On The Farm

It seems our weather is stuck in a wet weather mode and yet the seasons seem to slip by ever faster.

Hearing a few years ago that the Basic Payment Scheme for farmers was reducing did not bother me. It made me want to build a more resilient business myself, and to be free to farm as I want to and not be controlled by Government Policies or payments. As asked in a double page in a daily paper a couple of weeks ago - 'What do we want from our farms, FOOD or FLOWERS?'. I am now being paid to grow several acres of environmental mixtures of special grasses, which includes flowers and bird food, and this week we sowed 5 acres of Sunflowers.

All our wheat crops have had their fungicide programs. The cold, dull, wet weather encourages diseases, especially at its flowering stage of growth. All in all the crops look great, but we are not at Harvest time yet. I would like some warmer weather & sunshine. Our peas have continued through their growth stages. Today, the 14th of June, they have their flower buds starting to show, which will become their peapods in a week or two.

Work on our new barn is slowly taking place. Our main problem is the electricity supply and we are working with UK power networks to install a new transformer to boost supply for us and for the Village in the future. We hope the barn will be ready by early August. The last of the wheat has left our main grain store and we will now give it the annual clean down and get it ready for the coming Harvest.

When to Harvest Vegetables

Harvest in the early morning after the dew dries. This is when vegetables are at their juiciest and most flavourful. Produce will keep longer and not become limp from heat; this especially refers to leafy greens like lettuce and chard and herbs such as parsley and basil. It also applies to crisp fruiting vegetables like peas and anything in the cabbage family, broccoli, and radishes.

Not all fruits and vegetables ripen the same way. Pears are picked when they are still hard! Watermelons, squash, and cucumbers must be fully developed before being picked. Tomatoes, apples, and peaches can ripen on or off the vine.

Be gentle when you pick. Never yank fruit or vegetables. Stems and branches are easily broken, inviting disease. Use two hands to pick; hold the stem in one hand and pick with the other. If the crop is ripe but doesn't easily pull by hand (such as aubergine), use scissors, pruners, or a knife.

When is National Cheesecake Day?

National Cheesecake Day is held each year on **30th July**. People around the world use this day as an excuse to indulge in a slice (or two) of their favourite cheesecake flavour, whether it's a classic New York-style, a fruity creation, or something more decadent.

The History of Cheesecake

National Cheesecake Day is a relatively young holiday, established in 1985. However, cheesecake itself has a much longer history, dating back to ancient Greece! These early cheesecakes, called "plakous" (meaning "flat mass"), were quite different from their modern counterparts. They were made with crumbled cheese mixed with flour and honey and then baked on a griddle. There's even evidence that athletes in the first Olympic Games enjoyed these cheesecakes for energy!

Over the centuries, cheesecake has evolved and travelled the world, taking on new flavours and techniques in different cultures. From the ricotta-based cheesecakes of Italy to the quark cheesecakes of Germany, this dessert became a global phenomenon.

The invention of cream cheese in the late 19th century revolutionized cheesecake. This new ingredient allowed for the smooth, creamy texture we associate with modern cheesecakes. Cheesecake continued to evolve in the 20th century, with bakers experimenting with new flavours and techniques.



Hidden Hertford

As we walk around the town there are some things that escape our notice – things that are above or below our eyeline, or little details that pass unnoticed. Things that are hidden in plain sight.

This article looks at some of the less obvious features and objects to be found above our heads and beneath our feet which can easily be overlooked.

Street Lighting

In 1825 there were at least 40 gas lamps in the town's streets plus a watchman. The lamps were powered by a gas works in Mead Lane that produced coal gas.



One such gas lamp can be found in Ware Road on the boundary wall of Christ's Hospital (Bluecoats) close to the junction with Mill Road.

Before the advent of street lighting people could hire *link-boys* to carry a flaming torch or *link* to illuminate the way. At the end of the journey these torches could be extinguished in snuffers installed in the street. Such a pair of snuffers can be found on the side



of the Old Verger's House in St Andrews Street.

Team Vicar's Letter

It has been said many a time that the church should stay out of politics. It is a statement easily made but when I hear it, I always think it worth asking who is making that statement, and what might be their own agenda? There is also another question of who do they mean by 'the church'? In our country legislation gives bishops a particular duty to scrutinize and comment on the workings of parliament within their role in the House of Lords. It's part of their job, so we can't expect them to be silent. But really 'the church' is not just the bishops, but rather every ordinary person who identifies as Christian — who along with other citizens of different faiths and none, have an important role as they enter the public debate on the values we wish our society to be shaped by.

The word 'politics' has its roots in the Latin word for 'citizen' or 'people' and Christianity has at its heart God's care and concern for all people whom he created and the common life we share. The bible from its earliest Scriptures to the teachings of Jesus show God's desire for justice and insistence that the least in our communities should be given a special concern. Desmond Tutu once said 'When people tell me that the Bible has nothing to do with politics, I ask them "Which Bible are you talking about?""

Of course, none of this gives a straightforward answer as to where a Christian might in good conscience place their vote. This will be an issue of personal discernment. Our duty as citizens though is to examine the values found in manifestos, look not just to our own self interests but to the broader needs of our world and society and to play our part in shaping the future of this country for the wellbeing of all. It would also be good, in the run up to polling day, to heed the prayer of our Archbishops that 'this will be a time marked by respect for one another, for good grace and a commitment to truth and integrity.' Those are values that we would do well to live by.

Outstanding Belarusian-British Pianist to Play in Welwyn on Saturday 6 July



The July concert in the *'Second Saturday Recitals'* series at St Mary's, Welwyn will feature the outstanding Belarusian-British pianist, Maya Irgalina.

Maya's programme will include Beethoven's dramatic '*Tempest*' Sonata, the Second Book of '*Images*' by Debussy, and Rachmaninov's Second Sonata.

The concert is on Saturday 6 July at 12 noon and will last for one hour. Entry is free and all are very welcome.

Maya Irgalina hails originally from Minsk in Belarus. She is very proud of her Tatar heritage but has made her home in London and gained British nationality earlier this year.

Maya holds the International Artist Diploma in Solo Performance, the Gold Medal prize from the Royal Northern College of Music and a master's degree in Music from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama.

She made her Wigmore Hall debut under the auspices of the Worshipful Company of Musicians as one of their prizewinners.

As a soloist, she has played with the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, Manchester Camerata, and the Belarusian Opera House Orchestra, among others.

Her playing has been broadcast by the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, BBC Radio 3 and Belarusian Radio. And Maya was featured in Semyon Bychkov's *'Beloved Friend'* project about Tchaikovsky, performing with the BBC Symphony Orchestra.

There will be no recital in August, and the 2024/5 season of 'Second Saturday Recitals' will open on 14 September with the return of the Amaia String Quartet, who gave a memorable performance in St Mary's in January for an audience of 120 enthralled listeners.

If you are not already a member, do pick up an application form from the Shop. It only costs £2 per month (£24 pa).


