During my childhood and adolescence in rural Wales every season and festival of the agricultural year was celebrated in the Parish Church. Plough Sunday, Rogationtide, Lammastide and Harvest Thanksgiving were all marked. My role as Agricultural Chaplain for Hertfordshire has afforded me the opportunity to revisit these festivals that were part of the natural cycle of worship in earlier Christian communities.

Sunday May 17th is **Rogation Sunday**. Originally the Christian observance of Rogation was taken from the Graeco-Roman religion, where an annual procession invoked divine favour to protect crops from mildew. Rogation Sunday precedes the 3 weekdays or Rogation Days, before Ascension Day. Traditionally parishioners processed around the Parish boundary stopping at intervals for prayer and blessing of the land. The procession would conclude with a Mass. During the Reformation the procession was suppressed but it was restored in 1559.

The poet George Herbert gave the following good reasons for the procession:

a blessing of God for the fruits of the field;

justice in the preservation of the bounds;

Charitie, in living, walking and neighbourly accompanying one another, with reconciling of differences at that time, if they be any;

Mercie, in relieving the poor by a liberal distribution of largess which at that time is or oght be made.

Good reasons not just for Rogationtide but for daily living.

A Prayer for Rogationtide

Almighty God, whose will it is that the earth should bear its fruits in their seasons: direct the labours of those who work on the land, that they may employ the resources of nature to your glory, for our own well-being and for the relief of those in need; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Chairman's Report to the Annual Parish Meeting, 6 April 2009

Seven of the eight Councillors elected in May 2007 have continued to represent Tewin's North and South Wards. Cllr Mike Howe having resigned at the beginning of 2008, and no election being called, the vacancy was filled by co-option and Cllr John Sheridan took his seat in May 2008. Cllr Kristina Lawson and Cllr Keith St Pier were re-elected as Chairman and Vice Chairman for a further year.

As usual, the Council's activities have been reported in the Parish News and on the Tewin Village Website.

Two newsletters have been distributed during the year: one for the Chairman's report to the Annual Parish Meeting in June and another on Affordable Housing, the Housing Capacity Assessment and other planning issues in September. A letter from the Chairman accompanied the distribution of the Parish Plan, also in September.

During the year the Parish Council has received and commented on 34 planning applications compared with an unusually high number of 46 the previous year. EHC granted 17 of these and refused six; another six were withdrawn and decisions on a further four and the result of one appeal are awaited. The main reason for refusal was the cumulative effect of the development.

The Parish Council also takes note of the progress of developments which are subject to planning permission and liaises with EHC on enforcement issues. Particular attention has been given to several new infill developments within the village boundary. Aspects of the Seven Acres Development are still under discussion, including a Section 106 Agreement. The Parish Council also provided comments on an application for 'Affordable Housing' on a 'Rural Exception Site' outside the designated village boundary, which was part of Site 8 (known as 'the chicken field') north of Godfries Close. As the village boundary was redrawn in 2007, the Parish Council objected to these plans for affordable housing outside the boundary, which almost certainly would be a precursor to further development on the site. We also informed EHC that any changes to the boundary would be unacceptable.

Comments on the EHC Housing Capacity Assessment and Edge of Settlement Survey were made in April. The resulting response from EHC was subsequently published in a newsletter. Although Tewin Wood is no longer a designated Environmental Zone, it is outside the village boundary and EHC has applied other policies in several recent planning decisions on applications which have been considered unsuitable in the Metropolitan Green Belt. Comments on the Welwyn Hatfield Core Strategy Consultation have been invited recently.

The Council continued to monitor developments on the proposed water abstraction borehole in Hertford Road and Benington Wind Farm and communicated with the local MP, Oliver Heald, on both issues. A representative from Three Valleys Water attended the meeting to give a presentation on the borehole proposal in October.

The Council has continued maintenance of the public footpaths and bridle paths within the Parish, together with grass cutting, tree pruning and repairs to Council property such as the Pavilion. Two wooden benches were installed on Lower Green, in time for the summer, to replace the old seats which had become expensive to repair.

