Thursday 3 August Visit to Ayot St Peter church & 'Waggoners' meal

Ayot St Peter, built in 1874, is a remarkable and unconventional Victorian Gothic church which features in Simon Jenkins' "England's Thousand Best Churches". The interior was described by Sir Nikolaus Pevsner as "an exceptionally complete example of church furnishing about 1880 by an architect in sympathy with the then recent Arts and Crafts tendencies". Pevsner mentions the furnishings in the same breath as those of the superb pre-Raphaelite church at Waterford we visited, and were so much impressed by, in 2005. This visit should provide **THACS** members with the chance to see an equally outstanding, but quite different, church of the same historical era as Waterford.

There is plenty of choice and catering for special dietary needs at the 'Waggoners'. Their menu changes regularly, so we cannot give the choice at present, but the cost of a 3-course meal is ± 23 plus 10% service charge. Recipes

Chocolate Desert

4ozs Fresh bread crumbs
4ozs Demerara sugar
4tablesps Drinking chocolate powder
2tablesps Coffee powder
1/4 pint Single cream
1/4 pint Double cream

Method

Mix all dry ingredients together and put half in a small trifle bowl. Whip the 2 creams softly and spread half on top of first layer of dry ingredients. Repeat, ending with a layer of cream. Place in fridge overnight for cream to soak through. Decorate with grated chocolate or Cadbury's chocolate flake

Salmon with Parmesan Crust

Serves 2 1/2oz toasted pinenuts 11/2oz fresh breadcrumbs 1/2oz grated Parmesan cheese 1oz butter 2 level teaspn chopped fresh basil Salt and fresh black pepper 2 salmon cutlets approx. 5oz each Lemon or lime slices and basil leaves

Method

Mix all ingredients except salmon in a blender until just combined, don't overdo. Place salmon skin - up under a moderately hot grill and cook for 5 mins. Turn salmon over. Top with the breadcrumb mixture and cook for a further 5 mins or until cooked through. Garnish . Serve with green beans.

Gardening tips for APRIL

This year's season has been slow to start, so some gardening tasks normally carried out in April should probably be left until hard frosts are over. However, there is plenty to do, sowing and pricking out seeds and seedlings in the greenhouse or cold frame, and here are a few more tips for the month:

1 Mulching is very important this year with the hosepipe ban enforced. This is best done with farmyard manure, readily available around Tewin, or with your own home-made compost from garden clippings, grass mowings and kitchen vegetable waste. Mulching does two jobs; it feeds the ground and therefore the plants as it rains, and keeps plants cool and moist at root level during the hotter months.

2 Support emerging perennials and tie climbers to supports before stems become tangled.

3 Shear plants such as Rosemary, Santolina and Lavender to keep them bushy.

4 Clear ponds of debris collected over winter, and divide pond plants where necessary.

Gardening tips for MAY

1 Prune hardy Fuchsias as new growth begins, and when frosts are over prune back any damaged shrub branches. Prune Kerria and Spirea after flowering back to buds or shoots lower down.

2 Control greenfly on rose buds and watch out for these pests in the greenhouse, as well as whitefly and red spider mite.

3 When planting hanging baskets or summer containers, it is a good idea to combine water retaining crystals and slow-release fertiliser with your potting compost in order to cut down on watering and feeding later.

4 If you have not yet mulched your roses it is not too late to do so, or boost shrubs, roses and climbers with a general feed such as Growmore; read instructions carefully, as plants can be killed by over-feeding with fertiliser.

Gardening tips for JUNE

1 Remove suckers from roses, pulling them up at ground level wearing a pair of sturdy gloves! Do not clip the suckers with secateurs, as this will encourage them to send out more stems.

2 Lawn mowing can be monotonous, but it can be a good way of making mental notes about the jobs that need doing as you go backwards and forwards. Tidying the edges makes all the difference to the appearance of your garden and will prevent couch grass from spreading onto your borders.

3 A good project to help our dwindling butterfly and insect population is to plant a nectar-rich border. Buddleia davidii, or the 'butterfly bush', is an obvious choice; there are many varieties of honeysuckle – accessible only to long-tongued butterflies, moths and bees; lavender, nicotiana (tobacco plants), verbena, marjoram and sedum spectabile are all loved by insects.

4 Houseplants can be taken outside in June so that you can re-pot or renew the compost, clean their leaves and generally tidy up and care for them. However, many dislike being outside in the hot sun, and if you wish to keep them outdoors during the summer months, it is best to keep them in a shady, protected area.

5 How about a 'no-water' window box or hanging basket, using echeverias, sempervivums, and other succulents or even small cacti? Plant with plenty of potting grit mixed with multi-purpose compost, or you can buy Cactus compost. Water them in initially and they should then be alright for the remaining season. You may be delighted by some of their flowers, too.
