Farewell to David

Many people in Tewin will have known David Reavill, who sadly died suddenly last month.

David, who was 74, had lived in the village since 1996. He worked as a volunteer in the shop and was also a long-standing member of the congregation at St Peter's and served as a sidesman.

He was also a volunteer with the QE11 Hospital's League of Friends for many years.

"My dad absolutely loved Tewin, "said his eldest son, Simon, "He really enjoyed village life and said it was the best place he had ever lived. " David originally came from Nottingham. He was a research chemist, who came south to take up a job with SKF, the pharmaceutical company. He leaves three sons, Simon, Kevin and David, and six grandchildren. A seventh, Carly, predeceased him.

The Rev. Susannah Underwood, said: "David never boasted about his good works but faithfully served this community in many ways. We will miss him."

Grass Warren Garage Site Development

The Parish Council has been advised that the Riversmead housing development in Grass Warren may start in September 2013 and residents should receive notification prior to the commencement of the works.

Taylor Wimpey Donation

Taylor Wimpey has kindly donated £6000 to the Parish Council and this money will go towards the installation of two disabled car park bays in tarmac in the Upper Green car park. This will improve access to Upper Green for elderly residents of the village and people with mobility problems. A removable / lockable bollard will be installed to limit access onto Upper Green as well as a paved footpath from the car park entrance to the top of the existing path leading down to the Pavilion with a spur to the playground. These works are expected to take place in July and the car park will not need to be shut but a portion of it may be cordoned off.

Blocked Gulley & Ditches

Highways have advised that they are in the process of arranging to have the blocked gulleys and ditches looked at, some of which will need to be done under a road closure. Permission for road closure will take time to obtain.

Upper Green Works

The Parish Council has agreed that the adjacent landowner can replace his dilapidated chestnut fencing and boarding at the back of Upper Green with 3ft high chestnut paling fencing wherever it needs doing and in the process trim back the brambles and dead wood. The landowner will then be planting a new hawthorn hedge on his side of the fence at the back of Upper Green.

A pedestrian gate will also be installed close to the green shed to the rear of Upper Green to provide safe pedestrian access from the car parking area on Seven Acres onto Upper Green for the Classic Car Show on 18th August 2013.

Team Vicar's Letter

Datchworth parishioners, it seems, have a rather good aim. On a day when others were spending money at the Datchworth fete in a constructive way - enjoying pony rides, eating cakes, rummaging through books – there was a small, but determined -looking bunch, who were queuing to throw wet sponges at the Rector and Vicar. At first the queue consisted of children – forgivable creatures. But shamelessly amongst them adult members of the congregation appeared. "Aim right for her nose!" onlookers goaded with glee. And sure enough, wet sponge after wet sponge, landed squarely on my hooter.

Now of course the problem with stocks is that you can't fight back. Even with the seemingly innocent missile of a wet sponge, there is still a desire to defend yourself. And believe me, that desire is strong.

On the hillside outside Bethlehem live the Nassar family. They own a small bit of land, bought by the family in 1913. They have paper work to prove it. It is not much ,but offers an olive grove and grazing for their sheep. It has three caves, dug out in the rock in which their family lives.

It is land, however, that the Israeli authorities would like. After 20 years of battling it out in the courts, the authorities have used intimidation tactics instead. Large boulders have been placed over the families access road so vehicles cannot get in. Their olive trees have been cut down by soldiers. Their water supplies have been cut off. When we visited, on our trip to the Holy Land, an Israeli helicopter circled round and round us overhead.

But the extraordinary thing about the Nassar family is, inspired by Jesus, their desire to be peacemakers. Not to look for revenge, but rather to teach Palestinian and international visitors ways to work for hope and reconciliation. As you enter their land, painted on a rock, is the most incredible statement. "We refuse to be enemies". If you want to find out more you can visit their website <u>www.tentofnations.org</u>.

Maybe I will put away the bucket of wet sponges I have hidden in the vestry.

A Welcome return to Tewin

Red Kites were evidently once common in Hertfordshire. "Puttock", one of the local or vernacular names for these birds, which include "glede" and "gleade" and which are also shared by the Buzzard, is found in a number of place names. Locally we have Puttockhill Wood by the B197 north of Welwyn, and Puttocks Oak in Hatfield Park. The latter is also shown on some maps as "Kite's Oak". The hill as one leaves Digswell on the B1000 towards Hertford was known as Puttock's Hill by the villagers of my school years, a name found on earlier maps.

The birds were common and widespread throughout Britain until the early 18^{th} century. But by the 1870's they had been persecuted to extinction in England and at the start of the 20^{th} century the British population had been reduced to a remnant population in Central Wales numbering between three and twelve pairs.

The Nature Conservancy Council and the RSPB decided on a programme to re-establish Red Kites in Britain. The first releases, using birds imported from Spain and Sweden, were made in 1989 on the Getty Estate near Chinnor in the Chiltern Hills and the Black Isle, near Inverness.

Releases have since taken place at other sites and a minimum of 1,193 pairs bred in Britain, including 21 English counties, in 2010. At least ten of those pairs nested in Hertfordshire including a pair in Tewin. Just watching these magnificent raptors, now back in the sky over Tewin after 200 or more years, is exciting, and should give us all a great deal of pleasure.


Red Kites have a limited distribution. Of the estimated and declining world population of 18-24,000 pairs, half are found in Germany and about a sixth in each of France and Spain. The species, one of three globally threatened British species and a high conservation priority, is included in the *World Checklist of Threatened Birds*.

Although the species hunts mostly over open countryside, it was once abundant in larger British towns and cities where the birds scavenged for refuse, especially animal waste, i.e. carrion. Because of its usefulness in refuse disposal it was protected by royal statute in the 15th century.

In Scotland the species continues to be severely and illegally persecuted by poisoning said to be "strongly associated with driven grouse-shooting". Over 35% of birds released on the Black Isle are known to have died by this means. As anyone who has observed the Chiltern population will have noticed, Red Kites are not cautious of people like most large birds, and readily forage around villages and the edges of urban areas. Some even come to gardens where householders regularly feed them. This is a cause for concern as it tends to result in the birds becoming tame, and slows, even halts, the desired dispersal of the increasing population. Whilst admiring these birds, neighbours of one such provider near Princes Risborough have told me that "at times the birds next door can be a nuisance".

Red Kites mostly nest in mature deciduous trees such as oaks. Usually two, sometimes three, eggs are laid in nests which often include human paraphernalia such as plastic bags and rags. In the Chilterns nests have been found to contain soft toys and items of underwear "stolen" from gardens.
