

<u>Tewin Parish Council - Election of Chairman and</u> Vice Chairman

At the Annual Parish Council meeting on 10th May 2021 Cllr Keith St Pier and Cllr Adrian Hill were elected as Chairman and

Vice Chairman respectively with the unanimous support of the Councillors.

<u>Tewin Parish Council Accounts for the Financial Year Ending</u> <u>31st March 2021</u>

At the Annual Parish Council meeting on 10th May 2021 the Parish Council unanimously resolved to accept the accounts for the financial year ending 31st March 2021 and they were signed by the Chairman and the Clerk as the Responsible Financial Officer.

<u>Tewin Parish Council Annual Return for the Financial Year Ending</u> 31st March 2021

At the Annual Parish Council meeting on 10th May 2021 the Parish Council unanimously resolved to accept and approve Section 1 Annual Governance Statement on the Annual Return 2020/2021 and Section 2 Accounting Statements for 2020/2021. The Annual Return was signed by the Chairman and the Clerk as the Responsible Financial Officer.

<u>Planning Application for Land off Hertford Road, Tewin – Change of use of land for Equestrian; erection of a stable block and fencing; Hardstand-ing with car parking spaces and internal access way.</u>

The Parish Council has submitted their response to this planning application and object based on the fact that they believe the development is harmful to the openness of the Green Belt. It will clearly be a visual intrusion to what is currently a completely open landscape.

Even when the hedging is mature, the stable block, and tall vehicles, such as horse boxes, will be clearly visible above it. There is no hedging to the rear of the stable block. If the stable yard is established there will be nothing to stop miscellaneous paraphernalia, manure heaps, etc spilling out into the surrounding field.

The application envisages approximately 90 sq m of stabling and 400 sq m of hardstanding. In the words of a planning officer when refusing a similar proposal in application 3/20/1447/FUL at Epping Green, "The addition of a building and hardstanding onto undeveloped grassland would, by definition, erode the openness of the Green Belt. This impact would be from the spatial

aspect, with open land being replaced by built development. For the same reason, the incorporation of a building and hardstanding onto undeveloped grassland would cause encroachment into the countryside."

If this application is successful, then the site would qualify as "previously developed land" and be open to further development under section 145(g) of the NPPF. This change of status lowers the level of protection on the land, and is, in itself, another form of harm to the Green Belt.

We have no reason to doubt the intentions of the current owners, but future owners may have other ideas. The application might also create a precedent for development of other plots in these fields. If East Herts Council is minded to grant this application then we would ask for the following conditions to be considered:

- private use only, no business to be conducted
- permitted development rights removed
- existing Article 4 Order confirmed
- no caravan, mobile home or other human accommodation to be left on site
- no connection to main services
- no floodlights
- screening to be planted and maintained, and to include some native trees near the stable yard to reduce the visual impact
- any conditions relating to ecological concerns

Tewin Tennis Courts

All parishioners may use the tennis courts on Upper Green without joining Tewin Tennis Club, provided that they abide by the normal booking and playing rules. A returnable key is available from Tewin Stores, Hertford Road in exchange for a contribution towards maintenance of £5 per hour per court , $\pounds 2.50$ for juniors.

On The Farm

As we have had a dry April, it was pleasing to have some early rain in May. I think that May is one of the most important months on our farm for rainfall. If we get rain throughout May, it gets us through to Harvest.


The wheat, oats and Winter beans are racing ahead through their growth stages. By the time you read this the ears will be out on the wheat and oats, the crops will have had their last dose of nitrogen and their second fungicide spray to keep disease away. Our 80 acres of Winter beans are a nitrogen fixing crop so they do the soil good after we have harvested the crop, leaving goodness in the soil for next year's wheat crop.

