

<u>Tewin Parish Council Accounts for the Financial</u> Year Ending 31st March 2020



At the Parish Council meeting on 13th July 2020 the Parish Council unanimously resolved to accept the accounts for the financial year ending 31st March 2020 and they were signed by the Chairman and the Clerk as the Responsible Financial Officer.

<u>Tewin Parish Council Annual Return for the Financial Year Ending 31st</u> <u>March 2020</u>

At the Parish Council meeting on 13th July 2020 the Parish Council unanimously resolved to accept and approve Section 1 Annual Governance Statement on the Annual Return 2019/2020 and Section 2 Accounting Statements for 2019/2020. The Annual Return was signed by the Chairman and the Clerk as the Responsible Financial Officer.

Annual Internal Audit Report 2019/20

McCash & Hay carried out the internal audit for 2019/20 and confirmed that all the records were in good order and they did not need to qualify the report in any way.

The Annual Internal Audit Report 2019/20 on the Annual Governance and Accountability Return 2019/20 Part 3 has been completed and signed.

Inspection Period

In accordance with the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015, the unaudited accounting records of the Parish Council for FYE 31.3.2020 are available for inspection from 14th July 2020 until 24th August 2020 by appointment only with the Clerk.

Tree Preservation Orders (TPO) and Tree Works

If your tree is protected by a Tree Preservation Order (TPO) please make a tree works application, BEFORE any works are undertaken. The form is available from the East Herts Council website.

You will need to ensure you:

- State the reasons for the proposed work
- Provide a sketch plan showing the location of all trees in question
- State a clear indication of the tree(s) species in question
- · Give a full and clear description of the works to be carried out

Before making a tree works application, please ensure you:

 Provide a written report from an arboriculturalist (A full list of accredited consultants can be found at The Arboricultural Association) if your proposed work is as a result of the condition of the tree

- Provide a report by an appropriate engineer or surveyor and one from an arboriculturalist if you are alleging the tree is causing subsidence damage
- Provide any further information you feel may be important to disclose

<u>Common Ragwort</u> (Senecio Jacobaea)

This is a common weed found throughout the British Isles. However it is very toxic to horses and other livestock and can have potentially fatal consequences if ingested either in its green or dried state.

Under the Weeds Act 1959 the Secretary of State may serve an enforcement notice on the occupier of land on which injurious weeds are growing, requiring the occupier to take action to prevent the spread of injurious weeds. The Weeds Act specifies **five** injurious weeds: Common Ragwort, Spear Thistle, Creeping Field Thistle, Broad Leaved Dock and Curled Dock.

By promoting good practice and good neighbourliness it is hoped that this weed can be controlled.

If you find you have it in your garden please put rubber gloves on and remove the plant and place it in the <u>black bin</u> to prevent livestock eating it. Fragments of root will remain in the ground so new growth will have to be monitored and removed year after year.

BOWLS CLUB NEWS



We are pleased to advise that the Club is gradually opening up following the recent National lockdown. The Bowls Green has been bowled on for the first time this year and is

open for roll-ups by members. This progress is largely due to the dedicated work on the green by members, Rob Kenway and David Williams. Use of the green is confined to telephone calls to the Green Keeper. Distancing is encouraged at all times and of course spectators are not encouraged.

In addition, since the 17th July the bar has been opened on Friday nights and Sunday lunch time for members. All this was carried out under strict hygiene rules. Many precautions are in place and we will be managing numbers with great caution.

As with many activities this has been a difficult time for the club and we're hopeful that we'll be getting back to playing matches in the not too distant future. On the Farm

What extremes of weather we have had. Our grain crops did not like those days of 32/33 degrees of heat. They have been bleached white. The peas did not like those temperature either. But now the weather has cooled down and we've had some rain. Just a pity it was not a month or more earlier.

Our hay crop has been cut and baled, a light crop, poor in volume.

The last of our wheat has left the grain barn. We now have to give the barn a thoroughly good clean and hoover out the ducts. We have a wooden drying floor so the ducts have to be clear to let the air flow to dry or cool our crops. We will let off some smoke bombs to fumigate the building before this season's crop arrives.

We have 2 large fans which work on the Relative Humidity. The lower the Relative Humidity, the more moisture the air can absorb and the quicker the crop can dry. If the oats, peas or wheat need to be dried and I need to take out 1/2/3 percent of moisture, we turn on the gas burner to lower the Relative Humidity.


Mainly through June and July the crops are maturing and are left to themselves to grow until Harvest, with Martyn and Ivor keeping a watchful eye on them.

