Tewin Parish Council Annual Chairman's Report 2025

This year, I am writing about our local roads. Basically there are too many rural roads, there is too much to do and there is never going to be enough money to do it.

When they metalled the old cart tracks, labour was cheap, traffic was light, and they did not realise the scale of the problem they would leave for today when costs are higher and traffic is heavier.

Hertfordshire Highways is part of Hertfordshire County Council, but nowadays, most of the work is done by outside contractors, under contract to Highways. The trouble with contracts is that contractors stick to them. So that if time or money run out, they may not complete the work until a new contract is agreed. And if you ask "why did they not do this while they were here doing that", then the answer is that it was not in the contract.

There is an ongoing contract on the repair of potholes, but they only do the ones that have been reported, so please help by reporting them. But be aware that if it is not at least 50mm deep, then it may not be classed as a pothole, even if it feels deeper when you drive over it. Some roads have a top layer of tarmac which is under 50 mm deep. If this should start to lift off then you might get a very rough road, but they do not qualify as potholes.

Pothole repairs have a reputation for being temporary, but proper works, such as the recent resurfacing of the Churchfield Road bridge, are done to a high standard.

Our County Councillor, Ken Crofton, has a Highways Locality Budget, which he can use to pay for specific works, or to pump-prime works funded by Highways. We have been lucky enough to get his help on several projects in Tewin in recent years. In addition, Tewin Parish Council paid for the warning signs either side of the Churchfield Road bridge and for an extra Give Way sign to improve safety at Hollybushes. Friends of Tewin paid for the new "Welcome to Tewin" signs.

Projects such as the cycle highway over the bridge to Welwyn Garden City and the raised platforms at bus stops, are usually funded externally, so they do not come from the Highways budget, even though ultimately it is still your money being spent.

Highways gulleys are cleared out every year or so, but that only clears the silt from the gulleys. Clearing blockages in any pipework between gulleys is of low priority, so be prepared for more water on the road surface in wet weather.

Emergency works can close a road at very short notice, but the work to reinstate and re-open the road is not part of the emergency, and may not proceed with the same urgency.

Highways have been assessing over 500 potential 20mph zones, but none in Tewin as far as we know. In general, 20mph zones are only installed where the road conditions already constrain the majority of traffic to that speed.

The 2025-26 Parish Precept is £43,500. The household charge is circa £50pa Band D (£101pa Band H).

My thanks go to the other members of the Parish Council, and the Parish Clerk for their help and support.

Thanks also go to our County Councillor, Ken Crofton, our District Councillor, Bob Deering and to volunteers who help the Parish Council throughout the year. All Parish Councillors are unpaid volunteers and all Council business is decided by a majority vote. Parish Council documentation is on the Tewin Village website.

Notes from an Apiary

We are well into spring and have had some gloriously sunny days. Our bees are active, and we can see them buzzing around the hives as they leave on foraging flights. They are orientating themselves to the position of forage that has been discovered. This is known as the Waggle Dance and is a very accurate method of passing on directions to foragers, it is great to see an active hive.

Work starts now in preparation for the harvest. I learned in mid-March that most local beekeepers had done first inspection of their colonies. I had considered it a little early, but always willing to learn, we promptly inspected the bees on a sunny Saturday.

The reason for this first inspection was to assess the condition of the colony. We check for strength by assessing the colony size. How much brood do they have. How many frames have eggs, larva and capped brood (pupa), referred to as els. Can we see a Queen. Do they have sufficient stores. Any signs of disease or stress.

We found we had three strong colonies, thriving, with hives full of bees and brood, so much so we decided to give them more space by adding "super" boxes, the space they need to store their excess honey. We make notes of the condition we find them in at each inspection so we can track progress. The notes help plan our next inspection and actions, all great in practice but inevitably bees being bees they tend to do the unexpected and throw plans into disarray.

The next inspections will also have a focus on the colonies making plans to "swarm", the method by which colonies increase in number and secure the future of the species. More of that next time, but we are already making plans to prevent swarming. It is a constant spring and summer struggle between bees and beekeeper to control swarming and keep the bees in the apiary. Well, it is bee KEEPING after all.

