THACS Autumn Show on Saturday 17th September

Congratulations to all the exhibitors at the Autumn Show this year.

This was the 15th annual Autumn Show and it attracted 139 exhibitors who entered 319 exhibits. Together, they made an impressive display that filled the main hall, Parish Room and the corridor. I hope that you came along to the show and got to see it all.

The display of horticultural exhibits was not as large as usual, but I expect that was partially due to the extreme weather during the few weeks prior to the show. The record high temperatures meant that some flowers did not last until the show, whilst heavy rain on the day before the show hindered the preparation of the flowers, vegetables and fruit exhibits. However, the smaller size of the horticultural display may have been a blessing in disguise, because it gave us the extra space we needed to display some of the children's art exhibits.

One of the experimental changes to the Show Schedule was the inclusion of our new 'open category' in the adult photography class, where exhibitors could enter photographs on any subject. This experiment seems to have been a success, since the open category had more exhibits than any of the others.

The adult trophy winners were Joy Lawson for Flower Arranging, Diana Brannen for Flowers, Ray Keppler for Vegetables & Fruit, Shirley Ashby for Arts & Crafts, Jules Bridgman for Photography and Hilary Tipping for Culinary. Annabel Goodison won the George Humble Crawford Award for Children's Photography, whilst Imogen Winters & Ashley Winters were joint winners of the Tewin Cowper School Parents' Association Award for the highest number of points in the children's classes for horticulture, arts & crafts and culinary. Recent Events

Visit to Savill Garden on Wednesday 13th July



The visit to Savill Garden was a lovely day out and everything went smoothly. The group of thirty-four people left Tewin at 9:30 with eager anticipation about the visit but perhaps some apprehension about the dubious weather, since some rain had been forecast. However, the dark clouds mainly kept passing us by during our time at the garden, whilst the few light showers we experienced did not spoil our enjoyment.

From the car and coach parks, the entrance to the garden is through the impressive Savill Building, which has interesting architecture and construction. Its wide and low undulating roof is in perfect keeping with the landscape and its open-plan interior gives a light and airy environment. It houses the Savill Garden Restaurant and the Gallery Café, so most of the group took some refreshment before exploring the garden.

Twenty-two people had opted to go on the guided tour in the morning and we were fortunate to have Anthony as our guide. He is

a volunteer from the Friends of Savill Garden and his long association with Savill Garden has given him a detailed knowledge and understanding of the garden and its development. He is also an experienced tour guide and this helped to make the tour appropriate, informative and enjoyable. We learned far more from the tour than we could possibly have done on our own! In particular, we were given an intriguing insight into the nature of the location and some of the associated problems the site poses, such as the excess water. The structure of the new rose garden had to be revised when the initial idea of a circular bowl-shaped garden proved impractical due to flooding from the high water table. It's now all on the same level and has a most unusual design (as featured in the edition of the Gardeners World TV programme on 20th July). Recent flooding has also caused many of the Hydrangeas to die from water-logged roots, so managing a garden on this site certainly comes with its own set of challenges. The tour started at 11:30am and finished before 1:00pm so there was still time for lunch and to explore some of the garden before leaving at 3:30pm for the return journey.

Since Savill Garden consists of 35 acres of interconnected gardens, our visit was too brief for us to fully explore all of them. However, the parts of the garden we did get to see were very impressive, with many of the flower beds having large drifts of healthy and beautiful plants (all clearly labelled). These included some unexpected surprises, such as the numerous large clumps of flowering Dierama (aka Angel's fishing rod, wandflower). These evergreen cormous perennials are tricky to get established and even harder to get flowering well, so the gardeners have done well. The standard of maintenance of the gardens is high and I was amazed to discover that the flower beds are maintained by fewer than 10 full-time gardeners. Also, they do it all without extra help:- many large public gardens have organised volunteer gardeners to help with the upkeep, but Savill Garden does not.

The Savill Building also houses the gift shop which offers a good range of gifts alongside a range of plants and garden accessories. If you brought plants there, I hope that you have now found a suitable location for them in your garden and that they will thrive and continue to remind you of your day out with *THACS* at Savill Garden.

The staff at Savill Garden did a great job in looking after us. The pre-visit organisation was good and, when we arrived, the welcome was warm and the staff at reception were efficient with the payments and tickets. Chambers Coaches provided their usual reliable good service and our driver Rob was thanked for the smooth, safe and comfortable journeys.

If you came on the visit, then thank you for coming. The time-keeping was excellent, so thanks to everyone in the group for helping to make the visit go so smoothly.

Other News

Art exhibition 1st – 10th November

The *THACS* committee usually arranges a visit to a gallery or an exhibition towards the end of the year. Unfortunately we are unable to arrange a visit this year but Jim Hall has provided the following information on an opportunity to see an extraordinary private art collection before it is auctioned to the public.

Seeking Major Tom

This November, Sotheby's will stage a three-part sale encompassing some 400 items from the private collection of legendary musician David Bowie. At the heart of the sale is a remarkable group of more than 200 works by many of the most important British artists of the 20th Century, including Frank Auerbach, Damien Hirst, Henry Moore and Graham Sutherland.

Bowie's famously inquisitive mind also led him to collect Outsider Art, Surrealism and Contemporary African art, as well as pieces by eccentric Italian designer Ettore Sottsass and the Memphis group. Bowie's diverse tastes nurtured his extensive archive of important works from celebrated, and less widely-known, artists in a collection of unparalleled eclecticism.

Never seen as a collection before but from 1st-10th November, the collection will be exhibited at Sotheby's New Bond Street galleries in London, giving fans, collectors, art lovers and experts a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to immerse themselves in the extraordinary range of objects that informed Bowie's private world. Ahead of the landmark ten-day event in London, preview exhibitions will be held in New York, Los Angeles and Hong Kong.

David Bowie, musician, actor and icon, as well as a publisher, curator and magazine editor with Modern British art at the heart of those passions. Born in South London, it's perhaps no surprise that he was drawn to chroniclers of the capital's streets such as Harold Gilman and Frank Auerbach while he also collected St Ives-based painter Peter Lanyon in particular depth. However, his collection is by no means limited to British art alone and also encompasses Contemporary African art, self-taught artists from Vienna's Gugging institution, as well as designs by Ettore Sottsass and the revolutionary Memphis group. Bowie was not just a collector of art, but an informed authority on the subject. This was most clearly demonstrated in his role as an active member on the Editorial Board of Modern Painters magazine, and the founding of his arts publishing house, 21. He contributed regular in-depth interviews with artists such as Tracey Emin, Balthus and Damien Hirst.

Having always worked in the rag trade and fashion, making my own clothes and taking a City and Guilds in Patchwork and Quilting, I went on to become a sewing machine demonstrator and tutor at John Lewis and still work in the Haberdashery dept. Realising the lack of teaching at schools and knowing the fun of making your own creations to wear, use or just admire, I set up *So Just Sew*. I now run 4 school clubs, holiday workshops and adult classes. I took the plunge and set up a unit at Tewin Hill Farm offering more space and a comfortable, friendly atmosphere to learn the skills of sewing and knitting.

We have had a great summer of children's sewing workshops making bags, toys, pyjamas and quilts and ensuring the love of sewing continues for the next generation.

Our knitting and crochet workshops are also very popular to learn the full range from casting on to professional finishing and we now also offer exciting new classes in pattern cutting.
