


Tewin Bowls Club News



The weather is proving problematic for the team who look after the bowls green. The wet weather earlier in the season

encouraged our pesky friends the earth worm. Each and every day before any work or play could take place the green had to be swished to break up the worm casts which had appeared the night before. If this is not done they get trodden into the grass resulting in the grass underneath being killed.

We then had the hot spell which brings its own problems with areas of the green which were waterlogged now becoming baked solid resulting in a condition known as Dry Patch but at least no worm casts! To counter this the green has to be mechanically spiked and then sprayed with a wetting agent so that when water is applied via the sprinkler system it will penetrate the surface level of the green to the root zone.

No matter the weather, in the summer months the green still needs to be mown three times a week plus the application of liquid fertilizers and on top of all that it requires verticutting twice a month, This is carried out using a mechanical machine with a horizontal reel with 36 cutting blades attached. These cut out the dead grass and moss which has accumulated at surface level also any grass that has been laid over. The Autumn Renovations are another story which I will cover in a later issue. It just proves there is more to looking after a bowls green than meets the eye. The following home games will be taking place in July and visitors are welcome to come and watch. Refreshments will be available from the Bar.

On The Farm


Last month I said that I had to make a return to the RPA, by the 15th May, detailing how many acres of wheat, oats, beans and grass we have on our holding. Now, as I write this in June I have to fill in forms for the June Census. The government wants to know even more about our farm; how many acres we own, rent or share farm; how much woodland and river meadows are on our farm; how many chickens, pigs, calves and cows do I have; how many tractors do I have; how many workers are employed; how old am I; how long am I going to carry on farming (for ever). They have even offered me a lump sum to retire! What rubbish our government keep coming up with.

In July we have to do another return or audit. This audit has to be passed in order for me to get my yellow Grain Assurance sticker, without which I will be unable to sell my crops. My agronomist, who advises me on my crops, sends me a spray report on each field. Every time I go out on my sprayer I have to record what field I am spraying, the crop growth stage, what I am spraying for, the temperature and wind speed, is it near a water course. I have to keep this paperwork for at least 2 years. Martyn has to do the same when he goes out with the fertiliser spreader. He records everything throughout the farming year. When drilling our crops he records the seed rate, date and time. This is just a small sample of the things we have to do to get this yellow sticker. We build up points over the year towards the sticker. Because of COVID our meetings are done over Zoom...a job for the boys! The May weather has been excellent for our farm, wet and warm. Due to the wet weather in May, the wheat has just had its last fungicide spray to control Septoria.

I am unable to spray when the temperature is above 22 degrees as the spray evaporates before hitting the crop. I spray at a rate of 145 litres of water per hectare, which includes the fungicide. I go out at about 6am or late at night. The sprayer has blue lights which allows me to spray in the dark. The lights let me see the boom and spray nozzles while travel-ling at 14kph.

Nottingham Knockers Are Operating In Hertfordshire.

Hertfordshire Trading Standards is warning residents that Nottingham Knockers are operating in Hertfordshire.

'Nottingham Knockers' are usually young men who turn up at the door with a bag full of household products such as tea towels. They sell these items, which they know are of poor quality, at an inflated price.

The reason for the high price is their hard luck story, which makes it difficult to say no. They tell you that they have just come out of prison and want to go straight. They claim to be on an official scheme trying to find work. Sometimes they will claim to have special needs or to have just come out of the army and be unemployed.

Those stories are not true. Nottingham Knockers are not part of any rehabilitation scheme and the Community Payback scheme does not involve door-to-door sales. Instead they are professional doorstep traders, travelling around the country, selling their cheap goods.

The deeper issue is that sometimes they are conmen who will look for a vulnerable victim they can scam. A lady in the Dacorum area was found surrounded by the contents of one of these bags. She said that the young man told her that he wasn't leaving until she bought everything from him, as he'd had a bad day and hadn't made many sales. Anyone who gives money to these doorstep traders may find themselves the target of other scams. Police say that streets targeted by Nottingham Knockers often see an increase in distraction burglaries. This is when a person tries to gain access to your home by tricking you into believing they work for your utility company and then steals from you. Trading Standards advice is:

Only deal with callers by appointment.

If you're not sure don't open the door.

Do not keep large sums of money at home.

If a trader is aggressive or threatening call the police on 999.

For advice, or to ask for help for a scam victim from Trading Standards, call the **Citizens Advice helpline on 0808 223 1133**.

Team Vicar's Letter

The Bible also teaches something profound about being human. Firstly that we are all made in the image of God; every human being has an intrinsic worth which transcends abilities, finances and status. Secondly, and in contrast to that, the Bible teaches us that every human being falls short of perfection; no matter how hard we try we will all make mistakes, fail at some of our endeavours and frankly do some things wrong. We are unique, but we all hold those two things in common.

There is an increasing professionalism in the modern world that seeks to protect companies and individuals from human imperfection. Policies and procedures, increasing demands of educational standards and training are an industry built upon the desire that employers would have employees of the highest calibre possible. I can see a good intention. But I have also seen how these demands for increased standards can exclude people with learning difficulties and those who are neurologically untypical from the human dignity that meaningful employment can give. Despite government initiatives to support and encourage employers to take on people with a disability (physical or learning) they are at a significantly higher risk of unemployment and exclusion from the work force than neuro-typical adults.