As a member of the Red Tractor Combinable Crops, each and every year I have a Farm Audit done by an assessor. This is very intensive as I have to keep records of everything I do on the farm with my growing crops through all stages of growth up to Harvest. As a result of a successful audit I get issued with a Yellow Sticker which goes on my Grain Passport, a copy of which goes on every lorry of grain which leaves the farm. Without the Yellow Sticker, no flour mill, grain storage complex, feed mill or anyone else would be able to take my grain and it would not be able to enter the food chain.

Strangely, chickpeas do not seem to suffer from the drought. They are maturing but will not be fit to combine until September. There are only three farmers in the country (one in Kent, Someone in Tewin and one in Lincolnshire) growing them as a trial to find out if they will be suitable to grow in our changing climate.

St Peter's News

Can it be a month since I last wrote for the magazine? It is good to relate that things have progressed at St Peter's during June and early July. In the churchyard the lime tree has been trimmed and we are left with a huge pile of shredding. Pete, our verger, had only to say the word to Linda Williams, and Ivor very kindly cut the hedges. Thank you to them. Thanks also to the Armstrong family who have repaired the tree seat they so kindly donated some years ago and on which we often see visitors enjoying a short rest. And oh Joy! Taylors have repaired and returned the bells – so lovely to hear them briefly peal a few weeks ago.

More importantly, the church has been open again, firstly for private prayer only, and now for carefully arranged services. Roughly half our normal congregation, led by the Rev'd Edward Cardale, with Andrei Pytaleu at the organ, spread ourselves around the pews for our first service together for fourteen weeks. Services are still being streamed every week from one of the churches in the Welwyn team. St Peter's, Tewin streamed the service on the second Sunday in July, with Susannah leading us in prayer. Bless all those who have coloured in panels during the lockdown for the "stained glass" windows assembled by Vicky De Naeyer depicting Faith, Hope and Love. In church things are not as normal – only the vicar receives wine, we wave for the Peace, there are no hymns, in case we spit(!) and no coffee afterwards, though much chat, socially distanced of course. But it is lovely to come together once again as a church community. And as a village community, Susannah brought a small group together at an ecumenical blessing for The Rose and Crown, when Sean and Martine were preparing to open the pub on 4th July. I say "ecumenical" as she was joined by a Catholic Bishop and two local Catholic priests to pray for our community and people everywhere, in this most strange of times. It was a moving and joyful experience.

This has been a time of quiet reflection of what we in Tewin enjoy as a community, coming together from Lower Green to the Burnham Green Road to applaud those villagers who have died during lock-down, celebrating Vicki Griggs' 30th birthday, and clapping the NHS and key workers in the UK. It's a wonderful place to live.

Our clergy continue to be in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families. For the time being the Pavilion remains out of bounds for all tennis club users. This will change in future, possibly by initially allowing access to the toilets. However, the club is bound to adhere to latest LTA stipulations, so this matter is out of our direct hands.

Green Homes Grant Scheme Scam

The government announced on Tuesday 7th July that the new Green Homes Grant scheme, awarding grants for energy-saving home improvements, including insulation and double glazing, would be available from September. By the following day, Wednesday, scammers had started making phone calls to residents in Bishop's Stortford, pretending to be a part of this scheme.

Hertfordshire County Council Trading Standards advises that if you receive a call referring to a grant for loft insulation or cavity wall insulation it is a scam.

Just say 'no thank you' and terminate the call.

The genuine scheme will launch in September, with online applications being required for recommended energy efficiency measures, giving details of accredited local suppliers. Once one of these suppliers has provided a quote and the work is approved, the voucher is issued. There is no cold calling involved. It is up to the homeowner to make the approach, so instantly you know it's a scam if you are contacted out of the blue.




A record number of households took up the challenge and Tewin was proud to display 47 scarecrows in front gardens throughout the Village extending right up into Tewin Wood.

Active Travel Project

Active Travel is defined as journeys undertaken by physically active means such as walking or cycling.

We are all aware of the issues associated with over-reliance on the car. These include poor air quality and inactivity in our day to day lives both having negative impacts on our physical and mental health.

The Active Travel Project is concentrating resources on improving routes that will help achieve a change in transport choice, for short journeys, away from car-use to these more sustainable and healthier options.

Unprecedented levels of walking and cycling in the last few months, has reinforced the important role that active travel will play as lockdown restrictions are eased and into the future.

Schemes have been developed and delivered across the county. Most recently a bridleway between Great Ashby and Stevenage has been improved to allow year-round use. The route connects people to schools, employment and retail in both communities.

Other routes have been widened, re-surfaced and re-connected to help make leaving the car at home a more attractive choice.

The project has been developing a range of schemes over the past 10 months, many of which are now ready to be delivered over the coming months and beyond.
