PLANNING APPLICATION Ref: 3/22/1180/FUL 3/22/1180/FUL - Land To The Side Of 3 East Riding Tewin

A planning application has been submitted to East Herts Council for the above address for the erection of 1, 4 bedroomed dwelling with associated landscaping and parking.

Tewin Parish Council objected as the site is in the Green Belt, none of the exceptions in NPPF 149 apply, there are no "very special circumstances", Tewin Wood is not a built up area nor is it part of Burnham Green, Tewin Wood is in the Parish of Tewin which is a Category 2 village, it is inappropriate development in the Green Belt and there will be loss of openness.

Now that we are coming into September and the birds have finished nesting, Tewin Parish Council would be grateful if all residents who have hedges on their land bordering a footpath or pavement would cut them back if they are overhanging or partially blocking the path.

Harvest on the Farm

Early July we got our Grain Store cleaned, hoovered out and ready for the wheat & oats, we were not looking forward to the Heat Wave, which had been forecast. I got our service engineer to check that all the Air Conditioning Units were working ok on the Tractors, Combine and Sprayer. With temperatures of 28 degrees already, Harvest was fast approaching. We went to see the Naked Oats which were about a week away from Harvest. The Met Office now has forecast a Red Alert next week. All grass fields are now completely burnt or dried up. **Friday the 15th of July** we took the Combine down to the oats, and had a nibble. We found the moisture level at 13 percent. Wow, almost too dry! With the Heat Bomb of 40 degrees next week, we had better get the oat crop in the barn. The crop of oats yielded much better than expected with good straw length. With the air temp of 29 degrees the grain was very warm so we put the main fan on overnight to blow cool night air through the crop.

Saturday 16th of July, finished the Naked Oats (they have no husk) a lovely crop. After 6 very dry months we were pleasantly surprised at the quality.

Sunday 17th July. Wheat ready to combine. A moisture level of 12 percent is unheard of, never have harvested much wheat in July before. Good day's harvesting on light land. Also pleasantly surprised with the crop.

Monday 18th July. Full working day. Started at 8.30am very high temperatures of 35 degrees today. I was worried the moisture was 11 percent, at end of day.

Tuesday 19th July. Up in the field ready to start. Thought I'd better get some advice from my Grain Merchant, he told me to stop! The wheat is too dry. With temperatures expected of 38 or 39 degrees today, it was a wise decision. We will leave the wheat alone for a few days and hope for a shower of rain. It's almost too hot to work in! Quiet unexpectedly we had a shower of rain in the evening and night of the **21st of July**.

Started harvesting at 8.30am on the **22nd July** and found the moisture level at 17 percent. Let's get it in the barn. With a hot day forecast it will soon dry down to 15 percent which is what we want. Now into 1st wheats. The crop is yielding very well. It must have put its roots down

deep. Full day's work on the **23rd July**.

Sunday 24th July. Day of Rest!

Monday 25th. Moved to harvest Upper Prairie Field. What a lovely crop of Skyfall Wheat with very good yields.

Tuesday 26th. Moved into Upper Muspatts Field, and likewise a good crop with high yields. We worked until dark to finish. The moisture level was ok at 14 percent and that finished our Wheat Harvest at Tewin.

During this very busy time for us, you might ask what keeps us going. It's Linda with her Harvest Lunches! We all look out for her coming in that Rover Car loaded up with tables & chairs, and every day it's a different lunch! We all must stop for half a hour or more. If we work late in the evening she will be back with tea and cakes at 6pm. With that Heat Bomb on the 19th July there have been several field fires of standing crops, stubble fires, grass fires, and sadly a few combine fires. It's been a very worrying time on the farm. With this extreme weather, we decided to have water storage on the farm, in the shape of bowsers holding approximately 7,000 Litres of water, which we can move to anywhere on the farm at short notice, so it will be at hand for any emergencies this summer.

Wednesday 27th. We moved all equipment, Combine etc, to Brickendon, to harvest our block of wheat there. That took a full day, as we had to cart the crop back to our store at Muspatts.

Thursday 28th. Moved the Combine and equipment to Ware Park Farm to help a friend bring in his harvest.

Team Vicar's Letter

This summer I took a holiday in Yorkshire, in a cottage which overlooked a reservoir. Even by the end of July the reservoir was notably low, and our view less the blue waters that the holiday brochure had enticed us with, and more of dried mud banks and concrete walls.

As I write, we are in drought. The early harvest of fields of grain less plump than our farmers desire, has been one result of a long period without rain. Our farmers are always aware of the weather and its everyday impact on our food chain and finances. But living in a country usually generous with its mild climate and showers, for most of us it's been a bit of a challenge to hear of villages in leafy Oxfordshire running out of water.

This drought though will also have an impact on the cost and availability of food. Food and fuel prices have already risen greatly due to the war in Ukraine and the results of a global pandemic. Our foodbanks are finding themselves in demand more than ever - and parts of the world, such as large parts of East Africa have been plunged into famine.

This is the time of year when the church reflects on the importance and goodness of the harvest, and the relationship that people play in securing food for others. It is a time when Christians acknowledge the partnership between God and humanity. God who makes creation in all its abundance, but who entrusts its care and management to us all. I wonder how well you think the human race is doing that job at present?