Fun fact. It takes an estimated 55,000 miles of flight and the collection of nectar from two million flowers for a colony of honeybees to produce one pound of honey. Bees fly at about 12 miles per hour so that's about 4,600 hours of flying time. So, with nectar collection and processing, we could be looking at upwards of 10,000 bee hours per pound. If I paid my bees minimum wages that would be over £100 thousand pounds per jar! Tewin Stores still has supplies of our Tewin Honey from last summer. Buy some, what a bargain, and enjoy the taste of a summer day.

Screen On The Green

The director, Alex Garland, first had the idea when he was a young teenager programming and experimenting with his own computer and developed his ideas for the film in the following years. It was first released in the UK following a showing at *British Film Institute Southbank* and received various British Academy Film nominations.



Wellness Hub

In our lovely village there are many people who are comparatively elderly and/or disabled in ways that restrict their ability to get the aerobic exercise so essential to continued good health. There are many ways in Tewin to get exercise, but they may not be accessible for everyone.

I'm writing to recommend the Hatfield Leisure Centre in Travellers Lane Hatfield which has an excellent gym, but also has a facility, the Wellness Hub, with "assisted machines" called Shapemaster which provide some power-assisted help for people who for whatever reason might find "normal" gym machinery too difficult. I am both comparatively elderly and disabled and have been using the Shapemaster machines for some months with great benefit. The rates charged seem to me very reasonable and on Tuesday and Saturday mornings there are sessions overseen by a very nice lady named Carol, though the facility is open every day for people who wish to "drop in".

Ukraine fundraiser – a special concert in St Mary's on 10 May at 12 noon

The 'Second Saturday Recital' on 10 May will be given by the Ukrainian soprano Alla Kravchuk with her compatriot Oksana Germanchuk on piano. Proceeds from the retiring collection will go to support victims of the war in Ukraine (see below). The programme will include Brahms and Ukrainian songs, and solo piano pieces by Chopin.

Alla trained at the Kyiv Conservatory in her native Ukraine before finishing her studies in London with Vera Rosza. She now lives in the UK after being based in Germany for ten years as a soloist with the Hannover Opera, with whom she appeared at the Edinburgh International festival and the Vienna Festival. Alla has appeared as a guest soloist all over Germany, including the opera houses of Dussseldorf, Nurnberg, Freiburg and Weimar. She has performed recitals and oratorio in the Queen Elizabeth Hall and the Sheldonian Theatre, Oxford.

Oksana studied piano at the Kyiv Conservatory and graduated as performer, accompanist and teacher. She arrived in England as a refugee in May 2022. She gives piano lessons and is the rehearsal pianist for St Albans Chamber Opera.

Since the invasion of Ukraine in 2022 St Mary's has been very active in supplying desperately needed aid and is now working in close collaboration with a charity known as UK-Aid. In 2024 alone the charity sent over 74,000 kg of aid to over 40 organisations as well as a large number of children and adults with disabilities, wounded servicemen, and internally displaced people.

The concert starts at 12 noon and lasts for one hour. All are welcome and the concert is free to attend, no tickets required.

St Peter's News

A church at the heart of the village, with space for all

I see the magnolia is out at Tewin Lodge and for once the frost is not about to ruin it! The weather is glorious and sunny and quite warm for April.

Messy church took place in March and was followed on Easter Saturday by an afternoon of crafts and an Easter egg trail. The spring flowers have been out in the churchyard and people passing through have commented on how much it raises the spirits. I have given several groups of visitors short guides around the church. People are always amazed at how beautiful the church is, even without flowers decorating the interior during Lent, and they particularly admire our Millennium kneelers.

