who have since died. It is a quiet, reflective, peaceful service. We hear the names of loved ones read out in that holy space, and light candles to remember that love for them that still burns within us.

It is a service that anyone can attend. If you have missed out on the comfort and space of a funeral and would appreciate a time to remember a neighbour, friend or member of your family then you would be most welcome. # **St Peter's News**

#### A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

Another month, and the autumn is upon us. By the time you read this, the church will have celebrated Harvest Festival: a bit differently from previous years with an Open-Air service on Lower Green in the morning, and a concert followed by tea and cake in the afternoon in the church. Autumn seems to come earlier every year, and whereas harvest festival normally took place after the harvest was safely gathered in in September, the harvest seems to have been safely gathered in during August, the fields carefully ploughed and re-sown with winter crops before the service of thanksgiving takes place! All part of the rich tapestry of country life and further evidence of the gradual changes in our climate, I suppose.

A meeting took place at St Mary's Welwyn one Saturday morning to follow up on the fascinating Lent Course some of us studied this spring. There were six main subjects which are of concern to us all – the importance of HOME – and homelessness, WORK – and modern slavery, WASTE – the huge piles of plastic waste on land and in the sea, FOOD – the need for Food Banks and food waste, being a good NEIGHBOUR – how we treat strangers in our communities such as asylum seekers and refugees and finally NATURE - how we protect our planet. The course seemed particularly relevant this year with the impact of the pandemic, the aftermath of the Syrian and Afghanistan conflicts, the numbers of people relying on Food Banks and so on. So, we met to discuss practical things we could do through the churches in the Welwyn team. We already support the Food Banks locally. There is s scheme to recycle furniture – Furniture Friends based at Datchworth Church which gives unwanted usable furniture to people who find themselves with nothing. We resolved to gather bicycles looking for new homes for a charity which repairs them for use of folk who are looking for work. We will also be knitting for other charities that collect hats and jumpers for refugee children. Maybe you too might like to look out for ways for you to contribute to these initiatives. Our

Rector David Munchin has once again been cycling for charity – this time for Herts Welcomes Refugees. Details of all these initiatives are on the www.welwyn.org.uk website.

During September David Rawlins has taken part in the Bike n' Hike in aid of the Beds and Herts Historic Churches Trust. Half of everything he raises comes back to Tewin Church to support our building repair fund. Thank you to him and to others who have sponsored his efforts. **Starting on 7<sup>th</sup> October** and for six Thursdays to follow, Edward Cardale will be leading **a Home Group to study** *The Psalms and our emotions* at my house, 30 Godfries Close. Do let Edward or me know if you would like to come: edward.cardale@btinternet.com.

It doesn't seem possible that Susannah has been our vicar for ten years now. She and all the Welwyn team have been a great support to the village and our surrounding church communities especially during this past year. Thank you to her and Bob for the joint celebration with Datchworth church in her garden in August. Speaking to friends and family elsewhere in the country, I find that some churches have still not opened since the lockdown last year. Our thanks then to the Welwyn team for keeping the churches open, for streamed services, and support to people at home.

One of the first things to land in my inbox was a request from some local walkers and dog walkers to apply to Herts County Council to establish legal Rights of Way (ROW) for the paths around the periphery of the large Plotlands field bounded by Hertford Road to the north and Archers Green Lane to the south. These paths have been walked for decades by Tewin locals, and the request was prompted by sections of the path being blocked by newly erected fences. To make the case, I need to collect 'witness statements' from people who have walked the paths for the past 22 years or more. So, if you have walked these paths since before May 1999, and are willing to complete the forms which say that, I would like to hear from you. Please contact me via email (mjpurser@hotmail.com). I would encourage everyone to get out there and enjoy the footpaths and glorious countryside surrounding Tewin. There are two organised group walks every Thursday morning leaving from Lower Green. The first

starts at 9.30am, led by Chris Haden, and is a brisk ramble for just under a couple of hours. The second, led by Maureen Masterman, leaves at 10am and is a more relaxed walk lasting just under an hour and a half. Both walks involve a friendly chat en route and meeting outdoors afterwards for a cup of tea.

# **Tewin Stores and Cafe**

At the time of writing, we are looking forward to our late summer BBQ. We hope the weather will be kind to us to enable us to enjoy our BBQ on Lower Green. This is an important fund-raising event for the shop, and we are very grateful to Gerry and Paula for providing the BBQ and for the volunteers who provide and serve the salads.

Thanks to the efforts of two of our committee volunteers, we received confirmation that our application for a Covid Recovery grant from East Herts council was successful. As part of that grant scheme we have also been signed up as a beneficiary of the East Herts Lottery - check out our page by searching 'Tewin Stores East Herts Lottery' or see details in the shop.

As a result of this funding, we have now ordered 2 new single door chillers for the shop to replace the double door chiller that failed a few weeks ago. We were forced to order single door chillers as double door chillers need to be turned sideways to fit through the shop door; doing this would have invalidated the warranty besides which they are extremely heavy and would have been very difficult to manoeuvre.

We are experiencing some supply difficulties possibly the result of the HGV driver shortage that has been widely covered in the media. Please bear with us, we are working hard to stay in stock of your favourite items.

We recently held a volunteers' meeting which I'm pleased to say was very well attended. The primary purpose of the meeting was to thank the volunteers for their hard work and support for the shop and café. Members of the committee provided an overview of the shop's performance and gave details of our plans to cover the courtyard and replace the kitchen. We plan to hold another meeting before Christmas.

Whilst on the topic of horror and recycling, the waste bins behind the shop are being ransacked on an almost nightly basis. Waste is being strewn on the floor around the bins meaning the shop managers and volunteers have to clear up in the mornings! It is a very unpleasant task and why anyone would want to do this is beyond us.