The Parish Council has budgeted for a precept of £16,900 for the financial year 2009-10, compared with £16,700 the previous year -a rise of just 1.2%. A small increase has been possible because several large projects were completed in the previous financial year.

.At the beginning of 2009, the Council adopted the model publication scheme under the Freedom of Information Act and agreed to publish the scheme and guide to information.

A financial risk assessment procedure was implemented for the 2008-09 financial year and quarterly internal audits by Councillors have taken place, most recently in February. The Clerks' revised contract was signed in May 2008 and the Council also clarified its procedure on co-option of councillors in the event of a vacancy.

Monitoring highways maintenance work and liaising with the County Council, is an ongoing process and a table of works in progress is appended to the Minutes of each Council Meeting. In March this year, unscheduled patching was carried out in Upper Green Road and Orchard Road, as a result of liaison with Hertfordshire Highways.

The efforts to find a permanent solution to the flooding at the junction of Churchfield Road and Margery Lane, involving the creation of a ditch in the adjacent field, appear to have been successful. All owners of land should be aware of their responsibility for clearing ditches and ensuring that water from their land does not flood onto the road.

In the interests of road safety, and in anticipation of the new housing development at Seven Acres, the Parish Council continued to explore the possibility of extending the footway from Godfries Close up to Tewin Garage and the possible installation of a flashing speed sign on Upper Green Road. Signs for the Village Hall and Scout Hut have been requested, but not yet installed.

The Parish Council is responsible for the repair and protection of most of the grassed areas within the Parish, including Village Greens, Common Land and roadside verges, which define Tewin's rural character. Too often, these are damaged by vehicles. Another issue of concern is inconsiderate parking, on pavements and along narrow roads, which causes a hazard to pedestrians or other road users. The Parish Council has decided against a request to introduce dog waste bins, but reiterated EHC's dog litter policy, reminding dog owners that it is an offence to allow dogs to foul these grassed areas, public footpaths and pavements: the waste can be placed in litter bins or taken home.

The telephone box opposite the Rose and Crown is on BT's list for removal. After some consideration the Parish Council agreed to adopt it, subject to certain conditions, so that it can be retained as a feature within the Conservation Area. Village groups have agreed to donate funds for the electricity disconnection, and we have just received notification that this process will go ahead.

The Parish Plan and associated Action Plan were adopted by the Parish Council in May and in July the Parish Council agreed to a timetable to take the Parish Plan forward. Copies of the full document were distributed to all households in the Parish in September. The Action Plan made provision for Working Groups to be set up to take forward a number of issues raised by the Parish Plan and where feasible to involve Parishioners who had expressed interest in those issues.

Terms of Reference for a Further Analysis Group to look in more detail at issues including parking, and for a Transport Group were agreed in December. The Further Analysis Group met early in 2009 and work started on identifying locations in which parking is perceived to be a problem. The Transport Group met for the first time in March and covered issues such as awareness of the current bus service and access to essential services. It was decided that further discussion was needed before setting up a third proposed working group, to consider the development of a Village Design Statement.

Passenger numbers on the 388 bus appear to be holding up well. Return fares to the local stations remain very competitive with daily parking rates, for individual travellers. Over 60s are reminded that a Hertfordshire bus pass entitles them to travel free on most bus services throughout England, with reductions on some local train services.

On behalf of the Parish Council, I would like to thank the Tewin Stores Association and everyone who has contributed towards the successful running of Tewin Stores, which opened as a community shop more than a year ago, and the reopening of the Post Office in September.

Along with other funding organizations, the Parish Council has contributed a grant towards the development of the café area, in particular to provide access into the garden for prams, pushchairs and wheelchairs.

