Just to let you know that the date of our first meeting of 2014 has now changed to **Thursday January 16th**. This is due to Hall maintenance.



The Parish Council would like to thank Friends of Tewin for all their time and effort in arranging the beautifully lit Christmas tree this year and the Carol Singing event.

PRECEPT

The Parish Council reviewed the precept options for the financial year ending 31.3.2015 and in accordance with the Financial Regulations of the Council they unanimously agreed that the precept be increased by $\pounds1,000$ to $\pounds28,000$ to allow for a potential pay rise for the clerk and a Contingency fund in the accounts.

FOOTPATH - Highways Section 106 Funded Footpaths – First Phase (New footpath from Godfries Close up to Upper Green) An onsite meeting was held between Highways, Malcolm Amey, East Herts Council Arboricultural Officer and the Parish Council on 18th November 2013 to discuss the footpath proposal. Final plans will be drawn up by Highways and they will carry out a full consultation with the Parish Council and local residents in due course. We are still waiting to see whether Highways will be able to extend

We are still waiting to see whether Highways will be able to extend this project to include the re-instatement of the north side of Lower Green.

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Team Vicar's Letter

There are three things I remember most clearly about my grandparents' cloakroom in Holwell Rectory.

Firstly was the colour of paint on the walls: a neon yellow. It was as if Sellafield had been experimenting with a paint range and being unsuccessful had done a deal with the Diocese. It has to be true, because no-one in their right minds would have chosen that colour for themselves. Not even a designer on 60 minute make-over (and they specialise in the hideous). It glowed.

Secondly was the 'medicated toilet paper'. Now I am aware that there may still be some fans of this out there, but it remains a mystery to me as much as it did then. Coming from a house where soft, strong and very long was the only way to go, being met with crisp and shiny was always an unpleasant experience.

And thirdly was the large poster which hung there for years. In later life I learned it to be known as the poem 'God Knows' by Minnie Louise Haskins, popularised when King George VI quoted it in his Christmas broadcast in 1939.

'And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown". And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand in the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way". So I went forth and finding the hand of God, trod gladly into the night. And he led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East".

We stand at the gate of the year. It might be this New Year is exciting; full of possibilities, plans, possibly key celebrations lying ahead. Or it may be the future is less clear, just an unknown. Or for some of us we may see ahead a little – and failing health, or financial strain, or loss of a loved one means the year ahead looks dark before we've even begun.

But I look back to that child balanced on the toilet seat, legs swinging, mulling over her grandparents' bad taste in décor and what it might feel like to hold the hand of God. And I can look back and see that hand of God in all things through her life, in days of light and dark. And I remind her that she needs to take that hand once more; because that hand leads us through the dark into the breaking of the day.

The members of the congregation who help with the Story Club at Tewin Cowper School saw the results of their work in the first of the church's Christmas services. At the Family Service on the 15th some 30 children and 60 adults attended to watch the younger children perform the Nativity Play, orchestrated from the pulpit by a very grumpy innkeeper (Lydia). The church was full.

On 18th December 'Carols on the Green' were relocated into the School Hall due to bad weather, but the occasion was successful nonetheless, raising some £200 for Shelter.

The Christingle Service, organised by Dragonfly class, played to a packed house at St Peter's on Friday 20th.

The Sunday evening Carol Concert was tremendous. The highlight (for the writer; a tenor of modest talent) was the performance of Andrei's special arrangement of Silent Night, which had been very difficult to practice but which came together beautifully at the event itself. Having put so much work in, Andrei, Ted and Ruth really merited the critical acclaim they received!

The crib service on Christmas Eve saw more than 150 people in the church, many of them small children. In getting the Christmas message across, Susannah was ably assisted by the Joy family. Later that night, and with the path to the church flooded, more than 70 people braved the weather and made it to midnight mass. Then early on Christmas morning Susannah rounded off her busy time of year with family communion.

Once again we would like to say a big thanks to Susannah and the Welwyn Team for the wonderful work they do for us all; bringing us the good news at Christmas time and keeping the flame burning in our hearts all year round.

St Peter's new organist

Andrei Pytaleu, a renowned international jazz pianist from Belarus, is now also the Church organist at Tewin and Datchworth. Andrei graduated from the Conservatoire in Minsk with a triple diploma in music as a concert pianist, accompanist and piano teacher. Eventually he made the change from classical to jazz which was not conventional, perhaps not approved of by the regime and probably frowned upon by his conservatoire professors. He worked as pianist and arranger with many leading jazz bands around the world and then as resident pianist and concert organiser on cruise liners.

