# Spring Show on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> April

The THACS Spring Show will be held in Tewin Memorial Hall on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> April.

Show schedules, rules and entry forms accompany this newsletter. Extra copies can be downloaded from the *THACS* page on the village website (<u>www.tewinvillage.co.uk/clubs/thacs/</u>) or you can get paper copies from Tewin Stores after 17<sup>th</sup> March.



Over the past few years, we have been working more closely with the local children's groups and this has been very successful. Lynne Burgess is our Schools Liaison Co-ordinator and in preparation for the spring and autumn shows, she goes into our local school and other children's groups, speaking to children and staff about the art and craft they might produce. The staff, helpers and children at Tewin Cowper School, Tewin Under-Fives Pre-school and Tewin Parent & Toddler group have been very enthusiastic and supportive. We have had some delightful and interesting artwork from those groups at our previous shows and look forward to more to come this year.

Now we would like to build on this success, by extending the level of involvement in arts and crafts beyond these children's groups and into the homes and families of the children. Our objective is to get the children involved in arts and crafts at home - as well as in their school - so that they have another environment in which they can develop

their interests and skills. We believe that the best way to achieve this is with the active involvement of the parents and wider families of the children. Hopefully, we might also stimulate more interest in arts and crafts in some of the adults too! As the first step towards this objective, we have made an exciting and significant addition to this show schedule:- the introduction of a new *Adult & Child Class* for the combined efforts of adult and child pairs. For entries in this class, a child would pair up with a suitable adult (ideally a family member) and they would each produce the specified art work. For example, they could each make a drawing or painting of the same thing. The resulting pair of pictures would make up the exhibit.

All categories are open and free to Adult & Child Pairs of any age. An Adult & Child Pair may enter as many of the categories as they wish, but can only submit one exhibit per category. The adult / child in an Adult & Child Pair can also pair with another child / adult to form a different

Adult & Child Pair, which can then enter its own exhibits. For example, a family of mother, father, son and daughter could form four different Adult & Child Pairs (mother /son, mother /daughter, father / son, father / daughter) and each of these pairs could enter its own exhibits.

Prizes will be awarded to the first, second and third Adult & Child pairs.

So if you are a parent / guardian / grandparent / aunt or uncle, this is a new opportunity for you to get together with that child and have some productive fun together, whilst helping them to develop their skills (and maybe your own). Go on, try it! If this new venture is well supported, then there will be scope for extending it beyond Arts & Crafts into other suitable subjects, such as horticulture and photography. If you have any ideas for suitable categories, please let me know.

Another change that we have made is to the Photography classes. Photographers can now have the option to have an informative caption with their photograph, for the benefit of the visitors to the show. (Please see the Show Schedule for more details.)

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As for the rest of the show schedule, the range of categories is extensive and includes flower arranging, flowers, arts & crafts, photography and culinary, so I am sure that you can select some suitable categories to enter. So go on, take a look at the categories and have a go. You never know, you could be a winner!

If you are going to exhibit anything at the show, please note that:-

- Entry fees remain unchanged at 30p per entry for members, 60p for non-members and free for children.
- There are no entry fees for the *Adult & Child Class*.
- Please provide your entry form and entrance fees by Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> April to Ray Keppler, *THACS* Show Secretary, 15 Upper Green Road, Tewin, Welwyn, Herts AL6 0LE.
- Exhibits should be taken to the hall between 8.30am and 10.30am on the day of the Show.

Even if you're not entering anything yourself, you will be welcome to see the show - free of charge – when the doors open to the public at 2:00pm. You will be able to see all of the exhibits in the main hall, corridor and Parish Room and to indulge in tea and cake before the presentation of prizes at 3.30pm. Afterwards, you will have the opportunity to purchase some of the exhibits yourself, in aid of Saint John of God Hospitaller Services (Digswell Nurseries).

## Tewin Open Gardens on Sunday 20th May

These events have raised funds for local charities including Isabel Hospice and Tewin Village Stores and donations have been made to our village school, the Toddler group and the Pre-school Nursery.

In 2018 this bi-annual event will take place on Sunday, May 20th.

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# *Rooms with a view*. Two Amazing Galleries for You to Enjoy

- 1. The National Gallery
- 2. The Wallace Collection

If you fancy a day in London then there aren't many better places to visit than an art gallery.

### **The National Gallery**

The first place I recommend is the National Gallery where you'll see some amazing "rooms with great views". Did you know, the National Gallery possesses one of the most valuable and comprehensive collections of paintings in the world.

The gallery was founded in 1824 after Parliament provided £57,000 for the purchase of 38 paintings from the famous Angerstein Collection. Numerous later purchases and donations made it necessary to enlarge the building many times over, the latest in 1991 when the Sainsbury Wing was opened.

The collections offer a wide cross-section of European painting from 1260 until 1920, with the greatest treasures being the collection of Dutch Masters and the Italian Schools of the 15th and 16th centuries.

The West Wing presents paintings from sixteenth century, including exhibits by well-known artists; Tintoretto (St George and the Dragon).

The North Wing delights with paintings from 1600 to 1700 including: Peter Paul Rubens (Rape of the Sabine Women and The Straw Hat), van Dyck (Charles I on Horseback and The Balbi Children). Displays of Spanish paintings include: Diego Velázquez, Caravaggio (Boy bitten by a Lizard), and Nicolas Poussin (The Finding of Moses).



The East Wing is the place to aim for if you want to break for lunch or for a cuppa: - you deserve it!

You can also view a Reynolds, Gainsborough, Constable or Turner before moving onto the delights of the French and Italian displays, such as Monet (The Waterlily Pond) and van Gogh (Sunflowers).

The gallery offers excellent audio tour options. For example, the Inspired Tour directs visitors to paintings known to have provided inspiration for poets and writers, as well as celebrities, some of whom share their favourites. There are free maps and free guided tours (check on-line or at the desk when you arrive).

There are free Friday evening music recitals, provided by students from the Royal College of Music.

### The Wallace Collection

A not so well-known venue in London is the Wallace Collection which is located at Hertford House, Manchester Square, London, W1U 3BN. The nearest tube is Bond Street or Baker Street.

The Wallace Collection is a national museum in an historic London town house. In 25 galleries are unsurpassed displays of French 18th-century painting, furniture and porcelain with superb Old Master paintings and a world class armoury; you could say there is something to interest everyone.

In 2018, the Wallace Collection celebrates the 200<sup>th</sup> birthday of the founder, Sir Richard Wallace. The supposed illegitimate son of the Fourth Marquess of Hertford, Sir Richard unexpectedly inherited the Marquess's dazzling collection of art. This legacy was to change the direction of his own life and that of the masterpieces in his care.

Sir Richard believed in sharing his inheritance with a wider audience and he was also a prominent collector, adding extensively to the Collection prior to his death in 1890.

If you have 10 minutes or a couple of hours to spare the gallery is open seven days a week from 10am - 5pm and admission is free.

There will be plenty to see and do if you get chance to visit either of these great venues.