The Parish Council's nominated representatives on Tewin Charities continue to be Cllr David Howson, for a further four years and Roger Temple whose current term ends in 2009. In addition, in May 2008 the Parish Council confirmed its informal representatives for the Memorial Hall, Parish Paths Partnership, for Transport issues, Tewin Society, Tewin website committee, the Parish Plan, Locality Policing and Tewin Stores Association. Cllr Howson has since become responsible for liaison with the Sports Clubs.

Regular contact has continued to be maintained with the local police. Karen Broad became the new Police Community Support Officer for the area. She attended the Parish Council Meeting in March and walks round the village as often as possible. The Mobile Police van continues to come to Lower Green on the first Wednesday of each month and Neighbourhood watch remains active. Cllr Lloyd continues to liaise on local policing issues and Cllr Evans attended a Locality Police Meeting in May.

Occasional thefts from property have been reported, together with some fly-tipping and abandoned vehicles. Parishioners are advised to be vigilant and report anything suspicious. It should be remembered that crime is still very low in this area.

East Herts Rural Parish Conference on 29 May was attended by Cllrs Doreen Lloyd and Steve Stott.

During the year the Parish Council has taken legal responsibility for the organization of events on the Village Greens, including the Classic Car event and the Christmas tree and Carols on the Green. Members of Friends of Tewin continue to run these events on behalf of the Parish Council. Discussions were held with Church regarding War Memorial Restoration, but after cleaning it was decided to take no further action yet. The Parish Council agreed to provide a loan to assist in the production of the book: A History of Tewin by the People of Tewin.

Brown bins were introduced by EHC for the collection of garden waste in April last year. New blue boxes for plastic bottles, and some other changes to collections are expected to be in force in autumn this year. Householders are reminded to find a discreet place to store their bins and boxes and remove them from the roadside as soon as possible after the collection.

The Parish Council rents land adjacent to the Tewin Cowper School for use as allotments and the land is leased to the Allotment Association. The Parish Council recently received an application for additional land, which has now been approved by the landowner.

The Parish Council has continued to support sport and recreation in Tewin. The playground continues to be well used. Weekly risk inspections and the annual inspection have taken place successfully. Several small repairs have been undertaken by the installation company. Datchworth Veterans football team continued to use the pitch on Upper Green for a second season, for a small charge. A youth team has also been using the pitch this season and the football posts continue to be available for use by local young people outside the main season.

In July, as earlier proposals had halted, the Parish Council agreed that it should set in progress a project to plan the refurbishment or eventual replacement of the Pavilion. Funds had already been allocated for refurbishment and the Clerk has spent additional time, together with Cllr B. Evans, investigating the possible options, liaising with the sports clubs and developing a proposal for the way forward. New funding is more likely to be forthcoming if junior and girls teams are being supported.

Once again, I would like to thank not only the Clerk and Councillors but everyone who has contributed to this year's activities, for their hard work, help, and support.



Hertfordshire Gardeners' bumper crop for good causes!

In 2008 fifty-six gardens across Hertfordshire raised a record £51,000 by opening for charity. This year a similar number will be opening for the National Gardens Scheme and a leaflet giving the details is now out. It will be available **FREE** from libraries, Tourist Information

Centres, nurseries and Garden Centres across the county.

The money raised goes to caring and nursing charities including Macmillan Cancer Support; Marie Curie Cancer Care; Help the Hospices; Crossroads – Caring for Carers and The Queens Nursing Institute as well as some local charities nominated by the garden owners. Last year Macmillan Cancer Support and Marie Curie Cancer Care received £500,000 each from the national NGS income of over £2m.

Hertfordshire NGS County Organiser Edwina Robarts said: "£51,000 is unbelievable. It is a 38.8% increase on 2007 when we raised £37,000. I would like to thank everyone, especially the garden owners, for all their hard work. I would also like to thank everyone who visited the gardens for their generosity. I hope 2009 will be another bumper year."

FRIENDS OF DANESBURY AND OUEEN VICTORIA MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Following the confirmation last year that Danesbury would continue to provide respite care it has been very encouraging to see Danesbury developing in the way originally envisaged when the new premises in School Lane were built.

