

Testing For Covid-19

Hertfordshire residents with suspected coronavirus symptoms can book a mail-order or drive-through test if they need one. This must be done within 5 days of first symptoms appearing so don't delay.

Please visit the national website to book a test

(https://email.hertfordshire.gov.uk/5ESZ-6SYQ-1M8PZY-55FH5-1/ c.aspx). If you don't have internet access or need additional help, call 119 between 7am and 11pm or 18001 0300 303 2713 if you have hearing or speech difficulties.

If the test shows that you do have coronavirus, you'll be contacted by someone from the NHS Test and Trace team who will:

- tell you to self-isolate for seven days from the day that your symptoms first started
- tell anyone else in your household to self-isolate for 14 days from when you started having symptoms
- ask you to supply the details of anyone you have been in close contact with, from the two days before your symptoms started
- contact those people and tell them to self-isolate for 14 days

Genuine contact tracers will call you from 0300 013 5000/send you text messages from 'NHS'. They will never: ask you for any payment, to purchase a product or download software; ask any details about your bank account or social media; ask for any passwords or PINs; or send someone to your home.

Antibody tests are being rolled out in Hertfordshire, initially for NHS staff only and extended to care home staff and residents in the future.

TEWIN STORES

Your village shop is open. Two customers are allowed on the premises at any one time and the temporary opening hours are Monday to Friday 8am until 12 noon and 8.30am until 12 noon on Saturdays and 9am to 12 noon on Sundays. Shop orders are available. Please refer to the village website for further details.

POST OFFICE at Tewin Stores

The Outreach Post Office will be open from 9.30-11.30am on Wednesdays only, commencing 1 April subject to availability and village shop requirement of only 2 people in the store at any one time.

DRONES

The PCSOs have distributed leaflets warning against the use of a drone which seems to be happening in the area of Grass Warren, Cannons Meadow and Lower Green.

SPEED INDICATION DEVICE ("SID") - School Lane

This has been installed in the wrong place in School Lane and will be moved but there is a 12 week wait for a new ground socket. In the meantime it has been turned round to face traffic entering the village.

UPPER GREEN

The cordoned off area in the middle of Upper Green is specially maintained by the cricket club to ensure a safe surface for playing the game. Please do not go inside the cordon.

TENNIS COURTS

These are now open to players. Over the last Bank Holiday weekend the tennis court netting was vandalised by cutting some of the cable ties holding netting to frame.

TEWIN PAVILION

The Pavilion is still closed.

TREE WORKS

The Parish Council has agreed to tree works to make a tree on Tewin Hill and on Back Lane safe.

NHS TEST & TRACERS

Hertfordshire Constabulary is warning residents to be aware that scammers are posing as NHS Test and Trace contact workers and gathering personal information by deception.

Be very careful if anybody contacts you by phone, text or email claiming that they are from NHS Test and Trace. They should give you an Account Id and password and advise you to login via this website

https://contact-tracing.phe.gov.uk/ where they will ask for further information. Be very careful about providing any information by phone, text or email.

Contact tracers will never:

- ask you to dial a premium rate number to speak to them (for example, those starting 09 or 087)
- · ask you to make any form of payment
- · ask for any details about your bank account
- ask for your social media identities or login details, or those of your contacts
- ask you for any passwords or PINs, or ask you to set up any passwords or PINs over the phone
- · ask you to purchase a product
- ask you to download any software to your device or ask you to hand over control of your PC, smartphone or tablet
- ask you to access any website that does not belong to the Government or NHS.

However, work has still been carried out at the Club with several Club members regularly turning up to look after the bowling green, the hedges and surrounding gardens. This made work on the green more difficult because grass cuttings had to be carried back and forth in small barrows, thereby doubling the work. What sort of people steal from a small sports club? The Tewin Drivesafe team advises that the new Speed Indicator Device (SID) in School Lane will be re-located by Hertfordshire Highways to the correct position, nearer to the Bowls Club, in the next couple of weeks.

Drought and Staying Safe

All crops are suffering due to this extreme weather. It has been the sunniest and driest May ever recorded. I well remember a previous extreme Spring and Summer in 1976. We were milking cows at Tewinbury then. We had no grass, it just burnt up around the Church. We had to feed the cows straw and buy in feed for them for nearly a year. The milk yield fell and so did our income. So, move on 44 years. I don't milk cows anymore.

In this very dry time, the roots of the wheat plant grow down approx a metre. That's almost 3.5 ft. Quite amazing! It is not the thick tap root but the thin fibrous roots which absorb the moisture to keep the plant growing.

All crops suffer various diseases. Even in this hot, dry weather wheat can suffer from Yellow Rust and Septoria. I spray our crops with fungicides and trace element sprays to counter this. Oats are the same. I sprayed them with a fungicide too as they can suffer from Crown Rust.

It's a very important time for crops as it is grain filling time. That means the wheat kernel is growing and filling with protein. If we don't have enough rain the kernels will be small, dry and shrivelled.


