Spring Show on Saturday 9th April

Well done to all who took part in the THACS Spring Show.

The display in the main hall was vibrant and colourful. There were beautiful flower arrangements, a delightful display of horticulture exhibits, mouth-watering culinary exhibits and impressive hand-crafted items. The photography, painting, calligraphy and prose exhibits were displayed in the Parish Room and there was more prose on show in the main hall, in the form of a display of work produced at a *THACS* Creative Writing workshop. The children's charming art exhibits were displayed in the corridor.

In addition to these show entries, we had three supplementary displays of art work from the children of Tewin Cowper School:- *Observing daffodils* by Willow Tree Class (Nursery & Reception, ages 4-5) went very well with the horticulture exhibits in the hall, whilst *Easter in the style of Kandinsky* by Oak Tree Class (school years 5&6, ages 9-11) and *Exploring an artist Yinka Shonibare* by Cherry Tree Class (school years 2&3, ages 6-8) formed thought-provoking examples of abstract art.

When it came to prize giving, there was a new replacement trophy on offer this time:- the *Marian Meads Memorial Trophy* for Arts & Crafts. Marian Meads was a member of *THACS* and an enthusiastic exhibitor at the shows before she died, so her family kindly provided *THACS*

with this new trophy. She had strong Scottish connections, and these were reflected in the choice of trophy:- a silver-plated quaich (Scottish two-handled drinking bowl), with a separate engraved plinth. The new trophy was introduced by Catherine Meads, who gave a humorous insight into her late mother and her involvement with previous shows. It all made for a very appropriate tribute and an introduction of the new trophy, which Catherine then presented to Terry Brand.

The other adult trophy winners were Sue Whitbourn for Flower Arranging, Ray Keppler for Horticulture, Jules Bridgman for Photography and Melanie Goodison for Culinary. Lydia Bennett won the Les Borg Cup for Children's Photography and Lauren Murray won the Tewin Cowper School Award for the highest number of points in the children's classes for horticulture, arts & crafts and culinary. The *THACS* committee strives to keep the prices of our events as low as possible (usually aiming to just cover the costs) and consequently as affordable as possible for members.

We do not seek to raise money for charitable purposes. However, we occasionally make donations to charities and this has proved a good way of using money that could be regarded as extra income. Recent examples include the money raised from the auction of flower arrangements at a workshop, proceeds from auction of produce at shows and profits made from Open Gardens.

The charities supported so far have all been well-known and popular but not relevant to the aims of *THACS*, which are to promote the good cultivation of gardens and allotments, to foster interest in garden design and plants and to encourage village arts and crafts. Consequently, the committee has been seeking to identify more suitable charities i.e. ones that deal with horticulture, arts or crafts (preferably locally). These are likely to be less well-known than the ones we have supported so far, so they could benefit from extra publicity as well as any moderate cash donation.

The opening times for most of the gardens will be 11:00am to 6:00pm. Entrance to gardens will be by a programme which will include a map detailing the gardens locations. The programme costs £2.50 per adult whilst accompanied children are free. These programmes will be available from Tewin Stores and Tebbutts at Burnham Green from Monday 2^{nd} May and from some of the gardens on the day.

Visit to Savill Garden on Wednesday 13th July

If you would like a summer's day out to visit an inspirational garden, then join us on a coach trip for a day trip to Savill Garden.

The Savill Garden lies within Windsor Great Park and is a tranquil place to discover rare plants from around the world, arranged in stunning seasonal displays. The exotic displays and National Collections will impress even the most seasoned gardener, and also provide an abundance of subject material for photographers of all levels. This natural haven of beautifully designed gardens and woodland can be enjoyed by everyone, from dedicated horticulturalists to those who

just want to spend a relaxing day out. There is something there for everyone, so come along and join us for a great day out!



The Garden consists of 35 acres of interconnected gardens including the Hidden Gardens, Spring Wood, the Summer Gardens, the New Zealand Garden, Summer Wood, The Glades, Autumn Wood and the Winter Beds. It was developed under Royal patronage dating back to George VI. Eric Savill was appointed as Deputy Surveyor in 1931, and began working on the Garden in the winter of 1932, with the support of George VI. From the original rhododendrons, camellias and azaleas planted by Eric Savill, to the Queen Elizabeth rose recently planted to mark HM the Queen becoming our longestreigning monarch - The Savill Garden team continues to respect the traditions of the Garden, whilst introducing new and exciting plantings and displays from around the world each year.

There are two locations for refreshments and lunch -The Savill Garden Restaurant and The Gallery Café - both located in The Savill Building. The Savill Garden Restaurant offers

homemade cakes and biscuits, freshly ground Fairtrade coffee, loose leaf teas and a selection of soft drinks. Full or light lunch options are available, including freshly made sandwiches, delistyle salads, jacket potatoes, soups and other hot meals. The Gallery Café offers loose leaf teas and freshly ground coffee, plus a selection of homemade pastries, cakes and biscuits in a quieter location.

The Savill Building also houses the gift shop which offers gifts evocative of an idyllic country lifestyle alongside a range of plants and garden accessories from the Royal Gardens.

The Savill Garden is easily accessible, with a fairly even terrain that is suitable for both wheelchairs and buggies. There are a limited number of non-motorised wheelchairs available to borrow, on a first come, first served basis. There are no electric mobility scooters available, but if you have your own then you are very welcome to use it.

There are plenty of clearly marked wheelchair accessible paths throughout the Garden, as well as several benches and seated areas where you can relax and enjoy the views.

For visitors with disabilities, an accompanying able-bodied companion is allowed in free of charge. Please be aware, although the main circular route around the Garden is wheelchair accessible, there is a section with a slight descent and ascent when returning to The Savill Building, meaning that companions will need to be fit and able-bodied in order to push a wheelchair in these areas.

The prices for this visit are £20 for *THACS* members and £23 for non-members.

The coach will leave Tewin (opposite the Rose and Crown) at 9.30am promptly and leave Savill Garden at 3.30pm. An optional walking guided tour of the gardens is available to for an additional cost of £2 per person. The tour guides are knowledgeable and helpful, so the tour is particularly recommended if you have not visited



Savill Garden before. The tour will last about an hour and is scheduled to start at 11:30.