By the 15th May all farmers have to make a return to the Rural Payment Agency (RPA) which is part of DEFRA, a government department. They want to know everything about my farm. All fields are digitally mapped and the exact size expressed in acres. They want to know what crops are in each field. I employ an agent to work with me. It's all quite complicated and we fill it all in on my computer. We only enter the cropped area of a field and have to take away grass verges, footpaths, tracks etc. The exact measurement of crops in each field is entered. My farm has a holding number and a Single Business Identifier (SBI). If I over-claim, the RPA satellite, which is flying way up in the sky overhead, is keeping an eye on me and I will be in big trouble.

There is much talk in the farming world about oat crops being grown for the drinks market. You have probably bought Oatly, which is a vegan brand from Sweden. They are building a huge factory near Peterborough and will need a lot of farmers growing oats for them in the future. The oat drink is very popular in coffee outlets and as an accompaniment to breakfast cereals.

What's The Buzz Around Hertfordshire?

Hertfordshire County Council have been working hard to protect and increase our pollinator populations in the county.

Our Pollinator Strategy aims to expand and enhance habitats for pollinators, such as butterflies, moths, flies, beetles, wasps, bumblebees and 250 other species of bee.

We are working with partners, including district and borough councils, farmers and other land managers, as well as volunteers to facilitate habitat creation and management in support of Hertfordshire's pollinating insects.

We are also undertaking a biodiversity opportunities audit of local greenspaces in partnership with our district and borough colleagues. Areas like playgrounds, commons, cemeteries, and sports pitches are being assessed to identify opportunities to plant trees and establish species-rich grasslands. Simple changes to cutting cycles will allow grass to grow longer, flowers to set seed and build natural habitat corridors for our bees and insects.

We are renewing our approach to highway verge management. The Alternative Verge Management pilot scheme has shown great promise, stimulating the growth of wildflowers along some of the county's highway, providing habitat and forage for bees and other pollinating insects. The scheme will soon be expanded to other areas.

Want to help protect bees?

The UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology have created a guide for planting and managing bee-friendly plants. Other options for gardeners include:

- Letting the grass in sections of your garden grow long, providing shelter for bees
- Seeding a window box or area in the garden with native wild-flowers or nectar rich shrubs
- Building a bee hotel in your garden
- Leaving a small dish with a few pebbles and shallow water for bees to drink from
- · Using bee bricks in your garden structures
- Reducing the use of pesticides, which can be harmful to bees

Team Vicar's Letter

Turns out I married a brewer. I didn't realise it at the time, but then again he didn't know he was marrying a vicar, that all came a few years later. But my husband Bob, along with second 'Bob',

Datchworth's Rob Clarke, came back from Leeds one day with a brewery in the back of a van – and the Two Bob Brewing Company began. It's taken a couple of years but they have now mastered the perfect pint.

It may seem surprising that while the vicar is in the business of hope, her husband has started a business in hops – but did you know without the church we may not have ended up with what we now see as a decent British pint at all? Beer already existed, there is evidence of that in Egypt and China some 5,000 years ago, but it was in about 800 AD that European monks discovered the properties of hops which gives it the flavour enjoyed today.

Monasteries were often set up to be self sufficient and to offer hospitality to the weary traveller. The act of brewing helped sanitize rather unclean water as well as add flavour and nutrients. The reason they became so good at producing beer was from their belief that all work should be done to the best of our ability and thus for the glory of God. Recipes were then carefully recorded and tweaked until the beer was as good as they felt possible.

I was heartened to hear that one church in London, St. Mary's, Primrose Hill, is carrying on this tradition and has opened its own nano-brewery in the Crypt – using the funds from the sale of its IPA to support youth work in its parish. Sadly there's not room in our church to do the same, but maybe next time you enjoy a pint, say a prayer of thanks to the monks who helped create the flavour so enjoyed today!

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

May has been cold and wet with high winds and occasional hail. Despite that, many visitors continue to include a walk through the churchyard on their daily outings, and we have been pleased to see yet more people back in church after a long break. We are still ensuring that the congregation is masked and socially distanced, and only four people may sing at present. But for those who have braved the hard seating for many months, the good news is that we have put the cushions back on the pews. Hooray!