The flag leaf plays an essential role in grain filling. It is the leaf nearest to the kernel and directs sunlight energy to feed the ear. It needs to be kept clean and disease free as a damaged flag leaf means no ear fill and consequently no crop to harvest. In hot weather the flag leaf twists to form a funnel to capture any moisture from the morning dew and direct it to the plant to keep it alive.

The peas are also suffering from lack of rain. They have had only a few mm of rain since sowing. Linda and I like to walk our crops and observe what is happening. We had a good walk through the peas and afterwards thought 'You poor crop. Don't you badly need a night of warm rain!'.

Our area of chickpeas was growing fine but they needed some weed control. I sprayed them early in the cool of one morning. Unfortunately the day turned out a lot hotter than the weather forecaster said and my chickpeas got severely scorched. They have recovered a little and I hope that they continue to do so.

Team Vicar's Letter

It's been a difficult few months for many of us. Overnight the lockdown removed familiar routines and activities, loved ones and freedom. For some of us it also removed our work and income. Some of us have gained time and space while, for those who are in key worker jobs and/or home schooling, life has never been more stressful or manic.

Gradually life is being pieced back together. Restrictions are easing for the time being at least. Some children have returned to school and some who have been furloughed are being eased into work. Shops have reopened and the churches too. But an individual question may be – how much do you wish that life would return to what is was before, or is there some way you hope it can be different?

One exercise, devised by St. Ignatius, which he taught his followers to do when looking to discern a new direction in life, is to make two lists. The first list is that of all the things that give you life. You scribble on it everything you enjoy, that nourishes you, that uses your gifts, that helps you flourish. The second list is, as he phrases it, the things in life that deaden you. On this list you write that which is draining – emotionally and spiritually - and the things that enslave you rather than free you.

Ignatius remembers the promise of Jesus that he came to bring us life in all its fullness, but that we often settle for far less than that. When we look at our two lists (and we have to do so prayerfully and discerningly), perhaps we will be able to hear a call to balance life better.

But a caveat: this isn't a call to hedonism! A commitment to pure self gratification has never proved itself to be that fullness of life that God speaks of. Service to others and care of our neighbours can also be life -giving to ourselves. But this is a unique time that we have been given as we begin to pick up life again. So let's make the most of it, to think carefully about good new routines and priorities and the loss of unhelpful habits. Maybe, if we manage that, 2020 will not have been a complete waste of a year after all.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

Another month has sped past. Where do the days go? Those of us who are not in paid employment somehow fill every day in ways we have hitherto been unused. Yesterday for example, first thing I had to talk to friends about a recent bereavement, over the phone and face to face, then the shop phoned to say our veg box was ready, and the postman delivered our new Hotbin - for composting garden and kitchen waste. The manufacturer recommends you make a cuppa before sitting down to read the instructions. It took a while. It was then I remembered I should have been Zooming with two friends from 11am., long gone. Oh dear! After lunch (during which we planned the menus for a week) I did a bit of my jigsaw, composed, and wrote a bereavement card, finished my book, and finally took the dog for a walk. On our return we had a Facebook conversation with our youngest grand daughter and family, made supper and Zoomed with the Book Club. After a couple of hours of tele and knitting, we fell into bed. The Hotbin must wait until we have time to start it properly! When did I find time for all this Zooming in the past?

Today I have had an email from my Belgian Priest. For the past eight years or so you may be surprised to hear I have been in regular correspondence with this gentleman, a distant relative of my cousin who lives in Belgium. Pere Michel is a retired Catholic priest who resides in a Home run by nuns in Tournai. We began writing to each other because Michel wished to discuss ecumenical matters with me! He was a parish priest and teacher of Latin, so we had much in common! At the present time, we are writing about the lockdown in our respective countries. I have recently told him that we are hoping the repairs for Tewin church and the bells will be carried out during lockdown. He tells me that the cathedral in Tournai is an ancient building that is also undergoing some restoration work. Meanwhile, like us, they are televising church services. Unlike us, there are five clergy present, all using hand gel and masked up, which he clearly thinks is bizarre. Thank goodness our clergy have led services on their own without the need for PPE.

In the month to come, the church is reopening for private prayer at least. There are clear notices about behaviour in church, adherence to social distancing, sanitising, and cleanliness. As I have indicated above, we also hope the church repairs will be done shortly. This essential repair work is going to cost around £50K. We have savings for this work but without the regular weekly giving of parishioners, the church funds will be sorely depleted by the end of this financial year. I know this is not a good time to ask, but if you can give a little it will be much appreciated.

We are also having some tree work done in the churchyard, as one of the large Lime trees lost a huge bough in the high winds. It is now quite unstable and there is a risk it may fall and damage the east wall of the churchyard.

Our clergy continue to be in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families. You can find links to St Peter's Church on line through Facebook or YouTube or through the Welwyn team www.welwyn.org.uk.

The final adjusted League tables have now been published and both Tewin teams have yet again enjoyed a very successful season.



We will keep the voting open until Wednesday 1st July. Every family that enters will receive a prize and we will put a notice in the shop to let you know who the winner is.


CLASSIC CAR & CRAFT SHOW – 23rd AUGUST