A special village Harvest Festival will again be held on Lower Green on Sunday 18th September 11:15am. Bring your garden chairs and blankets – as we come together to celebrate the work of our local farming community, to be thankful for all that we have, and to collectively make a small difference to others who might go hungry this year. Bring tins, packets and dried produce for the foodbank. There will also be a collection that will be sent to relief efforts in East Africa. There will not be a barbeque this year, but you are welcome to bring a picnic. There will be Pimm's and soft drinks available.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

This afternoon (early August) I am meeting some old friends from St Albans in Tewin Church to tell them about the church and some of the people who are commemorated in the churchyard. Given that the temperature today is likely to be in the late 20 degrees Celsius, we are going to be in the best and coolest place.

Our vision as ever is at the top of this page – and we like to think that the church is at the heart of the village and a space for all. For the past forty odd years the church has been considering making a new space for the village beside the church. It would not only be for church members of course; but it would also be where we would like to provide greater space for the village and beyond. Every ten years or so, we have come up with some ideas which in the end have not materialised. Well, this year it is now or never. During the lockdown, the church and churchyard have been places where people have felt safe, have often visited for quiet reflection and in the knowledge they can be there without let or hindrance. St Peter's is the only church in the Welwyn team without a dedicated space close by for church and village related activities. We need to bring our church up to date with better kitchen and toilet facilities, in a space where folk can enjoy a cup of tea and a piece of cake after a funeral or baptism. We would like to ensure we have enough accessible loos available for the school children when they come for a service in church and for wheelchair users. We would also like to provide somewhere for us to have regular displays about the flora and fauna in the churchyard, the history of St Peter's and the village, and the people who have lived here, a place for local art to be shown and celebrated from time to time. We hold occasional concerts in the church - it would be good to offer refreshments in a permanent building instead of a corner of the clock tower or a windy gazebo outside. So, we have started the process to try to build a new space in the churchyard, adjacent to the church. You may think that in these difficult economic times, maybe this is something we should put off until times get better. My view is that it is exactly now that we should be doing something like this to help us get through this period, to have something lovely to concentrate on and to look forward to. Look out for more information about this in the coming months when we will be inviting all the village to become part of this exciting project.

We have had a lovely message of thanks from St Saviour's Priory in Haggerston for the carload of food, kitchen equipment, bedding and towels, clothes and knitted goods we took there in July. Sister Elizabeth says that everything we take her can be found a good home. "True to your word, you brought all the right things. Nothing superfluous and all exactly right. Please thank all who contributed. The food items were particularly well chosen. I put some of the bedding and crockery out on Sunday and it all found welcome homes. Some I have kept back for emergencies. With grateful thanks to you and all your generous contacts."

At the end of July, we said goodbye to Amanda Glew and her family who have now moved to Cambridge. Amanda has been a regular attendee at St Peter's, and for the past three years, an efficient secretary to the Parochial Church Council. We wish her much happiness in her new home. Throughout August we have continued to participate in Summer Evensongs at each of the churches in turn in the Welwyn Team. The theme has been Kings and *Oueens*. I particularly appreciated the address by Catherine Jupp at All Saints', Datchworth when she spoke about our Queen Elizabeth, her strong faith, and her enduring sense of duty to the nation and the Commonwealth. In that regard, hasn't it been a joy to see the Commonwealth Games? You may have noticed that both the large shrubs beside the West Door have now been removed. One of them had died during the repair work on the Clock Tower in 2020, the other clearly looked out of place. Once the roots have been removed by Stuart Kirkham (thank you Stuart), we shall replant with a few plants which we hope will be colourful and drought resistant. Thank you to Ivor Williams' team who have trimmed the hedges on the drive now that the birds have finished nesting.

Our new curate the Rev'd Christie Gilfeather attended her first service with us in July and will have conducted our Summer Evensong by the time you read this. It is great to have young enthusiastic people in our midst leading us in worship.

Our Harvest Festival will be a Family Service on Sunday 18th September and, as last year, will be on Lower Green. E Scooters in Hertfordshire

What is legal?

With the cost of fuel and everything else on the increase it's tempting to source out something that's cheap to run and effective at getting from A to B.

E Scooters are increasing in popularity and although they may seem like the ideal solution, there are many drawbacks. Here's a list to help you make the right decision if you're considering a purchase.

- E Scooters are legal to buy but illegal to ride on any **road**, **pavement**, or **cycle path** in Hertfordshire.
- Retailers are obliged to highlight these restrictions.
- You can only ride an E Scooter on private land with the landowner's permission.
- The police have the powers to seize an E Scooter, issue penalty points and a fine if you're caught riding illegally.
- We don't currently have any E Scooter rental schemes in Hertfordshire.
- You can rent an E Scooter in other counties; you must be at least 16 and hold a full or provisional licence.
- The government are currently carrying out trials in other counties to help shape new legislation.

There are lots of safety concerns over E Scooter use, this includes the risk of fire from recharging batteries. For more guidance, please log on to:

and is part of World Alzheimer's Month. This year, it is focussing on the power of knowledge.

Alzheimer's causes a gradual decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills.

In the early stages, the main symptom of Alzheimer's Disease is memory lapses.

For example, someone with early Alzheimer's Disease may:

- forget about recent conversations or events
- misplace items
- forget the names of places and objects
- have trouble thinking of the right word
- ask questions repetitively
- show poor judgement or find it harder to make decisions
- become less flexible and more hesitant to try new things

There are often signs of mood changes, such as increasing anxiety or agitation, or periods of confusion.

If you're worried about your memory or think you may have dementia, it's a good idea to see a GP.

Other organisations that can provide support and information

include Dementia UK and The Alzheimer's Society.
