The article was published: 'We asked leading figures what they wanted for Christmas. The Archbishop of Canterbury said he wanted an end to the violence in Iraq. The Dali Lama said he wanted peace in the Middle East. The Pope said he wanted an end to poverty. The Minister for Trade and Industry said he wanted a jar of stem ginger.'

I wonder what you really want this Christmas? Is it yet more socks (which are of course terribly handy), Bubblebath? Chocolate? The latest 'Apple' gadget? Or is there something more satisfying?

The church calendar sets aside two periods of the year which we are encouraged to spend in the sort of self examination which may enable us to move on in some way or other towards better things.

The process is one familiar to those in business where it is called 'appraisal'. My experience of that is slight as it did not exist in the days I started, or, better put, it was something that happened but was not shared with you.

Appraisal in business was never very satisfying. The concentration seemed to be on where you were falling short with important implications for the future. It might even be carried out by someone who hardly knew you, whose faults and shortcomings seemed to you like a beam in his eve compared with your speck, which incidentally you never believed was there anyway.

Self appraisal is an opportunity to be realistic with oneself, not to wallow in self denigrating gloom. There may be some recognition of falling short or worse but also take time to recognise where things seem to be going well. Most things can be stepped up a notch.

Miles Davis, the great jazz composer and instrumentalist, wrote a piece called "So What". There is a rising theme on a saxophone at the end of which there are two chords. They say "So What" and become the response to every attempt to move the piece forward towards some conclusion. It ends unresolved and very much as it started. It leaves one wishing for some positive resolution or satisfactory outcome.

Our Village Pre-School

The Autumn term is now coming to an end, the pre-school has been working on a variety of topics, including road and firework safety, under the sea, Autumn and friendship.

We were delighted with the outcome of our recent *Ofsted* inspection, for which we were awarded a '**Good**' rating overall, with an '**Outstanding**' rating given to the areas of establishing partnerships, deployment of resources, engagement with parents and carers and adoption of healthy lifestyles. This is a wonderful achievement and congratulations to Sarah, Angela, Melissa, Loida and Sharon, whose hard work and dedication have achieved this rating.

We were awarded £1000 from Councillor Bryan Hammond as part of the Locality Budget Scheme to replace the bark mulch play area with rubber eco-bark, resulting in a saving of approx £250 a year through not having to replace the bark, which sprouted funghi during the damp months. A huge 'thanks' goes to the parents who gave up a weekend in November to transform the area for us. We hope to welcome Councillor Hammond shortly to thank him in person and show him our beautiful new play area.

Our first fund raising event, a Quiz Night, was a wonderful success. Alison Cox did a great job once again, organising a fun night in aid of the pre-school. We would also like to thank all the parents who helped in the lead up and on the day. Local businesses were very supportive in their generous raffle prizes and I would like to thank the Rose & Crown, the White Horse at Burnham Green, Gosling Sports Centre, Lees Fish & Chips, Panshanger Aerodrome, plus many more.

The excitement of Christmas is building at the pre-school and the children are very much looking forward to their trip to St Peter's Church on Thursday 8th December.

With our first term now coming to an end, all the staff, parents and committee would like to wish everyone a very happy Christmas and a healthy and prosperous New Year.



TEWIN MEMORIAL HALL GRANT UPDATES

Over the years, finance for the general maintenance of the Hall has been raised through Fetes, Jumble Sales, Book Sales, and our Supporters' Club, as well as through the Hall's own limited building reserves. In addition, the History Book Group has donated to the Memorial Hall all proceeds from the sale of 'The History of Tewin by the People of Tewin', which to date total £5,500.

We have also been applying for grants, and this year were awarded £11,296 by East Herts District Council, for which we are very grateful. In addition, sponsorship from the Parish Council, Friends of Tewin, THACS and The History Book Group, allowed us to apply for a £24,500 grant from Biffaward, a multi-million pound environment fund managed by the Royal Society of Wildlife Trusts (RSWT), which utilises landfill tax credits donated by Biffa Waste Services. This is a major boost to our funds and we wish to thank Biffaward for this invaluable contribution.

The Under 5's Group were also successful in obtaining from the Big Lottery Fund a \pounds 10,000 grant towards the replacement of the Scout Hut roof. The Big Lottery Fund distributes half of the National Lottery Good Cause Funding across the UK. The Fund aims to enable others to make real improvement to communities and the lives of people most in need.

As a result of this funding, the Memorial Hall was able to replace the Kitchen roof, which was followed by replacement of the Scout Hut roof, together with new fascias. The Scout Hut roof is now fully insulated, whereas it was found to have had no insulation in the past. In the Main Hall, the Kitchen and Bar have been refurbished and the Kitchen now has new cupboards, a range cooker, and a new large fridge. There is also a new door from the Kitchen into the Bar, the latter having been fully fitted out to include a new drinks cooler. The Bar is now connected to the Kimberley Room, as a result of which that room is suitable for separate hire. In addition, two new boilers have been installed in the Hall, with old cast-iron pipes replaced with copper. It took the contractor 10 days to install 270 metres of new piping!

