



REPORT A MISSED HOUSEHOLD BIN COLLECTION

Please only report a missed collection after 5pm on the day of collection.

All missed collections must be reported within 48 hours in order for East Herts Council to return.

PUBLIC LITTER BINS

Please be sensible as to what you put in the public litter bins otherwise they overflow and cause a health hazard:

- Do not stuff large bags of rubbish in them as it leaves no room for genuine litter including dog poo bags
- Do not put waste food in the bins foxes will dig it out and spread litter all over the ground
- Do not put household rubbish in public litter bins.
- · If you are having a picnic, please take your rubbish home with you.

NB: If your rubbish is going to fill the bin, then you should be taking it away with you.

HEDGES

Now that the birds have finished nesting, Tewin Parish Council would be grateful if all residents who have hedges on their land bordering a footpath or pavement would cut them back if they are overhanging or partially blocking the path.

COMMON RAGWORT

This is a common weed found throughout the British Isles however it is very toxic to horses and other livestock and can have potentially fatal consequences if ingested either in its green or dried state.

Under the Weeds Act 1959 the Secretary of State may serve an enforcement notice on the occupier of land on which injurious weeds are growing, requiring the occupier to take action to prevent the spread of injurious weeds. The Weeds Act specifies five injurious weeds: Common Ragwort, Spear Thistle, Creeping or Field Thistle, Broad-leaved Dock and Curled Dock.

By promoting good practice and good neighbourliness it is hoped that this weed can be controlled.

If you find you have it in your garden please put rubber gloves on and remove the plant and place it in the <u>black bin</u> to prevent livestock eating it.

Fragments of root will remain in the ground so new growth will have to be monitored and removed year after year.

Notes from an Apiary

The honey is now harvested, and we are into our winter preparations. You may ask how did it go, was it a good crop? Well, must not complain but not as much as we would have liked. As predicted the bees were subject to starvation through August as nectar dried up completely. This means they start to use the reserves they have in the hive and also try to rob other hives, or get robbed themselves. The long hot and dry summer had slowed the nectar flow significantly. No nectar no honey.

Just how do bees make honey. Plants exude nectar to attract pollinators. Honey production begins when worker bees visit flowers to collect nectar, the main components are sucrose and water, typically about 70-80% water and 15-20% sugars, mostly sucrose. The bees store this solution in their "Honey Stomachs". Glands in the mouth of the bee secrete enzymes, an "invertase" called sucrase or â-fructofuranosidase, this enables the hydrolysis or breakdown of sucrose into simpler sugars: glucose and fructose. At this point we have a very dilute honeylike substance. The flying bees pass this to house bees who store the liquid in cells of the honeycomb. The bees keep the hive warm and fan air over the open cells to dry out the honey, from about 70% water to below 20% water. Thinking about that, for every 1lb of honey the bees have dried off about 3 lb of water! At this point the honey is "ripe" or finished and the bees will put a wax cap over the comb to preserve the honey.



Fun fact. Bees convert sucrose, the sugar we know into fructose and glucose. Sucrose would crystalise and be unusable by the bees while glucose and fructose are more stable and will keep as honey for a long time. If you make ice cream or sorbets, try substituting some of the sucrose in the recipe for powdered glucose or glucose syrup. You should find the finished product to be smoother and to reduce ice crystals in the product



Team Vicar's Letter

Do you have a bible? If so, how often do you pick it up? For some people reading Scripture is a daily event, but for many of us, the bible (if we have one) commonly sits on a shelf collecting dust. Maybe we don't know where to start. Maybe we don't believe it would have anything relevant to say to our lives. Maybe we think it's boring. But before you dismiss the bible as a dusty old relic consider this: it's the world's best selling, most translated, most smuggled and quoted book of all time. It was written over 1500 years by shepherds, fishermen, kings and prophets. It includes a talking donkey (yes really), sea-splitting escapes, a bloke swallowed by a fish (and vomited out again), shipwrecks and lions' dens, and the original wine-making miracle at a wedding. St Peter's News

I am writing this to you this month from a quirky little cottage in North Creake, a small village in Norfolk. From the front the cottage looks as though it couldn't possibly accommodate one person, let alone six. It's a rural Tardis with a long narrow garden at the back leading to a tiny stream. The village is not far from the ruins of Creake Abbey, which has a sad history, being once an Augustinian Priory and Hospital of St Bartholomew with extensive fine buildings from the early 13th century. It was soon elevated to the status of Abbey by Henry III but in 1484 was drastically reduced in size by a very serious fire, and then the plague struck. The Abbot himself was the last one to die of plague, and all alone. In the 14th century the buildings reverted to the ownership of Margaret Beaufort and then to Christ's College, Cambridge.

North Creake is typical of many rural villages in Norfolk in that it has a large church which is hardly used. Here they have Evensong once a month at 5pm on the first Sunday in the month - this week it was Harvest Festival, and Holy Communion at 10am on the third Wednesday in the month. How lucky we are to have a weekly service every Sunday at St Peter's with a reasonable congregation, not to mention special services for Remembrance Day, All Souls and at Easter and Christmas. And to welcome families and friends for the special events in their lives of birth, marriages and deaths. When I visit the church during the week, it is always lovely to meet visitors to St Peter's. I recently met a young man who now lives in London who remembered Christingle services on Christmas Eve when he was little. He was very interested to hear about our regular monthly gatherings for families at Messy Church, of which he was ignorant. Messy Church began again on 21st September.

In August we continued to follow the theme of *Animals in the Bible* at Summer Evensongs across the Welwyn Team, ending at Tewin on the last day of August with Reader Usha Hull preaching about donkeys in the bible. The Sunday before we were delighted to hold our Annual Joint Service with the congregation of All Saints Datchworth on Burnham Green as part of the Burnham Green Festival. This usually be-

gins with our bell ringers ringing hand bells which is so lovely to hear. At other times recently you may have heard the bells at the church ringing out, not on Sundays. This has been often by visiting bellringers but also for weddings.

Our Harvest Festival Service takes place on Sunday 28th September when the church will be decorated by our team of flower arrangers. We shall also be celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the priesting of the Rev'd Edward Cardale who is a regular attender at St Peter's and conducts services as a member of the retired clergy, across the Welwyn Team.

We are always looking for people to help with flower arranging. If you would like to join the rota for this or contribute to our flower fund, please contact Elaine Fowler on elaineandkeith@sky.com or leave an envelope at the church marked "Church Flowers". Looking forward into October, we have Bellringing School at St Peter's on Saturday 4th from 2-4pm, and yet another baptism on the 12th and several funerals and burials of ashes during the month. Otherwise services will be as stated in the magazine.

Susannah has been away for some of August and September on her annual holiday and leading a retreat for the diocese. We would like to thank the other clergy and readers from the Welwyn Team who have been there to lead our services.



It had to happen. Eventually the rain came and scuppered our plans. Our club doubles tournaments, both Ladies and Mens, were set for a Sunday in the middle of September. The predicted rain did actually appear. The ladies matches were set for the morning and we might have got away with those, but it was a surefire washout for the afternoon mens matches so we called them all off a couple of days beforehand.

Apologies to members who had entered. The good news is that we are revisiting the event on Sunday September 28 (correct as we go to press) and if Jackie is as sharp at publishing the October Tewin Magazine as she is with most issues, you can nip down to watch and socialise even if you haven't entered.

We've generally had an excellent run at good weather for tennis this year, and so little need to rely on mobile phone apps to tell us the story we want to hear.
