Four *Colly* Birds or Four *Calling* Birds?

After much research, both would appear to be acceptable. But what are they? The song 'The Twelve Days of Christmas' has long been passed down by word of mouth. The first written version was in 1780 and it mentioned **colly** birds, colly meaning black like coal dust. So does it mean a blackbird or a canary (a colliery bird)? No-one knows. **Calling** bird began to rival colly in the 1950s and 60s and by the 1970s was the predominant version.

On The Farm

We have completed our Autumn drilling, sowing next year's Harvest, and on the whole everything has gone reasonably well. Seed beds are of good quality, after those huge dumps of rain in late September. Luckily the soil dried out for drilling to continue and all pre-emergence herbicides have been applied and land work finished on the 15th of October. I have sold a large tonnage of wheat from our store, as there has been a big demand from local mills. The price is good due to weather affecting crop yields across the world. There is no large stock of grain anymore, we almost live from a hand to mouth existence.

I find it hard to understand our Government's Farming Policy, all my farming life we, as a family, have produced food! With production of milk, beef, potatoes, eggs, wheat, and barley. Now they would like me to plant trees over a large area of my farm and sow a wild bird mix on the rest to feed the wild life. No Food Production!

But they are very happy to do trade deals with Australia and New Zealand, and buy their sheep meat, beef and anything else they might want to sell us, which probably is not up to our standard of production, and ship it from the other side of the world. What is the cost of this, and all of those $C0^2$ emissions? I feel the Government should support its own farmers.

Those of you travelling along the B1000 road to Digswell and onto Welwyn may have been involved in big holdups with 2 sets of Traffic Lights. This is because a Sewer Pump Station has been shut down in Bessemer Road. This pumped sewer main is laid under one of my fields at Tewin Water and has burst open and flooded the field with sewage. We found the sewer pouring out on the 1st of October. It took Thames Water and their contractors a week to control the flow. The company has had about 16 tankers working day and night on both sites to control the sewer.

Team Vicar's Letter

On the hillsides,

hope was heard singing unexpected Hallelujahs... An extract from the poem 'Hope was Heard Singing' by Sally Foster-Fulton

Christmas is a time of hope – we hope we might get what we want or need as a gift; we hope others will like what we bought for them; we hope the turkey (or vegan loaf) cooks properly and that no one in the family starts a row. For a lot of us we may be hoping that Covid doesn't mar our gatherings for a second year in a row.

That kind of hoping is a little like crossing our fingers, or we might even throw up a quick prayer. We know there is an amount of uncertainty over whether what we would like to happen will happen.

I was shown quite recently two different ways of saying hope in sign language. The kind of hope I have mentioned above is signed with a hand that is out flat, palm down and wavers to and fro. It shows things are in the balance and could go either way.

But I was interested to hear of a sign for the Christian hope that is spoken of in the Bible. The sign for that is quite different. One hand acts as a firm foundation, palm upwards, while the second hand is curled into a fist and placed solidly on top of the other palm. There is no wavering. Both hands are still and confident. It shows a hope that is steadfast, immovable and not to be shaken.

So whatever we may hope for this Christmas with regard to our personal situations or the world, the story we celebrate tells us there is a hope that is certain. The hope found in the love of Jesus, the light of the world, who is born in the dark when most of the world doesn't even notice. And the hope found in the love of Jesus who breaks open even the darkness of the grave to reveal life unstoppable.

The light has shone in the darkness. And the darkness has not overcome it. John 1:5

So however your Christmas turns out this year, listen out for those unexpected Hallelujahs of hope singing on the hillsides, in the streets, in your home.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

We have had a busy time in the church over the autumn. It was good to welcome back old friends to the church for our service of All Souls at the very end of October. It is always a beautiful, peaceful time when we remember our loved ones who are no longer with us. But it is still a time when folk make a special effort to come back to Tewin, where many of them were brought up, to light a candle and pray for their relatives and friends. So many of our older residents have passed away during the past two years. Thank you to everyone who came to commemorate those who have died.

Edward Cardale has led some very enjoyable evenings during October and November taking time for us to look in more depth at some of the psalms. He remembers managing to sing all the psalms in a month, as a chorister at Winchester cathedral. Most of us rarely remember many of them at all except the most well-known like the 23rd Psalm (The Lord is my Shepherd...). Our services at St Peter's do not usually include a reading or sung version from the psalms. Consequently, it was very interesting to hear about more of them in detail. Edward looked at those which were joyful, others sad or angry. It was interesting to note how many important phrases, used in Christian worship, come from the psalms, which are of course in use also in other Abrahamic faiths – such as Judaism and Islam.