Danesbury is now designated as a Neurological Centre. It continues to offer an ongoing home for a small number of people and to offer respite care for people with a neurological problem and complex health care needs.

It is also now able to offer neurological rehabilitation aimed at helping patients get back to achieving their most important goals, either by improving their physical abilities or by finding new ways of doing things. Patients coming into Danesbury may have conditions such as Stroke, Multiple Sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, Motor Neurone Disease, Acquired Brain Injury, neurosurgery following brain tumours and many more conditions.

Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists, Speech and Language Therapists, Dieticians, Psychologists, Specialist Parkinson's disease nurses and Specialist MS nurses have all joined the nursing team at Danesbury to enable this wider service to be offered.

The Primary Care Trust (PCT) are hoping in the future to be able to offer more out-patient and home based treatments across North and East Hertfordshire as well as further developing the teams in West Hertfordshire.

Before the developments many of the patients who now come to Welwyn would have had to go to London for the intensive rehabilitation now provided locally.

The Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital also offers rehabilitation to adults aged 18+. The ultimate aim is for patients to return home, sometimes with a package of care, adaptations and/or equipment.

The unit is running at full capacity and has benefited recently from refurbishment. It is a bright and pleasant place to be for patients and staff. Both patients and staff are looking forward to using the sheltered gardens as spring progresses.

HERTFORDSHIRE CONSTABULARY LAUNCH NEW INITIATIVE TO TARGET DISTRACTION BURGLARS

Hertfordshire Constabulary are calling on neighbours to look out for suspicious behaviour in a bid to reduce distraction burglaries. The call comes as part of a new initiative which detectives hope will help tackle the problem. Residents are asking people to display new 'burglar beware' window stickers in their homes and cars.

Detective Chief Inspector Paul Williamson, from the Serious and Organised Crime Unit, said: "Distraction burglary means quite literally that a criminal will attempt to distract a person in their home while they or a colleague carry out a burglary. They tend to target the elderly and more vulnerable people in our communities and can be very convincing.

"We're asking people to display the stickers in their homes to act as a warning to offenders that the residents of the county are keeping a watchful eye on them. But we hope they will have a dual message for residents to report any behaviour which they believe is suspicious, or simply out of the ordinary."

In a recent example in West Watford, a man dialled 999 to report two men who were acting suspiciously near some sheltered accommodation in his street. Minutes after his call, police officers had arrested the men. They were later found guilty of carrying out a distraction burglary in the home of an elderly man, and are now serving a combined prison sentence of over nine years for the offence.

Detective Chief Inspector Paul Williamson, from the Serious and Organised Crime Unit, said: "We rely on immediate information from residents to be able to apprehend these criminals and this is the main focus for the new initiative. We're asking everyone to look out for their older and more vulnerable neighbours and report suspicious behaviour to the police immediately with as much information as possible, such as descriptions or car details." DCI Williamson continued: "I can understand that some people feel like they may be wasting police time by reporting suspicious behaviour, but we'd rather people report it in the first place and it turns out to be innocent, than not report it at all." Distraction burglaries account for a small proportion of burglaries in the county, however Hertfordshire Constabulary gives the following advice to reduce the risk of becoming a victim of distraction burglary, or bogus callers:

Rule One:

If a stranger calls - Not sure? Don't open the door! If you are not expecting anyone and you don't recognise them, don't let them into your home. Be aware, bogus callers can be very convincing and will often pretend to be representing a utility company; a genuine caller won't mind coming back at a time when you can arrange to have somebody you trust with you.

Rule Two:

If you are expecting a caller: Only open your door when you are happy that you know the person. If you can't see who is calling and need to open the door, use your door chain and ask for identification or a pre-arranged password before you let them in.

Rule Three:

Never keep large amounts of cash at home If you ensure that large amounts of money are securely in a bank or building society account and any valuable jewellery is safely and discreetly locked away then, even if a criminal cons their way into your home, there is nothing of value for them to steal.