Obviously, these changes entailed a good deal of work, not only by the contractors but also by members of the Hall Committee. A particular mention should be given to Keith St Pier and Rod Frayne, who have saved the Hall a great deal of money in labour costs by carrying out an immense amount of the work themselves. Keith also devised a computerised programme for the heating controls. This divides the Hall into three zones (Main Hall, Kimberley Room and Parish Room), enabling them all to be heated separately. This innovation will enable the Committee to monitor the overall use of the Hall and make it much more energy efficient in future. The Committee is very grateful to Keith and Rod for their invaluable contribution, as well as to Julia Tizard, who has helped with re-painting the rooms.

All this work, plus ongoing projects, will make the Hall one of the most attractive and efficient facilities for parties and other events. It is also one of the cheapest in the area so we hope you will consider hiring it for any future celebrations you are planning in order to help us keep this magnificent building in good order for future generations.

The eleventh **THACS** AGM takes place at Tewin Memorial Hall at 8.00pm. It will include the Chairman's and Treasurer's reports for 2011, the election of the officers and other committee members for 2012, plus a preview of the events we will be holding in 2012.

The AGM will be followed by a talk, and then refreshments (including wine). The talk will be 'A *Passion for Nature*' given by Ann Miles FRPS AFIAP MPAGB, an established and successful photographer, lecturer and tutor. For samples of her work visit **http://www.pin-sharp.co.uk/**

The talk shows the natural world from a pictorial photographer's angle, with close-up and sharp images of birds, insects, mammals and flowers. Ann will also include more atmospheric and abstract shots. Discover how the choice of background, aperture and lighting conditions can make all the difference in nature, as with other types of photography.



This is an important meeting for **THACS** and all members are urged to attend. Non-members are very welcome but not able to vote.

New Life into an Old Pond - John Sheridan

In late 2010 a proposal was submitted and approved by the Parish Council for the renovation of the village pond on Upper Green. The pond had deteriorated over many years and was seriously in need of some tender loving care.

A project team was formed early in 2011 intending to complete the renovation, helped by volunteers, with no costs to the Parish Council. Friends of Tewin kindly agreed to consider meeting reasonable costs of any planting work undertaken.

Consultations took place with Hertfordshire Records Officer and Hertfordshire Countryside Management Service to seek their advice on the project. As suspected, the problem was that the pond needed more sunlight so dead and unwanted trees had to be removed.

Records showed that an E.U. protected species, Great Crested Newts, had lived in the pond long ago so a survey was required by a specialised Surveyor to see if the newts remained. Such surveys are expensive as is the cost of felling or removing unwanted trees.



With no monies available the project was in danger of collapsing. Thankfully, a specialist Surveyor agreed to work without charge and Patrick (Paddy) Loughrey, the neighbouring farmer, would remove the trees when required. The survey revealed Great Crested Newts were resident in the pond so work had to be left until the newts left in the Autumn.

In October 2011, Paddy and his men removed the unwanted trees and brambles with heavy machinery, and clearance work began in earnest. Items cleared from the pond included a motorbike and several rusty cycles! A call for volunteers to complete the remainder of the clearance work was successful.

Logs from the removed trees were used to form a permanent wildlife habitat on the eastern bank. Six bird nesting boxes were erected on surrounding oak trees and a log based seat provided. The existing bench seat will undergo restoration next Spring.

The final stage was planting 500 daffodil bulbs and wild flower seed scattered along the pond banks. Thanks to the generosity of Friends of Tewin for funding the bulbs and seed.

My personal thanks go to all volunteers who gave their time and energy to completing the project and to Paddy and his men who were so helpful at every stage.

I hope parishioners will find time to visit the pond, where the water level is already rising, to see the changes but it will be Springtime when the real difference will be apparent.

FRIENDS OF DANESBURY & QUEEN VICTORIA MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

The Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital has long played an important role in our community. Originally Welwyn's cottage hospital, it now has a key role in a wider area providing rehabilitation care to patients moving from one of our acute hospitals back into the community. There is major refurbishment work planned for 2011 and the Friends have agreed to provide £60,000 to redesign and rebuild the reception area, including a designated space for patients and their families. We are delighted to have this opportunity to support the QVM Hospital which has given so much to so many over the years.

At our AGM we were sad to receive the resignation of Pat Lewis. Pat has been involved with first QVM, of which she was the Secretary of the League of Friends, and then Danesbury. Her contribution over almost 35 years has been invaluable and her wise counsel will be greatly missed.

Last month we invited anyone interested in the work of the Trustees to make contact with us. If you would like to know more, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Tewin Village Pond, Upper Green



These restoration works comprised of removal of accumulated rubbish and several dead or unwanted trees to allow light and air into the pond. Following a specialist survey, the pond was also found to be the home of the Great Crested Newt, an E.U. protected species, and a wildlife log habitat has now been established next to the pond for the benefit of the newts and other wildlife. Several bird nesting boxes have been put up and 500 wild daffodil bulbs and wild flower seed were donated by Friends of Tewin and have been planted along the banks of the pond.