During November our Service of Remembrance was conducted by the Bishop of Hertford, the Right Reverend Michael Beasley. We were also pleased to have Gerry Roberts with us again to play the Last Post and Reveille on his trumpet. With the bells, the laying of wreaths, the naming of those who died, this is always a fitting way to remember those who gave their lives in war in the last century. It is good to see young and old at these events. Bishop Michael also spent an afternoon in the village visiting the school and shop and meeting the Parochial Church Council over supper. By the time this magazine is published we shall have had our Christmas Bazaar for which Vicky de Naeyer and Amanda Glew have been working hard, along with all their helpers before and on the day. Thank you to them and to everyone who has contributed items for sale or raffles and so on and to everyone who came to support it. More next month about the result of their efforts.

Now we are looking forward to our services over the important Christian festivals of Advent and Christmas. In church there will be our **Carol Service on 19th December**, **Crib Service and Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve and All Age Eucharist on Christmas Day morning** (details on p3). Outside **on 12th December**, weather permitting, we shall present our **All age Nativity** –a chance for everyone to see the story of the birth of Christ enacted by real people. I'd like to say it is like a Medieval Mystery play but really it is an opportunity for me personally to overact quite disgracefully. But it is lovely to see real sheep, a real baby, and a donkey (small pony). We all enjoy it even when it is freezing cold. Do come to at least one of our Christmas events– you will be very welcome. Please wear a mask and act responsibly towards others. We will not be operating the booking system we had last year but we shall try to ensure no-one feels uncomfortable as they sit in the church.

Sadly, we know that Covid is still rife in the area, so we continue to be vigilant and careful in church, wearing masks when moving around, not taking wine at communion. It is great to see people coming back to services as they feel more confident. Our clergy are still in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families.

Tewin Tennis Club

Yes, we say it again, but Autumn is well and truly here and don't the colours in the trees look spectacular? Winter is on the way and the colours will disappear. But no reason to be glum and stay indoors. As they say 'no such thing as bad weather, trong clothes'.

So we can easily play tennis through the winter and what better way to blow off the cobwebs and enjoy a social game. The Tewin tennis courts offer one of the best surfaces for winter play, they dry off quickly and are playable without the balls becoming wet, heavy and unpleasant. The club has as one of its main objectives to keep the playing surfaces in great shape and they are indeed looking good and in great shape just now.

Many of the club members will remember some time ago that the courts were surrounded on three sides by trees and indeed on two sides by large Leylandii. Advantages: the courts felt secluded and in the "country" (though how Leylandii can ever make you feel in the country I will never understand). Disadvantages: the courts were shaded and debris from the trees needed constant clearing. Hard work and enough to put you off playing. In winter any frost hung about on the courts for some time as they were shaded. Development around the courts ended with most of the trees and thankfully all of the Leylandii disappearing, with a new brick wall appearing. Advantages: the courts dried quickly, winter frosts melted more quickly and surfaces stay clean, though the courts felt stark and no longer in the countryside.

Thanks to some strategic thinking from our Chairman, ' operation hide the wall' was born! Whips were bought and a work team was hustled together to spend a day planting whips - puny insignificant things - along the wall. I remember looking at them thinking, "that will take some growing". Well here we are, a few years later and indeed we have a fine screen of fabulous native British trees to the south of the courts. The courts again feel like they are secluded and in the countryside. Disadvantages? None! The courts get maximum light and sun dries them out quickly in summer and winter. We no longer struggle with constant clearing of debris from the leylandii. Walk on and play!

No excuses, we have great surfaces and plenty of opportunity to play. Just dress for the weather and enjoy the fresh air to blow off the winter blues.

Speeding

In early November the Drivesafe Team carried out a morning speed monitoring session at Upper Green. The results were absolutely shocking with far too many drivers registering excessive speeds, in some cases up to 47 mph. We have strong reasons to believe that a number of the speeding cars were local.

We witnessed a pedestrian with two dogs struggling to cross from the footpath opposite Upper Green. One driver clearly decided it was the walker's job to get out of the way of their speeding car. We also saw a lady cycling her child to school using a buggy towed behind her bicycle. She and her young child deserve protection from speeding cars. Likewise a teenager walking to catch the school bus has no option but to walk in the road.

From feedback from individuals who stop and chat to us, the work of the Drivesafe team is considered beneficial and important.

There is a 30 mph speed limit throughout Tewin. Please keep below the limit. If you are one of the many drivers who do adhere to the speed limit please do not be harassed by drivers following too close. You have every right to drive at the correct speed.

Although we are working for the police as volunteers it is likely that Hertfordshire Police will carry out their own monitoring and issue fines. There have also been reports from around the country of police forces concerned by a drop in driving standards since lockdown was eased.

We all know there are no winners from accidents and lives can be shattered. Many footpaths and houses give directly onto the road and can catch out drivers.
