

NEW SIGNS FOR CHURCHFIELD ROAD BRIDGE

The Parish Council agreed to the quote of £995 from Hertfordshire Highways for two signs either side of the bridge warning "Vehicles in the Road".

FAIRHOLME STABLES PLANNING APPLICATION 3/20/0810/FUL

Demolition of buildings and redevelopment of site to erect 3 detached dwellings with associated parking, access and landscaping

Tewin Parish Council objected as the issues raised by Conservation, Landscape and CPRE have not been addressed sufficiently. The following were queried: no update to the Planning Statement, no written commentary on the changes, no conclusion on traffic data file, no detail on area of "native evergreen planting" across the back of the properties, no street scene document for rear aspect. Overall urbanization of proposal not in keeping or appropriate to this location: still visible from road and open field to the east, extra vehicle access with visibility splays (clear sight in both directions), replacement of mature hedge with semi mature domesticated planting, pedestrian gated entrances implying gated vehicle entrance, two storey glass frontages and pedestrian access would require kerbside pavement.

Tewin Parish Council object as this application would have a greater impact on the openness of the Green Belt than the existing development (NPPF 145(g)).

TREE PRESERVATION ORDERS (TPO) and Tree Works

Trees are an essential characteristic of Tewin Wood and all of the trees are protected by a blanket TPO. The TPO also covers both sides of the adjacent stretch of Orchard Road, and also Tewin Close. BEFORE any works are undertaken you will need to make a tree works

application.

The form is available from the East Herts Council website.

- You will need to ensure you have the following:
 - Stated reasons for the proposed work
 - · A sketch plan showing the location of all trees in question
 - A clear indication of the tree(s) species in question

A full and clear description of the works to be carried out

Before making a tree works application, please ensure you have provided the following:

- A written report from an arboriculturalist (A full list of accredited consultants can be found at The Arboricultural Association if your proposed work is as a result of the condition of the tree
- A report by an appropriate engineer or surveyor and one from an arboriculturalist if you are alleging the tree is causing subsidence damage

On The Farm

During the farming year two days are important if you are a tenant farmer– Lady Day, on the 25th March, and Michaelmas on the 29th September. These are rent days when you have to pay your landlord his rent. Half of your annual rent is paid on each of those days. I have several small fields that are rented fields like my small Churchfield along the Church drive. This is Glebe Land which belongs to the Church or the St Albans Diocesan Board of Finance. Glebe Land is kept for future extensions to the churchyard. Over the past 40 years I have given up 2 parcels of the field as they were needed for burials. Luckily my brother and I have bought our farmland over the years.

Wheat drilling or sowing started on the 20th September. Conditions were good but very dry and dusty. By the end of September we had sowed all our 1st and 2nd wheats. What a good job we did as it started to rain on the 2nd October and, up to date, we must have had 100ml (4inches) of rain. The soil is now very wet.


To keep our soil in good, fertile condition, and therefore guarantee top yields, we buy a large amount of compost or green waste. This comes from a recycling company and is spread over a different field each year. Each harvest takes something out of the soil.

I use a company called SOYL. They come every 3 years to take several soil samples from each field to source the level of P & K (phosphate (P_2O_5) and potash (K_2O)). We will then get a computer chip which Martyn will put into the computer on the fertiliser spreader. It will show him the highs and lows of each field. Using this information we only spread fertiliser on the low areas, keeping all of the fields at a balanced level.

We must care for our soil as Man owes his entire existence to a few inches of top soil and the fact that it rains.

Local Contact Tracing System Goes Countywide

A COVID-19 contact tracing system, implemented at a local level to back up NHS Test and Trace, has been further rolled out right across Hertfordshire.

In partnership with Public Health England, and the 10 district and borough councils, we have developed and launched the system which will see council staff support the efforts to locate people who have come into contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19.

A pilot contact tracing initiative, managed by the relevant district and borough councils, has been up-and-running in Three Rivers and Watford since 15 September, and continues to operate – though it is expected this and the wider county service will eventually merge.

How your local contact tracing system works:

• If the national NHS Track and Trace service is unable to contact you after one day, your details will be passed to the new Hertfordshire County Council contact tracing team.

• The local contact tracing team will receive a list of people to contact every day at midday and is granted access to the national system, in which to input the required information.

• If the local contact tracing team can't contact you by phone after another 24 hours, that information will be passed to the district and borough council teams who will visit your address to speak to you.

• You will be provided with a local number to call, so the service can obtain details of your 'contacts' to update the national test and trace system (from there the national process and service takes over to contact the people you've been in contact with).

We will also check if you need any assistance through '<u>Herts Help</u>' – this could be around support with food shopping, collecting medication or debt advice.

Team Vicar's Letter

November is a season where we recognise both loss and light.

All Souls is a time where we traditionally think of those we love but are separated from by death. On Remembrance Sunday we think of the dead lost through war. At All Saints we remember the Saints and martyrs of times past.

There are other losses that may seem poignant at this time - the loss caused by the pandemic: of being separated from loved ones, perhaps the loss of employment, the loss of some freedoms, the loss of many of the familiar ways of doing things, the challenge of living in uncertain times.

In this dark time, as winter approaches and restrictions tighten it is worth remembering that this is also a season of light. On All Saints day we remember the light of the Saints, in their example and in their continuing light – and on All Souls we light candles to shine in the darkness of the church for each person we remember that day - a symbol of unending love, prayer and life.

