Vision Health

This year's National Eye Health Week (NEHW) will take place from 21 to 27 September 2020, promoting the importance of good eye health and the need for regular eye tests for all.

2 million people in the UK are living with sight loss that is severe enough to have a significant impact on their daily lives. Half of this sight loss is avoidable. A sight test can detect early signs of conditions like glaucoma, which can be treated if found soon enough. During a sight test, other health conditions such as diabetes or high blood pressure may be detected.

For healthy eyes:

- Eat well foods recommended for eye health include leaf greens (such as kale and spinach), brightly coloured fruit and veg (such as corn, carrots, orange sweet peppers and oranges), oily fish (like salmon, tuna and mackerel) and eggs.
- Don't smoke After ageing, smoking is the biggest risk factor for developing macular degeneration. Smoking also increases your risk of developing cataracts.
- Wear eye protection in bright sunlight. Your sunglasses should have the CE mark on them which ensures that they are giving you the right level of ultraviolet protection.

It's recommended that most people should get their eyes tested every 2 years. Your ophthalmic practitioner or optometrist may recommend you have an NHS sight test more often than every 2 years if you:

- are a child wearing glasses
- have diabetes
- are aged 40 or over and have a family history of glaucoma
- are aged 70 or over

Harvest

Our wheat, pea and oat harvest finished on the 4th of August, a very early harvest. I have not finished that early before. We still have 5 acres of chickpeas to do. They will mature later. The harvest moisture was about 13%, very dry.

The Naked Oats have been sold and left the barn. They go for flaking, malting and in horse, bird and poultry feeds. Due to the dry weather, the yield was quite poor, being half what it was at last year's Harvest. Our large Blue Peas are called blue because of the dark blue colour and they are the base materials for canned mushy peas. They also go to the premium micronising market for specialist animal feed.


Friday, 7th August, was a Very Hot Day and we had a stubble fire in our range field. We think it was arson. A cyclist riding along the concrete path noticed a fire and called the Fire Brigade. They had a bit of a problem finding the field as it's not near any roads. But they did find it and two engines from Welwyn Garden City and two from Stevenage attended. The fire spread at a tremendous rate and in 20 minutes had burnt a 35 acre field. There were 40 big bales, of 500 kg each, in the field. They took 3 days to burn out. We were very grateful that the fire crews were able to contain the fire to our land. In the next field were 100 acres of standing barley. It would have been disastrous if that had caught fire.

A fire out of control is very frightening and if it had not been for that cyclist it would have been a much bigger fire. We are very grateful to the fire crews who managed to contain it, working in tremendous heat. We send them our sincere thanks.

The Refurbishment of the Bells at St Peter's Church

In 2019 the bell-foundry Taylors of Loughborough carried out an assessment of the condition of the bells at St Peters, the last assessment probably being undertaken well over 50 years ago. Although most of the bell frame and the moving parts were found to be sound, some areas were in need of maintenance. The pulleys were showing wear and some needed to be replaced, the one on the 5th bell being in particularly poor state. The clappers of the bells were also in need of work as there were 'flats' on the balls where they strike the bells which needed to be rebuilt and rounded. The tenor clapper required a complete replacement as the ball had been destroyed by the bell's uneven surface where it had been chip tuned.

Before any work could be carried out, a Faculty had to be obtained from the Diocese and funding raised for the work to be done. With the help of the church wardens and various officers of the church, forms were filled in and applications made. The Faculty took about six months to obtain and funding was gained from two sources, Friends of Tewin and the All Churches Trust.

Friends of Tewin had received a bequest from the estate of Mr Geoffrey Malin who was a resident of Tewin and the refurbishment project fitted in with the desire to use the bequest carefully on projects that will benefit Tewin for many years to come. A sum of money was also received from All Churches Trust to help with the cost.

Covid-19 then arrived, putting the project on hold until it was safe for work to be carried out in a confined space. The work was started on 26 May 2020 - the tenor bell was quarter turned so that the clapper would not strike in the damaged area and the clappers, boxes and pulleys were removed and taken away to the workshops at Taylors. The work was completed at the beginning of July and Taylors returned to replace all the parts and make the bells ring-able on 4 July 2020.

Tewin ringers would like to thank all those involved with the bell maintenance project, especially Friends of Tewin for funding the majority of project. Although the Covid-19 pandemic still prevents us from ringing the bells as we would like, we have been able to start limited ringing on Sunday mornings for the church service. Once we are able to ring all six bells, we will express our thanks to Friends of Tewin and the late Mr Geoffrey Malin and his family for his bequest by ringing a quarter peal.

Team Vicar's Letter

It's a strange time in church at present. Our worship has resumed, but in a rather unfamiliar and partial way. There is no singing, we keep a good social distance from our neighbours, we wave across pews rather than share the peace, we wear facemasks and communion is received as bread only.

There are various ways we can react to such changes. Some parishes have decided to keep their doors closed and offer worship only online – the regulations appearing too daunting to abide by. Personally I'm pleased at how we have managed so far to open each of our six churches for those who are able to return.

We might decide that worship without singing, or being able to chat with coffee after the service seems dismal, and offers little incentive to climb out of our pyjamas on a Sunday morning, especially as we can now watch it on the telly...

We may choose to 'take on' the regulations – whether that be to prove singing is low risk to infection, petition for ways to bring wine back into communion or to campaign to get rid of masks which muffle our voices and steam up our glasses.

