The Queen's Green Canopy Takes Root In Hertfordshire

The Queen's Green Canopy project, which encourages people and organisations to 'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee', has started to take root in Hertfordshire with over 850 trees being planted this year so far. Over the next 18 months, we expect over 36,000 trees to be planted across the county by a combination of local landowners, district, borough, town and parish councils, amongst a host of other organisations and individuals, alongside our own planting projects.

Recently, we have planted at two 'statement' sites, County Hall, Hertford and Aldenham Country Park, featuring an avenue of 30 lime trees along the entrance to the park, with 350 more trees planned for the site next year. The County Hall planting consists of 27 trees which was capped off by a small ceremony during the Sustainable Hertfordshire Eco-Fair. If you are planting a tree over the next two years, you can pin your tree to the Queen's Green Canopy map, at https://queensgreencanopy.org/map-education-hub/, to make it count towards Hertfordshire's total.

First Supermarket Opens In Britain

So who opened the first supermarket in Britain? Not Tesco, who only opened their first one in 1954; nor Sainsbury's, who were four years ahead of them. Not even dear old M&S, though they were close with their Wood Green Store in 1948. The first full-scale supermarket in Britain was opened by the London Cooperative Society, in Manor Park, on **January 12 1948** – a mere 32 years after Clarence Saunders began exploiting the self-service concept in his wonderfully named Piggly Wiggly store in Memphis, Tennessee.

The Romford Co-op had introduced a very limited amount of self-service space in 1942 but, given that there was a war on, retail innovation was not a pressing concern and there was not much to sell.

While many of us rant about the overweening power of the supermarket giants, anyone with experience of the queues and scant choice in counter-service general stores of the 60s and 70s laments their passing very little.

Housewives queued in the bitter cold outside the Manor Park store on opening day; legend has it they were transfixed by the wide selection, and flummoxed by the concept of taking things off shelves themselves. The great-grandchildren of those women now often don't even go into the store to do their shopping.

CHRISTMAS TREE

The Parish Council would like to thank Friends of Tewin who have arranged the decorating of the Christmas tree on Lower Green.

PRECEPT

At their meeting on 6th December the Parish Council reviewed the precept options for the Financial Year Ending 31.3.2023 and agreed to add in an annual amount for tree works in the parish of £1,000 which are likely to arise following the tree survey. In accordance with the Financial Regulations of the Council they unanimously agreed to increase the precept by 4.76% from £31,500 to £33,000.

Herts County Councillor Ken Crofton has advised that the drain has been inspected again and 30 to 40 metres of underground drainage pipe has to be replaced. Highways will be applying for a road closure notice to undertake this work.

ELECTORAL REVIEW OF WARD BOUNDARIES CONSULTATION

Tewin Parish Council responded to this consultation saying that it is content with the current arrangement for District Council wards, where the parish is split into two parish wards with the north ward being included in Hertford Rural North and the south ward being included in Hertford Rural South.

Winter on the Farm

At this time of year we sell part of our Wheat Harvest and have space in the grain barn. I like to put our machines through the workshop, to check them over, so they will be ready to use in the coming season, and then be stored in the grain barn. There are lots of problems in the grain trade, due to a shortage of bulk haulage operatives. My major problem at the moment is the price of gas, which is used in the manufacture of Nitrogen Fertiliser. The price has more than doubled for the coming season.

The Sewer Pipe on the B1000.

One does not think much about a sewer main, but it's part of everyday life. It's the unseen pipe! Without it our everyday house functions would not work.

This pipe, now owned by Thames Water, was put in about 100 years ago. The sewer comes from the Welwyn area and is a pumped main from that area. Most sewers are gravity fed. The contractors have had to replace about 500 metres of pipe, which has rusted away, so I have a large area of land being dug up, and everything in its path cleared away. Trees cut down, branches cut off, saplings dug up, and anything which has grown on top of the pipe cleared. They had to dig across the B1000, shutting access to the road, which must have taken 2 weeks. It was a major problem as the pipe was very deep at this point, about 4.5 metres deep. It then was connected into the Dawson Sewer. I remember this sewer being dug in the 1950's when I was a young lad, about knee high to a grasshopper. Does anyone else remember this being dug by those drag line cranes?

This Dawson Main Sewer starts near Digswell, and flows through the Mimram Valley, through Panshanger Park, through Hertford, on to Hoddesdon then into the Rye Meads sewer treatment works.

