AGM on Monday 12th January 2015

The presentation of the Tewin Society Award will start the evening and this will be followed by the AGM. Then there will be refreshments (including wine) followed by a talk from a guest speaker.

As you can see from the agenda, the meeting will include the Chairman's and Treasurer's report for 2014, the election of the officers and other committee members for 2015 and a preview of events for 2015. The committee is still developing the programme of events and would like to hear your suggestions for this. Our guest speaker is Kate Harwood and her subject will be *The Evolving Landscape of Panshanger Park - Past and Future?* Kate is one of the founding members and officers of the Friends of Panshanger Park (FPP) and the Conservation & Planning Officer for Hertfordshire Gardens Trust. In both roles she has been closely involved with Panshanger Park for many years.



As a garden historian she has researched and helped formulate the FPP ideas for the future of the Park.

Panshanger has a fascinating history going back to prehistoric times but the park as we know it evolved during the 18th century. Both the leading designers of the day, Capability Brown and Humphry Repton, worked on Panshanger Park and made it into a glorious English landscape park. The renowned art and architecture historian Sir Nikolaus Pevsner called it "one of Repton's most perfect schemes", the queen in his string of pearls which are the estates along the Mimram valley. The Victorian era gave us interesting water management technology and grand formal gardens around the house, but the 20th century saw decline and exploitation. The FPP hope the 21st century will see it somewhat restored to its former splendour and opened to all.

There will not be any admission charge for the evening and no booking is necessary. This is an important meeting for *THACS* and all members are urged to attend. Non-members are very welcome but not able to vote.

Flower arranging presentation on Monday 13th October 2014

The wet weather did not deter the 28 people who attended the flower arranging evening.

The welcoming wine / fruit juice and nibbles helped everyone to relax and settle down to an enjoyable presentation from Gill McGregor. She entertained and informed us all with her demonstrations and certainly lived up to the billing of giving us "inspirational designs with distinction wrapped in a conversation of humour".

The aim of the evening was to encourage and inspire more people to have a go at flower arranging. Consequently, all of the principles and techniques were clearly explained so that any novices could learn new things. Some advanced techniques were also used, so hopefully even the more experienced flower arrangers learnt something new. Gill disclosed some amazing tricks and techniques, including one to stop the aging process (but unfortunately only for carnations!). The flower arrangements were raffled at the end of the evening, in aid of Isabel Hospice. The desirable prizes and worthy cause were popular and several people brought extra raffle tickets after the demonstration, once they saw the quality of the arrangements. Visit to the National Gallery on Wednesday 26th November 2014

The *THACS* visit to the National Gallery on 26th November proved popular with many art lovers and a few who had Christmas shopping in mind.

Founded in 1824 and housing over 2,300 paintings dating from mid-13th century to 1900, the time we had to spend there was a fraction of the time needed to fully appreciate this collection. Many people had planned their visit to ensure they concentrated on areas of interest to them.

Most of the visitors to the gallery were there to view the special exhibition, *Rembrandt: The late works* and they were not disappointed. Anna and Michael Clark were enthusiastic visitors as the paintings reminded them of when they met, so Michael describes the trip and its significance below.

What a smashing day the *THACS* National Gallery visit proved to be, it gave an opportunity to enjoy the late works of Rembrandt. Anna described it as being like a lovely visit to see old friends again as familiar treasures such as the Kenwood self portrait, which is thought to have been his finest, we have stood in front of on a number of occasions.

In fact almost exactly 52 years ago I



bought my first volume on the artist at a second-hand book shop in Crouch End as a new art student in London. It was *Rembrandt's Etchings* and within three weeks the art student Anna I had met that very week agreed to join me on our first date. I like to think I asked her to come up and see my Rembrandt etchings some time, but the event was just a trip to see a Peter Sellers film in Barnet and to this day she reminds me that I drove through a traffic light on red at Whetstone. To see so many etchings and paintings at first hand at the National Gallery was a

treat. Everywhere there are treasures on display in a packed series of rooms in the Sainsbury Wing. It is difficult to pick out any for special mention as all are so interesting and many are new to being shown in the UK. Some however deserve special mention.

The etchings are mingled with the wonderful paintings which are nearly all portraits and brown pervades the canvases as Rembrandt's dramatic light and shade so frequently included the fur of martens, foxes, European mink and possibly even sable on the people portrayed. Fur trimmings to clothes were a status symbol of the day. *The Jewish Bride*, c1665, is an all time favourite, but *Margaretha de Geer*, dramatically facing the artist in the painting, has her hair and ruff so technically brilliant, the portrait always stuns me when I see it. He is thought to be the first painter to use a palette knife on the canvas, (*Lucretia.*, 1666), on her white sleeves.

The etching *Christ Preaching*, c1657 is incredible for its figures and depth in the architecture and several stages of the different subjects are shown. There is amazing calligraphy below his etching of a calligrapher, who added his comments below this now unique portrait print. *Abraham's Sacrifice*, 1655 is one of the most powerful and dramatic images, for the expression on Abraham's face alone. It is a very moving as well as a stunning collection of the great man's final years of painting, drawing and printmaking.