Thinking of the rainbows that adorned our windows during the earlier part of this year, a biblical sign of hope, I'd like to invite to you to a similar task to remind our community that, despite the darkness that we see around us, the light continues to shine. Advent begins on Sunday 29th November. It marks the anticipation of Christmas when in the darkness of night the world receives the gift of the Christ-light, Jesus Christ. My invitation is that you might display a candle in a window so that others may see. It may be a real candle, if it is safe to do so, or you might get creative and create a picture of some kind. We have prepared a number of ready to colour 'stained glass' candles on acetate so they can allow the light to shine through. You can collect one from church or drop me an email/call and I'll pop one through your door. The point will be to remember that during these winter months, as we deal with disappointments and sorrows of various kinds, that we may remind one another that light overcomes darkness. Always.

So let's fill our village with candles and light – and let's continue to act as light to one another.

St Peter's News

It has been a pleasure to welcome back some of our regular attenders during the past two months. We were delighted to have a choir for Harvest and since then, every week, we have had two hymns sung by the choir, joined occasionally by other members of the congregation, so that we have perhaps six or eight people to sing during the service. We are fortunate to have Andrei, our organist, to play for us every week but singing in church once again makes such a difference to our worship.

A special thank you to our flower arrangers who produced some wonderful pedestal arrangements for harvest, and in the weeks since then, which have enhanced the church and given much pleasure. Thank you also to those who have kindly made donations to the church fund for the Tower repairs and work in the churchyard. It is much appreciated. Despite the bad weather in October, the builders have made some progress with the essential repairs which is encouraging. Thank you to those who have donated jewellery for us to sell for church funds – this is an ongoing project – so please look out any unwanted jewellery that you are happy for us to sell.

At long last we had our Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) this month when we reviewed the church's work in the community, its finances and the state of its buildings and environment. We also reelected our Churchwardens and the Parochial Church Council (PCC) who oversee the running of the church. Thank you to all who have agreed to stand for the PCC for the coming year, and to those who have loyally served the PCC but have now decided to step aside. At the very beginning of November, on Sunday 1st, we shall commemorate All Souls Day (although All Souls Day is actually the day after on Monday 2nd). Normally we hold an evening service for this day, and we light candles in memory of all those people we have loved and lost. This year, due to the Covid restrictions on the number of people we can accommodate in the church, Susannah has decided that we will do things a little differently. The church will be open from 2-5 pm on Sunday 1st November when anyone may come in to light a candle and Susannah, or Mick Simmons, will say prayers every half

hour. Everyone is welcome. Either I or Nick will be there throughout the afternoon to support the clergy team.

Remembrance Sunday (8th November) will have to be different this year also. There will not be a special Remembrance service in church (although a normal parish Eucharist will happen that day at 10:0am) but, to manage social distancing, our formal act of Remembrance will happen at 10:50am outside St. Peter's and include the reading of the list of those who died from the parish of Tewin in the two World Wars, the two-minute silence around the War Memorial and the laying of wreaths by village organisations.

If you can respond to the Church's appeal for funds for the Tower repairs and the upkeep of the churchyard, there are several ways you can do this:

by using the button on the church pages of the village website, at www.tewinvillage.co.uk, or by leaving an envelope at the church in the box by the South Door. Cheques payable to "St Peter's Church Tewin PCC". If you are able to Gift Aid your donation, please leave your name and address with your donation.

On-line banking payments may also be made to HSBC, for St Peter's Church Tewin, PCC, Sort Code 40-24-13 Account 90799718, with the reference "Repairs (your surname)".

We hold in our prayers all those affected by Covid-19, those who have been ill, those who have died or are bereaved, those whose livelihoods have been devastated during the epidemic, and those who have family members at school or university or have returned to work.

Our clergy continue to be in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families.



Bridge Cottage Surgery

It is really important that people do not neglect their general health during the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. At the moment it can be hard to know what to do if you're unwell but it is vital to get medical help if you need it.

Bridge Cottage Surgery are still carrying out face to face appointments when needed following an initial telephone consultation. You will be asked by the reception team to give a brief description of the nature of the issue you wish to discuss, which will help them book the right person in the right time frame. Patients are asked to call at 8am for a morning call back and 12noon for an afternoon one. If the clinician decides you need to be seen face to face, they will arrange to see you. Many issues can be dealt with quickly and safely over the phone, saving you an unnecessary trip to the surgery and reducing the risk of spreading Covid-19 to you and the Surgery staff.

Advanced booking is available with Bridge Cottage Surgery nurses with face to face appointments for baby immunisations, blood pressure checks, B12 injections, coil checks, dressings, ear syringing, hormone injections, pneumonia vaccinations, shingles vaccinations and smear tests.

During this time do not put off having any immunisations or screenings that you are eligible for. Bridge Cottage is operating in a COVID safe manner.

If you are unwell or need assistance then contact the surgery on 01438 715044 or use the eConsult service (accessible https://

www.bridgecottagesurgery.nh<u>s.uk</u>) Bridge Cottage Surgery is open for patients to be able to collect any relevant paperwork that has been instructed by a clinician. They ask that patients continue to drop any samples or paperwork via the black front door letter box rather than bringing to the reception desk and to telephone the Surgery instead of entering the building. This will protect both patients and staff of Bridge Cottage Surgery against unnecessary exposure to the virus. If you do have an appointment please do not attend if you, or anyone you have had close contact with, develops a continuous cough, a high temperature or loss of taste or smell.