But one way we might use this painful and imperfect way of being and doing church at present is to see it as a spiritual window into the world with its pain and imperfection. To worship in church (if we are able), or at home (if necessary), with the discomfort of facemasks and the sadness of no song, or the taste of incompleteness when in church we are offered just bread - and to see this as an invitation to prayer, to step inside the sorrow and incompleteness of the world. In doing this perhaps, maybe our imperfect worship might be transformed to deeper glory as we enter the very heart of God.

Whether you are still needing to be at home or whether you are with us on a Sunday morning, you are all in my prayers. And if you never come to a service at church, then please know we pray for you too.

The church has now been open for private prayer and public worship for over a month. We respect the need to use sanitising gel, wear masks and to be socially distanced as we sit in the pews. This virus can affect anyone, and we need to continue to be very careful. We have had further essential tree work done in the churchyard to make another of the Lime trees safe. Thank you to Stuart Kirkham, and Ivor Williams, for trimming the grass and hedges and working with Pete to keep the churchyard looking so neat.

Now at last the Quinquennial repairs are also underway. There is scaffolding around the Tower and some rearrangements are necessary for entering the church over the next two months in order to do these essential repairs. So please take extra care when visiting the church while this work is being carried out. Herd Animals

I am lucky to have fields at the end of my garden and also at the side. They are occupied by herd animals. One field has five highland cattle and their calves. They are worth coming to see. There is one large field divided into two by a fence with an electric fence attached. In one half are two young ponies and, so far as one can tell, they enjoy one another's company and have fun running around together. In the other half are two older horses who in a former ownership had a rough time. They spend most of their time close together. One of them is regularly ridden and the other is being broken in.

To the left of the field is a footpath you may have walked and to the left of that another field occupied by just one horse. From both fields the horses congregate at the side of the footpath. Maybe a carrot is on its way. All of the horses are well looked after and cared for. Two horses together are less than a herd. One on its own is probably less than it would choose.

I am, or rather was, a herd animal until Covid put paid to that. Deep down, I am still a herd animal. My herds were the church congregation, my friends, my family. Fortunately, unlike the horse, I understand why I am alone in my field most of the time, so I do not have to worry about it and whether it is something that's wrong with me. Perhaps horses do not have those sorts of thoughts.

Rejoining the herd needs to be done carefully but you would not think so with crowded beaches and pubs on view in the media. So, just like the horses next to the path, I will keep a safe distance from you, carrot or no carrot.

Many club members have decided not to start playing for the time being and this perfectly understandable. Those attending however have quickly got used to the necessary changes.


We have entered two teams in the St. Albans, Hatfield and Welwyn TT League for the coming season.

Michaelmas Day

Michaelmas Day is the feast of St Michael the Archangel celebrated on 29th September and is traditionally the last day of the Harvest season. Michaelmas Day used to be the start of the night curfew - a sign that Winter was on its way. The curfew (from the French couvre feu, meaning 'cover the fire') took the form of a tolling of the church bell. It was generally rung at 9pm every night, except Sunday, until Shrove Tuesday and was a reminder that all household fires should now be doused. Chertsey is one of the last places where the Curfew bell is still rung from Michaelmas Day to Lady Day (29th September to 25th March).

A great custom in England was to dine on goose on Michaelmas Day. Legend has it that Queen Elizabeth I was eating goose that day when news of the defeat of the Spanish Armada was brought to her. She declared that henceforth she would always dine on goose on Michaelmas Day. Others followed suit.

Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust's Apple Day Cancelled

Due to the Coronavirus outbreak, Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust has taken the difficult decision to cancel this year's Apple Day at Tewin Pavilion, which was set to take place on 4th October 2020.

Emma Matthars, Events Officer at the Trust, said: "Apple Day is one of our favourite events in the year and we are sad to see that it will not go ahead this year. Keeping our visitors, volunteers and staff safe is our highest priority. In the current climate, sadly, we don't see a way to deliver Apple Day safely this year."

The Trust's annual Apple Day, traditionally set on the first Sunday in October, is a fantastic event for the whole family. Over the years, thousands of visitors have enjoyed home-made cakes, fresh apples and juice from the Trust's Tewin Orchard and wildlife discovery activities. It is also a crucial event to help fund the Trust's work to protect wildlife in Hertfordshire and Middlesex.



St Peter's Church Tower Repairs

As many of you will know, we are carrying out some important repair work to the stonework of the church tower. This follows the latest Quinquennial Report by our architect. Although these reports are only every 5 years they often involve considerable expense, especially for a church as old as ours.

We have built up valuable cash reserves in recent good years but the current repair work has hit us at the same time as the impact of Covid-19: complete closure for several months, loss of fees from cancelled weddings, little prospect of our usual Christmas Bazaar (our principal fund-raiser) and yet a continuation of almost all our regular costs. So with the prospect of a large loss this year and a massive reduction in our cash reserves, we are asking, if you are able, if you will make a special donation towards the cost of the stonework repairs – which is some £40,000.

This can be by cheque payable to "St Peter's Church Tewin PCC", or by putting cash in an envelope, and then giving it to one of us, or a Churchwarden; or even increasing an existing standing order.

On-line banking payments may be made to HSBC, for "St Peter's Church, Tewin, PCC", Sort Code 40-24-13 Account 90799718 – with the reference "Repairs (your surname)".

If you are a taxpayer, we hope your donation can be Gift Aided, increasing its value to us by 25%. In that event, be sure to give us your name and address (including post-code).

We shall be extremely grateful for whatever you can give. Only by maintaining the fabric of our ancient church building will it remain in good repair for ourselves and future generations.
