Now that we are heading towards September and the birds have finished nesting, Tewin Parish Council would be grateful **if all residents who have hedges on their land bordering a footpath or pavement would cut them back if**

they are overhanging or partially blocking the path.

COMMON RAGWORT

This is a common weed found throughout the British Isles however it is very toxic to horses and other livestock and can have potentially fatal consequences if ingested either in its green or dried state.

Under the Weeds Act 1959 the Secretary of State may serve an enforcement notice on the occupier of land on which injurious weeds are growing, requiring the occupier to take action to prevent the spread of injurious weeds. The Weeds Act specifies **five** injurious weeds: Common Ragwort, Spear Thistle, Creeping or Field Thistle, Broad Leaved Dock and Curled Dock.

By promoting good practice and good neighbourliness it is hoped that this weed can be controlled.

If you find you have it in your garden please put rubber gloves on and remove the plant and place it in the <u>black bin</u> to prevent livestock eating it. Fragments of root will remain in the ground so new growth will have to be monitored and removed year after year.

On The Farm Progressing Towards Harvest.

We have just done, and passed, our Red Tractor Crops Audit; I have to keep a paper trail of what we do on the farm, what's done in every field throughout the year, the service of machines, chemical stock, clean out and hoover out the grain store; and we have to record the grain temperatures every month. This year has been somewhat different, as I have a Portal. This means we take photos with our phones of all paper work and scan it to the Portal. The inspector can view all details before her visit, this will now let me get my Yellow Assurance Stickers which will go with every load of grain. Without the stickers I would be unable sell my crops.

Our crops have stood up to the heavy downpours of rain this month quiet well. The peas look great, they love the rain, the wheat has had enough, it wants some sunshine to ripen the crop.

Last March I bought 5 little Hereford steers, they have been a joy to see in the fields, around the Church. Now 3 have matured and have been sent to market. You could say to me 'Why have they been sent to market?'. They were at their prime, if kept longer they would put on fat and their meat would be past their best. Butchers only buy the best.

Rain again! Well at least it stayed dry and mostly sunny for our Open Gardens event at Petertide. This was a very successful joyful occasion when we were fortunate to see a huge variety of gardens around our village and to enjoy cake and tea with friends and family. The great thing also is that we raised over £2,000 for church funds which goes some way to plug the gap in our general finances for this year. So - many thanks to everyone who was involved with this effort –thirty-five households helped in some way, giving pleasure to many people from near and far. And thank you to all who came to enjoy the gardens.

Summer Evensong has started in the Welwyn Team during July with the theme of the natural world as shown in the bible. Our own event will be on **11th August at 6.30pm when we shall be celebrating Gardens** again! Afterwards we will enjoy a glass of bubbly, alcoholic or non-alcoholic, and some nibbles. These events are an opportunity to visit the other churches in the team, see what they have done in the past year, sing with their choirs, and meet up with friends.

4th August - Codicote - Rivers 18th August - Ayot St Peter - Wilderness 25th August - Welwyn - Sky On this Sunday the Annual Joint Service on Burnham Green with All Saints, Datchworth will take place at 10am.

For over a year now St Mary's Welwyn has been running a monthly concert at 12 noon on (usually) the second Saturday in the month. If you haven't been before, look out for the ads in this magazine or in Welwyn. They are really good and a useful way again to raise much needed funds for the church. Concerts are free but a donation towards the cost of the artiste(s) and church funds is requested.

After a long protracted piece of work, the project team for the new facilities at the church finally submitted the documents requested by the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) at the end of June. The committee recognised the

amount of work that had gone into our submission and were very encouraging about the next steps. We had spent much time considering all the possible places where a new building might be placed, coming to the conclusion, that the most logical location is to the east of the South Porch. A small new building here will include two toilets, one accessible, with baby changing facilities, a kitchenette, and small space for meetings, small celebrations and Messy Church. At the same time, we will re-order the vestry to include more storage space. The DAC has asked us to produce some sketches of what such a new building might look like in time for their next meeting later in the year, before we do a formal design which will of course be shared with the community.

We hope to work with Historic England on the project as well as our architects, Dennis Sharp Architects.

We are very sorry to report that Pete Johnson, a past Churchwarden, and currently our Verger, will be leaving the area soon to live closer to her family in the north of England. She has been a stalwart member of our congregation for many years and a familiar sight in the churchyard where she has worked tirelessly to keep the area in good order. She has been at church Sunday after Sunday to set up for services every week, and present at baptisms, funerals and weddings. Thank you, Pete, for everything you have done for St Peter's. Come back and see us sometime. You are going to be sadly missed.

Susannah is again leading our **Annual Poetry Pilgrimage** from Datchworth church across the fields to St Peter's Tewin on **Saturday 17th August from 9.30am – 2.30pm.** This has been a very enjoyable event in the past despite sometimes rainy weather, ambling through the countryside, stopping en route for poetry, short reflections on our spiritual journey and ornithological observations by Colin Hull. Herts And Middlesex Wildlife Trust Has Launched A £280,000 Fundraising Campaign To Help Wildlife In Crisis As Rising Costs Threaten Nature's Recovery.

The UK is one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world and last year, the State of Nature report found that nearly one in six species in Great Britain is threatened with extinction. Some of our once common species are at risk, for example numbers of Brown Hares are thought to have declined by more than 80% in the past 100 years. Turtle Doves – those icons of Christmas song – have seen their numbers plummet by 99% since the 1960s, Common Toads have declined by 68% over the past 30 years, and since 1970, flowering plant species have decreased by 54%, along with 18% of pollinators.