What a wonderful achievement by those men and machines over 70 years ago.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

This year seems to have rushed past and yet it also appears to be forever since last Christmas. Last Christmas we had ticketed services, a Tewin Nativity on screen and, unexpectedly, Susannah was unable to be with us for all the special services over Christmas as she was shielding. This year we hope Christmas has been more as planned, though with the weather so unpredictable, who can say, as I write this in the second week of December.

At the end of November, we held our Christmas Bazaar and were delighted that people came to support this happy event. The church raised over $\pounds 3,000$ which will help with our focus on making the church more eco-friendly. We are planning to install new LED lighting in 2022.

Earlier in the autumn I told you about various things the Welwyn team was doing as a Church in Action project. We have supported the Food Bank in Stevenage for several years now. This autumn we decided to support refugee and asylum seekers more actively by knitting hats, scarves, and gloves to give to cold, needy people arriving from abroad, and also, to give unwanted bikes to The Bike Project, (www.thebikeproject.co.uk). I am pleased to say we have provided about fifty hand crafted goods to Herts Welcomes Refugees. These have gone to asylum seekers who have been housed in West Hertfordshire hotels, and to Afghan refugees in St Albans. The Welwyn Bike Project has gathered over 30 bikes at a lock-up in Codicote ready for collection by our closest repair centre in Bushey. Did you know that thousands of bikes every year end up in canals and rivers and landfill or languishing in sheds and garages? This is a marvellous UK project through which volunteers have, to date, refurbished over 20,000 unwanted bikes which are then moved on to refugees and others seeking work to enable them to look for work and to get to work. Any proceeds are used to obtain parts for other bikes.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the Bike Project or has provided lovely, knitted goods, or has made donations to the Food Bank this year.

We continue to hold in our prayers all those affected by Covid-19, those who have been ill, those who have died or are bereaved, those whose livelihoods have been devastated during the epidemic, and those who have family members at school or university or have returned to work. And we remember refugees and asylum seekers, and the homeless at this very cold time of the year.

We know that Covid is still rife in the area, so we continue to be vigilant and careful in church, wearing masks when moving around, not taking wine at communion. I hope that in my Churchwardens' note next month I shall be able to report that we have had some wonderful Christmas events. Our clergy are still in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families.

Common winter illnesses and symptoms

This is a list of common ailments you're more likely to pick up in winter, along with some ideas on how to prevent them.

A common cold is a mild viral infection, it can cause anything from a runny nose, cough or sore throat to full blown sinus infection. Medication wise, your best option is Paracetamol and lots of fluid (the watery sort rather than the alcoholic), and the illness will usually end within a week or so.

The flu will have similar symptoms to the common cold, but they will be more intense. While a bout of flu will usually affect the fit and healthy for no more than a week, flu can be very dangerous to the elderly and infirm, so make sure elderly relatives have had their flu vaccine.

Chilblains are small, itchy swellings which affect the body's extremities, namely toes, fingers, ears etc and are caused by damp, cold temperatures. Typically they cause a burning sensation and the affected skin can turn red or even blue. The best prevention is not letting your hands and feet get cold in the first place. If you think you're susceptible to chilblains, warm up your gloves and shoes. Equally importantly, don't rush to the radiator when you're cold, as heating skin up too quickly is one of the main causes of chilblains.

Seasonal Affective Disorder has only recently been recognized as a genuine condition, characterized by ongoing feelings of depression during the winter months, irritability, lethargy and a craving for carbs, which in turn helps you put on weight. Levels of serotonin, which affect our moods, appetite and sleep, are thought to be lowered by the shorter sunlight hours, and this stops the hypothalamus, the part of our brain which affects our moods, from working properly. While a trip to the Caribbean might sound like the obvious remedy, cheaper treatments are on hand. Make a point of getting as much natural sunlight as you can.

Of all the winter ailments, **norovirus** is the one you really want to avoid passing around. Also known as the **winter vomiting bug**, **norovirus** is highly contagious, causing severe vomiting and diarrhoea. While this shouldn't last more than 2-3 days, it can leave you feeling lethargic and exhausted so keep up your fluid intake and take paracetamol to sooth the aches and pains. Prevention is most definitely better than cure in this instance so wash your hands frequently.