The Lent course has continued during the month with a study of the way different groups pray. We have looked at the way early Christian Celtic peoples saw life as a pilgrimage, their prayers refer often to everyday life, and they had a vivid sense of saints, angels and the unseen world. The Franciscans who followed St Francis, lived a life of charity and humble service, selflessly sharing and caring for all, including the natural world. The Jesuits were missionaries, especially in the New World, and encouraged people to reflect twice a day on the events of that day, by remembering always that one is in the presence of God, to thank God for the blessings of the day, to review how one has lived that day, to ask for forgiveness and to offer a prayer of hopeful recommitment. In week four we looked in detail at the Book of Common Prayer used in the Church of England since Tudor times, with its rhythm of confession, prayer and praise. Finally we discussed Charismatic Christian spirituality which became a significant global movement in the 1980s, blending traditional theology with the dynamic experience of the Holy Spirit. Each session was accompanied by music and art and a sense of calm and wellbeing. Tewin Cowper school came to celebrate Easter on 4 April just before they broke up for their Easter break and then Passiontide began on 6 April. We celebrated Palm Sunday with the distribution of palms to

the congregation, and a dramatic reading of the story of the Last Supper and the Crucifixion according to Luke.

The PCC has reviewed the way services have been carried out on the 3rd Sunday in the month for the past two years. We have had a service of Morning Prayer at 9.30am, with Messy Church at 3pm, and an evening service at 6.30pm which was either Evensong or Holy Communion. Messy Church has worked well and been well attended, but the congregation has been stretched to attend two further services on a Sunday. In addition, in the winter we have had to heat the church all day, which is quite expensive. We have decided to alter services on the 3rd Sunday in the month, so that from May to October inclusive we will have no Morning service but there will be Evensong each month at 6.30pm, including the Welwyn Team Summer Evensongs. From November to April we will have Morning Prayer at 9.30am. Evening Services in the winter will still take place for All Souls in November, and our Annual Carol Service and Midnight Mass around Christmas. We will review how well this has worked in 12 months' time.

In May, the **churchyard working party** will be tidying the churchyard on **Saturday 10th May from 9 – 11 am**. Do come to help if you are free. Please let Gerry know on gerry.murphyjag@btinternet.com.

Our Annual Spring Cleaning days will take place on Friday 16th May from 5 – 8pm and Saturday 17th May 8am – 2pm. Everyone is welcome to help with polishing and scrubbing. Please bring rubber gloves and polish. We expect the contractor will come during June to carry out repairs to the north wall and preventative work to stop the damp.

If you need support, have lost loved ones recently, or are in poor health or spirits, please remember the Welwyn team of clergy are always there for you.



May Traditions

May Dew

First thing in the morning on 1st May, young girls used to rush out into the garden to wash their faces in the May dew. Why? It was believed that May dew had magical properties and that anyone who has washed their face in it would have a beautiful complexion all through the year. This dew was supposed also to remove freckles, spots and pimples.

Maypole Dancing

Maypoles were once common all over England and were kept from one year to the next. Schools would practice skipping round the pole for weeks before the final show on the village green to mark the end of winter and the start of fine weather enabling planting to begin. This is a tradition carried on by our own Tewin Cowper School. Come and enjoy the show on Friday 2nd May at 10am. The children (and staff) work very hard to perfect their dances and it is a very enjoyable sight. The tallest maypole is said to have been erected in London in the Strand in 1661; it stood at 143ft (43.5m) high. It was felled in 1717 when it was used by Isaac Newton to support Huygen's new reflecting telescope.

Oak Apple Day

This is the day that people traditionally wear oak apples or oak leaves pinned to them to remember that on 29th May King Charles II returned to London in triumph after the restoration of the monarchy in 1660. The wearing of the oak apple was to celebrate the King's narrow escape from capture by Cromwell's soldiers by hiding in an oak tree.

Rochester Sweeps Festival

Rochester's annual Sweeps Festival celebrates the traditional holiday that sweeps used to enjoy on 1st May. It was the time of year when sweeps could put away their tools and have some fun. The Festival is a colourful mix of music, dancing and entertainment and is an opportunity to see some of the traditional dances and hear the songs passed down from generation to generation.