The Trust is the leading voice for conservation in the area, with over 23,500 members and over 1,100 active volunteers supporting its work. This year marks the charity's 60th anniversary and, at this time, along with the scale of the nature and climate crisis, a further challenge is impacting on its ability to deliver the recovery plans needed – rising costs.

To drive nature's recovery forward, our campaign is looking to raise £280,000 from our supporters and local people who care about the wildlife and wild spaces on their doorsteps. We know we are not alone in feeling the pinch of rising costs but we all need a world where we can breathe and thrive amidst the sights, sounds and colours of nature. We appreciate any donation which will enable us to continue restoring vital ecosystems and supporting our most vulnerable wildlife.

During its 60-year history, these examples demonstrate the impact the Trust has had, locally:

- Purchased Lemsford Springs Nature Reserve with a fascinating array of habitats: shallow spring-fed lagoons, marsh, willow woodland, hedgerow and meadow a great spot for winter birdwatching (1970)
- Took Tewin Orchard, a traditional village orchard, under management to protect it for wildlife, including badgers, deer, swallows, fungi and bullfinches (1985). Celebrated the Badger Hide at the nature reserve being opened by Kim Wilde and Steve Kourik (1990)
- Bought Archers Green Nature Reserve, following a successful £500,000 fundraising campaign, allowing a diverse range of plants and animals to flourish (2023)
- Proposed and secured Panshanger Park being named as Hertfordshire's first (and only England's 10th) Dragonfly Hotspot by the British Dragonfly Society, in partnership with owners, Tarmac (2023).

Kids Eat Free

It can be difficult trying to find places to eat with your children when you're on a budget, so we've rounded up a list of places to eat this Summer where your kids can eat for less or even for free!

<u>Asda</u> - Kids (aged 16 and under) eat for £1 all day, every day

<u>Beefeater</u> - Two children under 16 can get a free breakfast every day with one paying adult

Bella Italia - Kids eat free all day every Thursday and for £1 between 4-6pm, Sunday - Wednesday

<u>Bill's</u> - Up to two kids can eat for free on weekdays from 22 July-30 August, with one adult main dish

<u>Brewers Fayre</u> - Up to two kids can receive a free breakfast with one paying adult

<u>Dobbies Garden Centre</u> - One free children's breakfast with any adult traditional or full breakfast or a free child's hot meal or pick n mix lunch box with any adult main course

<u>Dunelm Café</u> - Free mini meal deal with every £4 spent in the cafe. <u>Las Iguanas</u> – Kids eat free when you download the 'My Iguanas' app <u>Premier Inn</u> - Kids eat for £1 from 5 July-1 September when an adult purchases a main and drink off the core evening menu

<u>Morrisons</u> - Spend £4.49 & get one free kids meal all day, every day <u>Sainsburys</u> - Kids eat for £1 with the purchase of an adult hot main <u>Sizzling Pub and Grill</u> - Monday to Friday, kids mains are £1 with every adult meal

<u>YO! Sushi</u> - From 1 July - 30 August, kids eat free all day when dining with a full-paying adult

<u>TGI Fridays</u> - Kids eat free when 'Stripes Rewards Members' order an adult's main, all day every day.

Make sure you always check the terms and conditions of each restaurant or café before you go to avoid disappointment or unwanted cost. You can do this on their websites or check with the restaurant staff before ordering.

Fun Facts about the Olympic Games

The 2024 Summer Olympics marks the third time Paris has hosted the event

The second-ever modern Olympics were held here in 1900, and then Paris hosted them again in 1924. Paris and London are now tied for hosting the most Olympics. At the next Summer Games in 2028, Los Angeles will host its third, making it a three-way tie.

Before the Games begin, there's a months-long Torch Relay As always, the relay began in Greece, an homage to the home of the ancient Olympics. Greece also has the honour of entering first during the Parade of Nations, while the host nation enters last. (In 2004, when Athens hosted, the Greek flag bearer entered first, while the rest of the Greek delegation entered last). The torch was lit in April, reached France in May and continues to tour the country and its territories overseas. Along the way, about 10,000 torchbearers will carry it through more than 400 towns.

During the 2024 Opening Ceremony, athletes won't parade through a stadium

Instead, they are expected to float on boats down the River Seine toward the Eiffel Tower. For the first time ever, free access will be offered via invitation. Of course, some shelled out serious cash for the best seats and views: The last unsold tickets were just shy of $\pounds 2,400$ apiece.

The Olympics feature fewer events than they used to Tokyo 2020 had a whopping 339 events. The count for Paris 2024 is still high, though, at 329. But take note of this fact about the Olympics: Gone are karate (not entertaining enough, according to Reuters) and baseball (the Olympics schedule conflicts with Major League Baseball). But there is also one entirely new sport this summer: breaking—or, as it's more commonly known, breakdancing. No other dance sport has previously been included at the Olympics.

Unusual sports were once part of the Games Solo synchronized swimming (ummm ...), tandem bicycle, tug-of-war, hot-air ballooning and a swimming obstacle race. And from 1912 to 1948, the Olympics also included artistic competitions. Painters, sculptors, architects, writers and musicians all vied for medals in their fields.

Strange Olympic mascots have been a tradition since 1968 The Olympic mascots are anthropomorphic something-or-others that are supposedly symbolic of the host country's culture.

This time, it's a phryge (FRI-jee-uh)—a soft red hat worn during the French Revolution. Other odd mascots have included the indefinable Izzy (prompting the question from those who couldn't tell, "What Izzy?") from Atlanta '96, and a one-eyed -Teletubby-esque creature called Wenlock from London 2012.