And so when I see jobs advertised in our local communities, as I have recently, that insist a person who will work with 2-3 years olds must have grades A-C in GCSE maths or that a part-time cleaning job requires applicants to have excellent communication skills, it makes me stop and wonder which roles are left for individuals who may have many desirable gifts, yet have come out of an educational system short of first rate qualifications. I realise those employers will feel they are simply seeking the best for their organisations, but we all share a responsibility in the overall shape of society that we create together. I pray that we will work harder to be inclusive of all adults in the workplace, recognizing the human dignity that we all share, and that every one of us falls short of perfection, and so we should stop seeking it in others.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

Hot weather plus, I expect, the fact that more of us have had our second jabs, has brought more people back to church during late May and early June. It has also been marvellous to welcome back our bellringers every Sunday. Each week we have four people singing hymns on our behalf, but it is not the same as all being able to lift the roof with our own voices. So, it was especially wonderful to have the SAVoce choir with us once again to sing a special anthem for us at Pentecost. They will be giving a recital for us at Harvest Festival time followed by tea and cakes which is something to look forward to in September. We have also had our first wedding in church since November 2019 and a second baptism. Slowly, slowly things are getting back to normal. We send those families our good wishes for their future happiness.

St Mary's Welwyn ran a very enjoyable and amusing quiz night for the Welwyn Team churches for the second year running to raise money for Christian Aid and reached their target of £3,000 which was a terrific achievement. During June, more people have been enjoying a walk through the churchyard and we have had a photographic club here to find interesting things to photograph, especially the war graves. Being a Saxon church there are many odd artefacts around the church and the churchyard which make interesting subjects for such clubs.

We often have people visiting the churchyard who are interested in the history of various graves, not least those who have researched their family history to find they have ancestors buried here. One morning recently our verger was surprised to find a descendant of Lady Anne Grimston standing by the railings around her grave. According to legend, Lady Anne did not believe in the Resurrection and on her death bed said, "*If indeed, there is life hereafter trees will render asunder my tomb*". After her death, a large tree grew out of the tomb

and is still visible today. The legend is likely to be wrong - Lady Anne was a regular attender at Tewin Church driving here every week from her home at Gorhambury, near St Albans. The lady visitor has married into the Grimston family who still live at Gorhambury. She was able to tell us that one reason that Lady Anne was buried here in Tewin was because she often visited the Sabine family at Tewin House which used to be situated next door to the church, and she died there in 1713. She so loved it here in Tewin, she wanted to be buried here.

We are still being cautious in church, wearing masks, not singing, and hoping to keep ourselves and our congregation safe from Covid. We have members of the congregation still

suffering from long Covid and we pray for all those who have been affected by the virus. We think especially of the people of India and other parts of the world where the infection still runs riot. We continue to hold in our prayers all those who have lost loved ones during this year from whatever cause. We pray for those whose livelihoods have been devastated and for those who have felt the pain of loneliness during the pandemic.

Our clergy are in contact with those self-isolating or unable to get out of the house, or with any bereaved families. If you cannot attend church, a service is streamed every Sunday from one of the churches in the Welwyn Team and may be found through www.welwyn.org.uk

Shingles Vaccine

Did you know there is a vaccine that helps reduce your risk of getting shingles and reduces the severity of symptoms if you do develop the disease?

Shingles:

- · is a common disease that can cause long-lasting severe pain
- has been known to cause permanent disability
- occurs more frequently in those over 70 who are also more likely to have worse symptoms

The vaccine:


- · is significantly reducing the number of cases
- will reduce the severity of symptoms in vaccinated people if they develop the disease
- · cannot cause shingles in healthy people
- · is a single dose you do not have to be re-vaccinated every year
- · is recommended even if you have had shingles before.

You become eligible for the shingles vaccine as you turn **70.** The vaccine is also available for those previously eligible (currently in their seventies) but who missed immunisation.

People aged 80 years and over are not eligible because the vaccine becomes less effective as people get older. However, if you turned 80 in the last 12 months and missed out on the vaccine due to the COVID-19 pandemic, you may still be eligible, so please enquire if you are interested.

If you are eligible then please contact your GP surgery to make an appointment with a nurse to have your vaccination.

Tewin Cricket Club (TCC) have played on the Upper Green in Tewin village since 1953. We are now running three Saturday league sides for the first time ever while we also run a Sunday side and embark on annual tours to Ilkley, West Yorkshire and Sidmouth in Devon.

Throughout our history, TCC have been self-funding and raised money through fundraising events and subscriptions. With more than 50 playing members, the majority of whom are youngsters, we have a thriving, safe environment to play cricket which extends to supporting our young players in other areas of their lives. We also have female playing members with Charlotte Wilde becoming our first ever female captain in 2019.

As our Club continues to expand, we need to improve our facilities. The spirit of Tewin firmly remains at the heart of our Club with many younger members taking on active management roles such as captaincy, pavilion management and selection.

A major part of the facilities improvements is installing a quality practice net on Upper Green which would include a purpose laid practice strip. This would be a multipurpose facility available to the community, while simultaneously having the benefit of developing youth sports in the village and the Club enormously. We are also immensely grateful to the Parish Council and Friends of Tewin in recent years who have helped support the Club in countless ways but we now find ourselves in the position of needing to raise in excess of £20,000. Recent events have had an enormous impact on all communities with regards to fundraising. However, TCC are the last remaining sports team playing regularly on the Upper Green itself and a large percentage of our income goes to maintaining the wicket, outfield and the grounds.

We are always looking for new partners and if any individuals or businesses would like to get involved by sponsoring or donating to the Club in some way, it would be greatly appreciated and in doing so, it would help secure the long-term future of TCC, which I am proud to have been involved with for some 50 years.