During this time he had the good fortune to meet Liz, then Allen, now Pytaleua who grew up in Tewin and whose mother, Freda, still lives here. This brought them to live in Letchworth. Andrei now teaches jazz and classical piano in Letchworth and Windsor, organises and promotes jazz concerts in Hertford, Tewin, Hitchin and Arlesey. Recently he gave a classical concert with Andrew and Maria, Tewin's resident international opera singers, in Arlesey.

So now as organist, he acquires another thirty pedals, as compared with the piano's two, to master and is doing so with great style. All this tells you what he does but in addition, he is a charming, friendly and very likeable man who has settled in very well as organist at the two churches. When service times clash, I, at Tewin, and Bob, at Datchworth, will hold the fort.

You will have the chance to meet him in his classical piano mode with Maria here in Tewin in early 2014 and in jazz mode at St Mary's Welwyn in Autumn 2014 both of which will be announced in this magazine.

We've had a Quinquennial!

You've had a what? Is that a medical complaint?

Well, it isn't a medical complaint, as such, but it is a "health check". Not on our hardworking churchwarden, Pete, but on the condition of the church building itself. Let me explain: every 5 years our inspecting architect is required to give a detailed report on the condition of our building; and to recommend the timescale within which the various repairs should be undertaken. Fortunately there is nothing too major, BUT there are a number of things which, if not tackled soon, will get worse and more costly to deal with. So we need to grasp the nettle and arrange a contract with a suitable builder.

As we enter a new year, and faced with this expense, now would be an excellent time to review giving levels. A perfect new year resolution! We benefit from many regular Free Will Offering envelope givers and almost 50 who give by bank standing orders; but there is a tendency for the latter in particular, being "automatic", to remain at the same level for many years. So while costs of clergy, heating and general maintenance go up year by year, our regular income

struggles to keep pace.

If we are to tackle the more urgent repairs without prejudicing the funds earmarked for future accommodation changes, we are hoping that existing supporters, and new ones too, will rise to the challenge and help St Peter's with more financial support, either through the envelope scheme, by regular bank standing orders or by one-off donations.

Giving levels naturally vary widely according to personal circumstances but, as a guide, typical standing orders range from ± 100 pa to over $\pm 2,000$ pa., mostly supported by Gift Aid declarations enabling us to recover an extra 25% in tax relief. So if you can help us meet the forthcoming repair bills, as well as rising running costs, your help would be very much appreciated.

CMS: CHURCH MISSION SOCIETY NEWS FROM THE INGLEBY FAMILY IN DELHI

Dave, Rine and their two children are now settled back in India following their happy four months on home leave last Summer. Besides seeing their families again, they also enjoyed visiting all their supporting churches whilst over here, including St Peter's.

The northern Indian State of Uttarakhand had experienced severe flash flooding and landslides in June. Over 6,000 people lost their lives and many homes were swept away. Since then, 'Habitat for Humanity in India' and partners, with whom Dave works, have been involved in distributing emergency and temporary shelter and have started a programme for rebuilding houses. It is a complex process as most people live close to rivers and there is no land on which to build, but now the State Government has allocated plots away from areas at risk.

Rine was pleased to get back to the different projects with which she is involved. She is also now organising a Sunday School for a group of 2-6 year olds, including her two children, Sem and Joanna.

Dave continues to progress in learning Hindi and he and Rine thank everyone for their support in the work they are both doing. They send all good wishes to everyone.

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

A Very Happy New Year to you all

For the past few years it has been a pleasure to announce at this time some new project at either Danesbury or QVM Hospital. This year it is Danesbury's turn.

As previewed at our AGM a major refurbishment of the patients' bedrooms was under consideration. This project, which will cost in the order of £450,000, has now been approved and work is scheduled to begin this month. All the bedrooms will be significantly improved and in addition a new dining area will be created conveniently located on the same level. The new facilities will enable the nursing staff to provide the highest standard of patient care.

The budget for this work is considerable but not sufficient to allow for a proper entertainment system for the patients. Believing that this is something which will truly benefit the patients the Friends have agreed to fund the installation of an appropriate system which will allow for future enhancement if and when it is required. The Friends already provide WiFi access for patients.

In 2013 there was much change in the Health Service and no doubt there is yet more to come. Our work to support Danesbury and QVM has also changed. Quite rightly patient care and their wellbeing are at the forefront. By working closely with the healthcare professionals we are confident that with your help we will continue to make a real difference to those who count the most – the patients and their carers.