We held our Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on the first Sunday in May at which the congregation present re-elected Nick Whiting and me once again as Church Wardens, and the following people were elected as members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) - Pauline Brown, Graham Spring, Di Bradley, David Little, Pete Johnson, Gerry Murphy, and Elaine Fowler, with Mick Simmons and Myra Walker as ex officio members. As it had not been long since the last APCM which was held on Zoom last autumn, Susannah was keen to make this a quick review of the year to date and the meeting was over in less than twenty minutes.

The work of a Church Warden is never done. This month Nick and I have visited churches which have already updated their premises with a view to becoming a "greener" church here at St Peter's. This is certainly the aim of the Church of England in general and we shall be given support from the Church for initiatives in that direction. We have also had the five-yearly inspection of the electrical installations in the church this month. On another tack altogether, I have been to a Silversmiths in Essex to have repaired one of our oldest church possessions, a chalice cup we use for communion wine. When we are again permitted to share the communion cup one with another, our chalice will be ready for use.

Things do slowly seem to be getting back to life as we like to remember it. In June we shall have our first wedding in church since November 2019. We have already had a baptism and sadly, of course, there have been several funerals during this past year. Such events are important in people's spiritual lives and mark important moments in family connections with the church.

We hope and pray that by staying cautious we can ensure that, eventually, Covid can be overcome here in the UK. At the same time, we pray for people elsewhere across the world where the virus continues to wreak havoc. We continue to hold in our prayers all those who have lost loved ones during this year from whatever cause. We pray for those whose livelihoods have been devastated and for those who have felt the pain of loneliness during the pandemic.

Our clergy are in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families. If you cannot attend church, a service is streamed every Sunday from one of the churches in the Welwyn Team and may be found through www.welwyn.org.uk

Door To Door Fish Scam


Hertfordshire Trading Standards have issued a warning against buying fish from 'door to door' salespersons using pressure tactics to sell large amounts.

In one instance the fish was left on a 'try before you buy' offer with no money being paid upfront. The trader returned at a later date and tried to charge £360 for a small amount of inferior produce.

Most mobile fish sellers, such as Phil's Fish Van in Tewin, have regular weekly rounds or pitches. These new vans are turning up at random locations and at random times and are charging much more than the average market value for low quality produce.

As with any doorstep caller we would urge you not to be tempted to buy and to ask the caller to leave.

Anyone who has been victim of this type of scam or is wanting advice on doorstep trading or wishes to report an incident, can contact the Citizens Advice consumer service on 0808 223 1133 which gives free, independent and impartial advice on all consumer issues, and gives Trading Standards valuable intelligence to assist them in tackling these rogues.

More good news! The Tewin Classic Car & Craft Show will be taking place on Sunday 22nd August, as long as Covid restrictions are still eased and large events are allowed.



Large Planning Application in the Green Belt

I'm not sure how many people in Tewin are aware that there have been two planning applications (one withdrawn, the other current) which, if successful, would make a drastic difference to the Tewin environment. They seek permission to fence off 8 acres of the "Plotlands" and build a stable block, tack room, food store and hardstanding in the green belt that adjoins Hertford Road.

The details can be found on the East Herts planning website, reference 3/21/0959/FUL. There is a full description. The comments from villagers (at the time of writing all objections) are also accessible on the website and give a very clear picture of the likely consequences of the application if successful. See also page 4 for the views of the Parish Council.

It's not likely that the East Herts planning site is the favourite reading material for many villagers and there is therefore a risk that this application will be decided with many of you unaware even of its existence. So can I urge you to look at the application and if you have views, make them known to the planning authorities. The closing date for comments at the time of writing is 27 May but I am told there is good reason to think comments later than that will be possible.

Also, this application is unlikely to be the end of the story. There are many other sites in Plotlands, and these kind of issues may well come again. So there is a need to be aware.
