A letter from the Team Rector

Dear Friends

Søren Kierkegaard, the Danish philosopher and theologian, in his journal entry for May 19th 1850 complains that Bishop Mynster had that morning, on Whitsunday, preached a sermon warning the respectable and affluent congregation at Copenhagen's Cathedral of the dangers of monks and hermits. Kierkegaard had long felt that the Danish church had become complacent and too closely allied with a bourgeoisie society intent on maintaining the *status quo* – his point, was that to preach against the dangers of the monasteries, was to preach against an entirely abstract and theoretical danger – they had been abolished in 1536. Rather than speak about something which had concrete significance to the assembled congregation – and Kierkegaard had strong views about what churchmen *ought* to be preaching about: 'ugh God forbid, that might easily have become all too serious'– the Bishop had preached 'in order to be rewarded with applause.'

I feel rather like that as I write my first Rector's letter, four weeks before my institution. One is of course anxious for 'applause', but with only a somewhat abstract notion of what challenges, joys and needs beset the Welwyn Team, there is a danger that one will fall under Kierkegaard's reproof. The preacher is always treading the line between on the one hand speaking only about the immediate concerns of a congregation, failing to open their eyes to the wider horizons of Christian faith, and on the other, preaching with too little regard to the particular context and make up of the assembled congregation.

Christianity is a faith which deals with concrete historical situations not philosophical abstractions. The Law and Covenant is given to the particular nation of Israel; the Prophets speak to identifiable historical situations; Jesus Christ lives a life framed by the questions of his day; the letters of Paul are letters to churches with real issues which demand his response – there are no works of abstract philosophy in the Bible, no books which deal solely in ideas – that made Christianity difficult to explain to the wider world, for as St Paul says it could not provide sort of 'wisdom' which the Gentile world prized. Christianity is a faith that deals with people's relationship with God in the real concrete context of their lives. Christian preaching and ministry is never something delivered from an Archimedean point, but within the context of human lives and human struggles. God's revelation is known in a life – Jesus Christ. So we as his followers can only speak as humans to other humans, within the midst of life.

Churchwardens' Notes

On August 29th we had the annual joint service with All Saints, Datchworth, in a marguee on Burnham Green. Although a dull, windy and damp morning, we still had around 50 people brave the elements—and the Sunday Club held nearby in a tent! On September 5th we had the last in the series of this year's Summer Evensongs at St. Peter's, with Coralie preaching on the journey of the Virgin Mary from Bethlehem to the foot of the Cross. Over 50 attended and many joined us for a glass of wine following the service. It was a good first use of our new gazebo.

We are relieved to tell you that the annual Archdeacon's Inspection, carried out by our Rural Dean, Carl Garner, was completed satisfactorily on September 8th, following an inspection of our registers, records, and churchyard.

At our Parochial Church Council meeting on September 8th, Tewin School Headteacher, Alison Simpson, gave us a most useful insight into the life of the school. It was good to hear of the new projects under way; and the overall picture of a very vibrant community. We are very pleased that the school will be making use of the church on a regular basis. Ruth Kearns has prepared a master plan for all classes to visit during the year and already held two sessions in conjunction with Stephen Fielding, our non-stipendiary minister, who is also a governor of the school. On September 16th Lynda brought her Year 1 class together with a class from one of our partner schools, Weston. How lovely to see so many children investigating the history and features of the old building and we look forward to welcoming the whole school for their Harvest Festival service on Monday September 20th.

Once again, the church looked fantastic for our Harvest Festival on September 19th. Many thanks to Elizabeth Wilson and her band of flower arrangers for all their hard work. Thanks too, to all those who gave flowers and produce, including the Harvest Loaves. It all made a beautiful display. Finally, thanks to Roger Malec for standing in for the churchwardens at the school service and for arranging the distribution of the produce to the local hospice directly after that service.

Huge thanks go to Gloria Kersey and all her helpers for arranging, serving and clearing up after our Harvest Lunch, held after the Family Service on September 19th. The maximum of 50 came to the School Hall and had a most enjoyable occasion, if on a some what reduced scale with our Festival Weekend last year!

Other September activities included the annual Bike 'n' Hike arranged by David Rawlins. This year we had just 23 visitors and one family sponsored for St.Peter's (well done Nicky and Hector!) Nevertheless we still maintain our fame for the cakes we provide for the hikers and bikers. Our thanks go to all those who helped with refreshments, both baking and serving to visitors and of course, to David for organising our participation in this very worthwhile charity event, supporting the Beds and Herts Historic Churches Trust.

Our thanks to Ivor Williams for arranging the hedge trimming on each side of the drive. It looks very neat and tidy now. Also thank you to Mick Lloyd who has kindly repaired one of the wrought iron floral arrangement pedestals used in the church which are essential for the displays at Harvest and other big occasions.

Next month we hope to be able to give an update on our Community Day (mentioned last month) held on September 23rd which was too late for this month's Parish News print date.

Help St Peter's Listed Places of Worship Scheme (LPOWS)

For many years the Government has allowed churches owning listed buildings to reclaim VAT on the cost of repairs to the fabric of the building. This has enabled us at St Peter's to save considerable amounts of VAT. In the last year alone we were able to recover over £2,500 in VAT, and that was whilst the rate had been reduced to 15%. Not only has VAT now reverted to 17.5%, it is shortly to rise to 20%. That makes it even more important that we, and all the other churches with listed buildings, should continue to be able to recover VAT on essential repairs.

Alas, the LPOWS scheme is scheduled to end in April 2011.

A petition has been drawn up with the aim of persuading the Government to extend the scheme beyond April 2011. The PCC cannot join the petition as a body - it has to be done by individuals. With encouragement from the St Albans Diocese, Coralie and a number of the PCC members have already signed up to the petition; we would now invite all other recipients of this Parish News to do the same. If successful, this will help us to maintain our lovely church building in the future without the added burden of VAT on the already considerable cost of the repairs themselves.

Wednesday 24th November 2010 - Visit to the Royal Academy of Arts to see *Treas*ures from Budapest : European Masterpieces from Leonardo to Schiele

This exhibition should not be missed. It includes paintings, drawings and sculpture ranging from the early Renaissance to the 20th century showcasing the breadth and wealth of one of the finest art collections in Central Europe. Rare and important works by artists including Leonardo, Raphael, El Greco, Rubens, Goya, Manet, Monet, Picasso and Schiele will be on display, many of which will be shown outside Hungary for the first time.

The coach cost will be £11 for *THACS* members and £13 for non-*THACS* members. There is no entry charge for Friends of the Royal Academy so they only pay for the coach. If you are not registered, you need to pay the £10 group-rate exhibition admission as well as the coach cost. Audio guides are not included but can be purchased in advance at a group rate of £2.50 each.
